British Columbians Have Fight in Every Seat On November 2

Liberals Have Candidates in All Ridings and C. C. F. in All But One—Independent Non-Partizans and Independents Also Numerous

VICTORIA, Oct. 13.—There were 219 nominations taken yesterday for 47 ridings in the provincial election on November 2. Not a single acclamation was recorded. The Liberal party has candidates in every seat and the Co-operative Commonwealth in all but one. The nominations per groups are as follows:

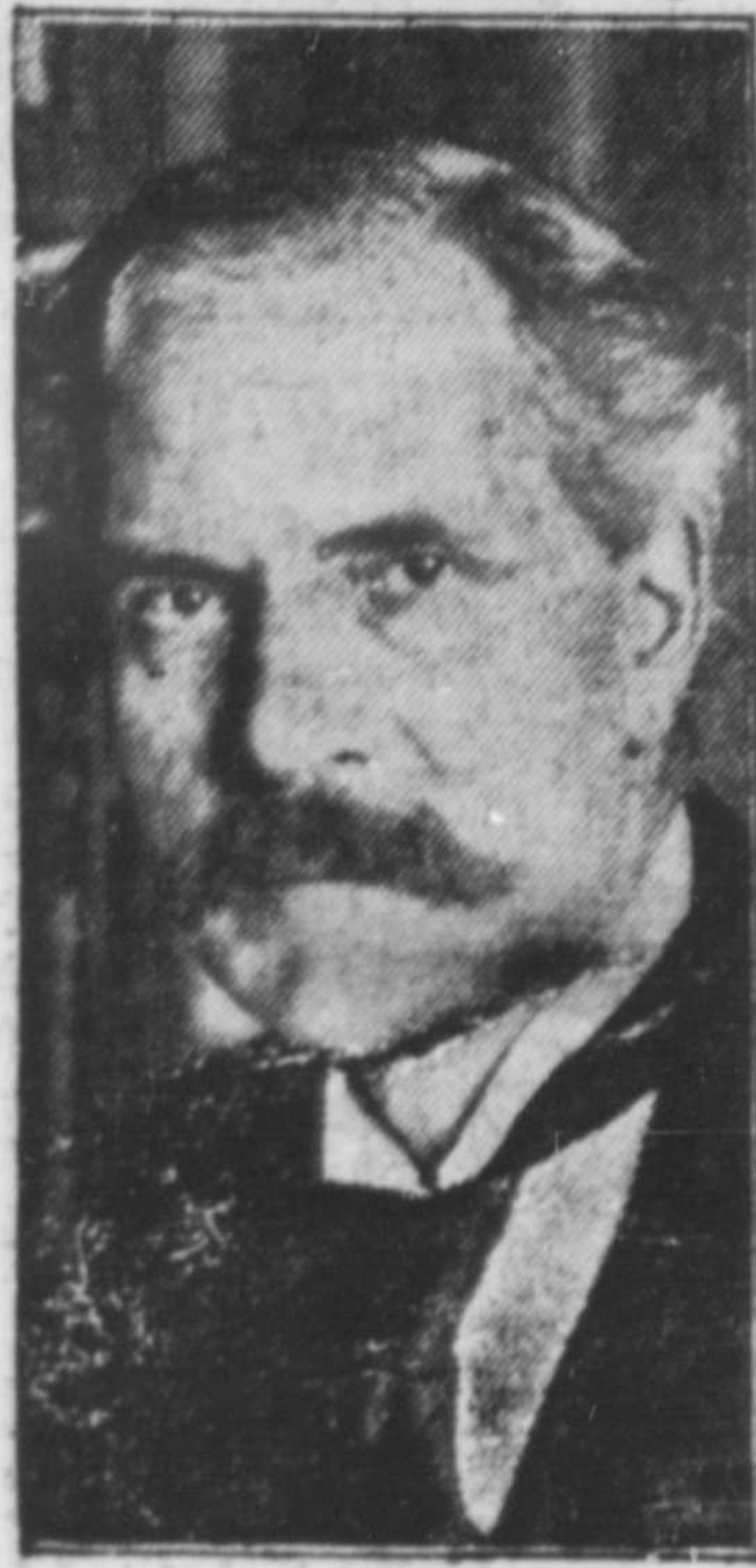

Colored Man Freed of Charge That Followed Illegal Operation in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, October 13 (Canadian Press)—An Assize Court jury yesterday returned a verdict acquitting Melville D. Evelyn, colored, on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Mrs. Dorothy Williams who died following an illegal operation.

Mining Engineer Sees Probable Increase in District Activity With Silver Lead Coming Back

Tells of Mining Operations at Different Points in Address To Rotary Club at Luncheon Yesterday

"If the showings in the country east of here were only in the Bridge River country just now they would be taken up at once," declared Harold L. Batten, consulting mining engineer, who addressed the Rotary Club yesterday following a visit to the Columario mine at Usk, the opening up of which is continuing. At present very little work is being done in the interior district,

the only other activity of importance being in the neighborhood of Smithers. Mr. Batten predicted, however, that the activity would next season spread to this district including Stewart where there was every prospect of an active season. The properties on which work has to be done must figure on twenty dollar gold and not thirty, the present price, as there is a possibility of the price dropping back to the old figure.

Silver lead will be the first properties to come back, according to Mr. Batten. This is because of the fact that there is little lead in stock.

The speaker then told about some of the southern mines. In Vancouver recently he had seen 30 cars of ore from the Monarch mine being shipped from Vancouver to Belgium. The Monarch is located at Field and a car of lead ore and a car of zinc concentrates are shipped from there daily. The mine was developed by A. B. Trites and at present is one of the largest lead mines in the world. The concentrates are theoretically pure.

The high price of gold, Mr. Batten said, was due to the low price of the dollar. The fact that gold had appreciated in value one third since the depression ended in the spring meant that the dollar had depreciated in value to that extent. The increase in value of gold

FIVE MEN ARE SAVED

Nearly Perished When Steamer Princess Ena Went Ashore On Queen Charlotte Islands

VANCOUVER, October 13 (Canadian Press)—Five men cheated death in a grim struggle with wind and waves when the steamer Princess Ena struck a rock off Copper Island, one of the Queen Charlotte group, it was learned here yesterday.

Advices told how the steamer, in town of a tug enroute to Jedway, went aground late Monday night. Listing heavily, boats could not be launched from the vessel and the five men on board plunged into the angry sea and swam 200 yards to safety aboard the tug Sea Wave.

The ship struck at high tide and is reported to be badly holed. Arrangements for salvage are under way.

Anna May Ullman, Who Lost Her Feet as Result of Frostbite, Takes Up Hazelton Residence

Is Writing Book on Her Adventures of Last Winter Which Almost Ended in Death—Letter to Daily News

Miss Anna May Ullman, courageous young American woman, who was caught in a blizzard on a hiking tour between Telegraph Creek and Atlin last winter and sustained frostbite which necessitated amputation of both her feet, has arrived at Hazelton after spending months in hospital at Vancouver and plans on residing at the interior town. With the assistance of

a former school teacher, Miss Ullman is engaged in the writing of a book on the adventures of her trip. In an interesting letter to the editor of the Daily News, she writes as follows descriptive of her tramp which almost ended so tragically last winter:

"High above the timber line big herds of caribou pawed the snow off white moss so they could eat it. They were undaunted by storms and bitter cold of the blizzards on their feeding grounds on top of the mountains.

"Giant bull moose fled when they got wind of us as we approached. It was winter but they hadn't yet lost their huge horns.

"Far across frozen lakes came the high-pitched barking of coyotes during the long winter nights. A trapper showed me a big wolf, frozen solid, after he had been skinned. Even with its joints bent, the animal came up to my waist.

BRITAIN'S TRADE IS SWINGING UPWARDS

LONDON, Oct. 13. (CP)—Great Britain's trade barometer is continuing to rise. During September exports were \$6,000,000 greater than last year. Of the increase \$5,000,000 was in manufactured goods, production of automobiles increasing by 68%. "Great Britain stands in the strongest financial position today of any nation in the world," declared Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, yesterday. It was intimated that new trade agreements were being negotiated by Britain with Italy, Poland, Spain and Uruguay.

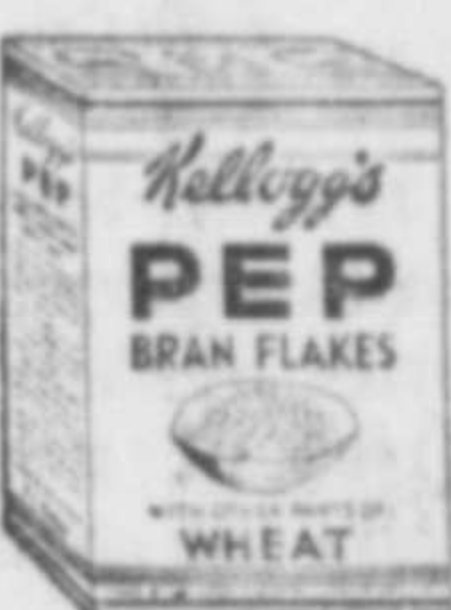

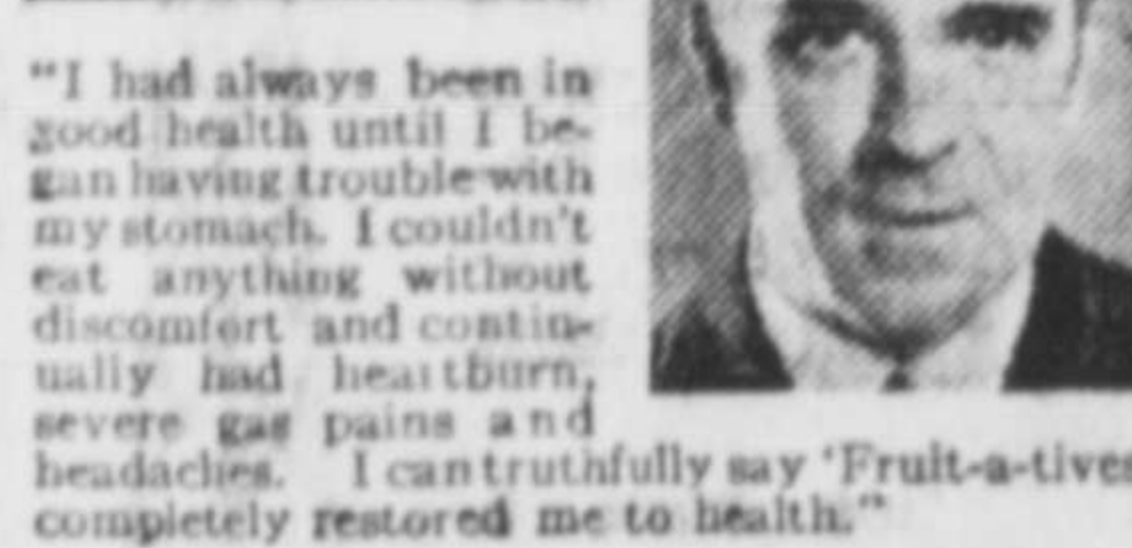

STEWART MEETING

was running at the instance of Alice Arm and Anxox supporters. He suggested that the Anxox convention, at which Mr. Asselstine received the Liberal nomination, was not a clean cut fight.

Mr. Fowler dwelt for some time upon his own history as a resident of Northern B.C. since 1907 and stated that he was speaking in support of Mr. Kergin "on behalf of the workers and not on behalf of the capitalistic system." He eulogized the Hon. T. D. Pattullo as a leader and an executive and urged his hearers to support Mr. Pattullo.

He rated the independent candidates as just the Conservative supporters of the present government under another name. He then dealt with each of the four other candidates personally, criticizing them all.

Convention Criticized

At the conclusion of Mr. Fowler's address a member of the audience asked him why he (Mr. Fowler), claiming to be a Liberal, was backing a candidate who was in opposition to the candidate elected by the Liberal nominating convention. Mr. Fowler's reply was that the convention was not clean and above board.

H. B. Campbell, who was a member of the audience, offered to give the audience the facts of the convention. Several members of the audience asked that Mr. Campbell be allowed to do this but the chairman called on the next speaker, J. Fiva, who spoke briefly in Mr. Kergin's support.

Mr. Kergin then took the platform and opened his remarks by thanking Mr. Asselstine for his presence and expressions of personal regard, saying that he, too, valued his friends. He spoke of his thirteen years' service as member for Atlin and dealt at considerable length with the record of the present government during the past five years. He stated that at Anxox there had been a convention, a disagreement and a misunderstanding and that now he would fight Mr. Asselstine during this campaign and that, afterwards, irrespective of the outcome, the fight would be forgotten. At this stage there was further interruption and questioning as to why he claimed to be a Liberal candidate.

Proceeding with his remarks Mr. Kergin stated that, during his terms as member, he had worked hard to develop the riding and to get what roads and trails he could and had endeavored to get 100 cents' worth of value for every dollar expended. He dealt with the Alaska-B.C. highway, and the fact that, while \$45,000 had been spent on an aerial survey, no report thereon was available.

Anxox Trouble

Dealing with the recent labor trouble at Anxox, Mr. Kergin stated that he was not approached by the men, nor given any information nor asked for help. He had, however, taken the matter up in the House and some time later, the minister of labor had tabled a report substantiating the claims of the men involved. His copy of the report and his correspondence on this subject had all mysteriously

disappeared from his desk in the Parliament Buildings.

In conclusion he said: "If the people see fit to support and re-lect me I will do my best for the district—but if some one else is elected I will still maintain my feeling of friendship for the people of the riding."

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A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932. Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction. The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole. Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government. Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort. The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study. August, 1933. T. D. PATTULLO.

- 4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of State Health Insurance should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.
- 5.—A general and effective review must be made of the Educational problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs. Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.
- 6.—The financial position of our Municipalities is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.
- 7.—An effort should be made to settle our Agricultural Lands in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.
- 8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in Marketing its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.
- 9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a Highway Board should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.
- 10.—A Public Utilities Commission should be established.
- 11.—A National Central Bank should be established.
- 12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.
- 13.—The Peace River must be given access to the Coast.
- 14.—In order that the utmost Freedom of Action by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.
- 15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.
- 16.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.
- 17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

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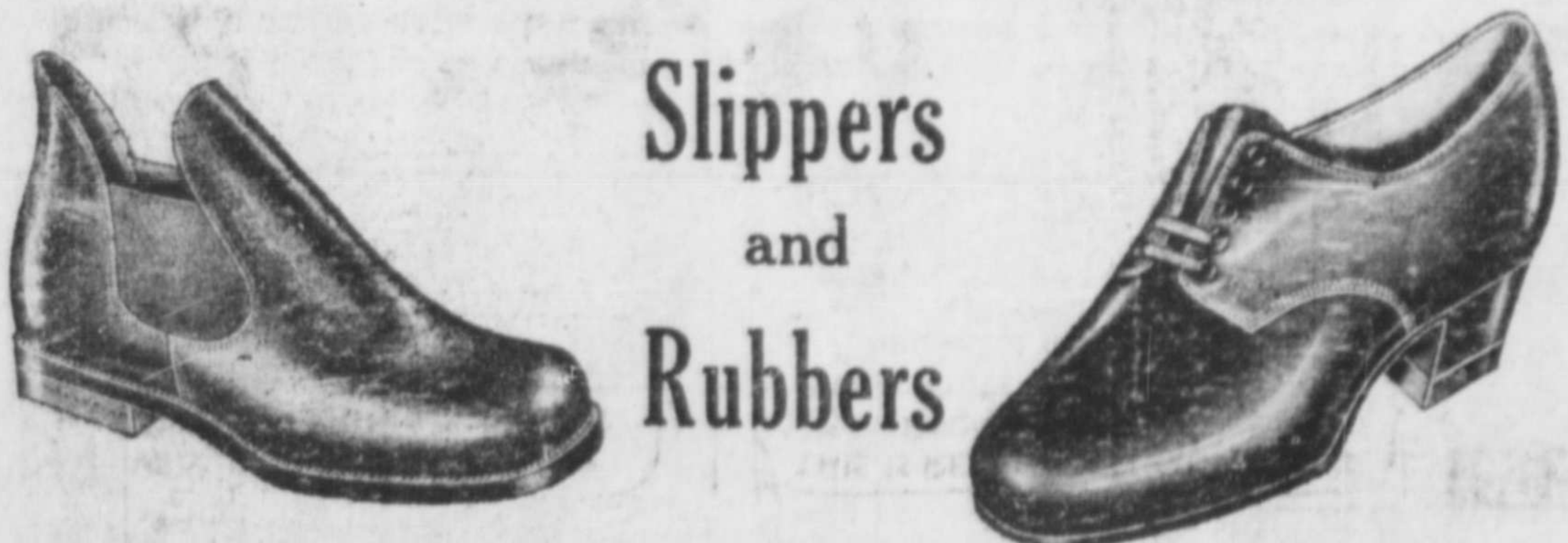
