BRITAIN TO PAY PART OF HER DEBT

MANY CANDIDATES RUNNING IN DEFERRED ELECTIONS

Hinchliffe Drops Out of Fight In Victoria; Thirteen in Vancouver

Independent Non-Partizans Abandon Contest For Two Metropolitan Seats—Some Minor Changes in Lists Otherwise

VICTORIA, Nov. 7: (CP)—Twenty-seven candidates were nominated yesterday in Victoria for the deferred provincial election on November 27, voting on candidates for the four seats in the capital and two in Vancouver Centre having been postponed following the death between nomination and general election day of W. J. Bowser K.C., leader of the Independent Non-Partizan movement, who was a candidate in both ridings. Thirteen candidates were nominated in Vancouver Centre.

Col. Lorne Ross, who was one of the original Victoria nominees, an Independent, was the only candidate to drop out prior to yesterday's official nominations.

After a meeting Monday night, which failed to reach an agreement on the number of candidates to retire in favor of four who would be chosen, Hon. Joshua Hinchliffe, minister of education and one of the few Unionist followers of Premier Tolmie, announced he would retire, leaving twenty-six candidates in the field in Victoria. There will probably be some other withdrawals from the Victoria list which is now as follows:

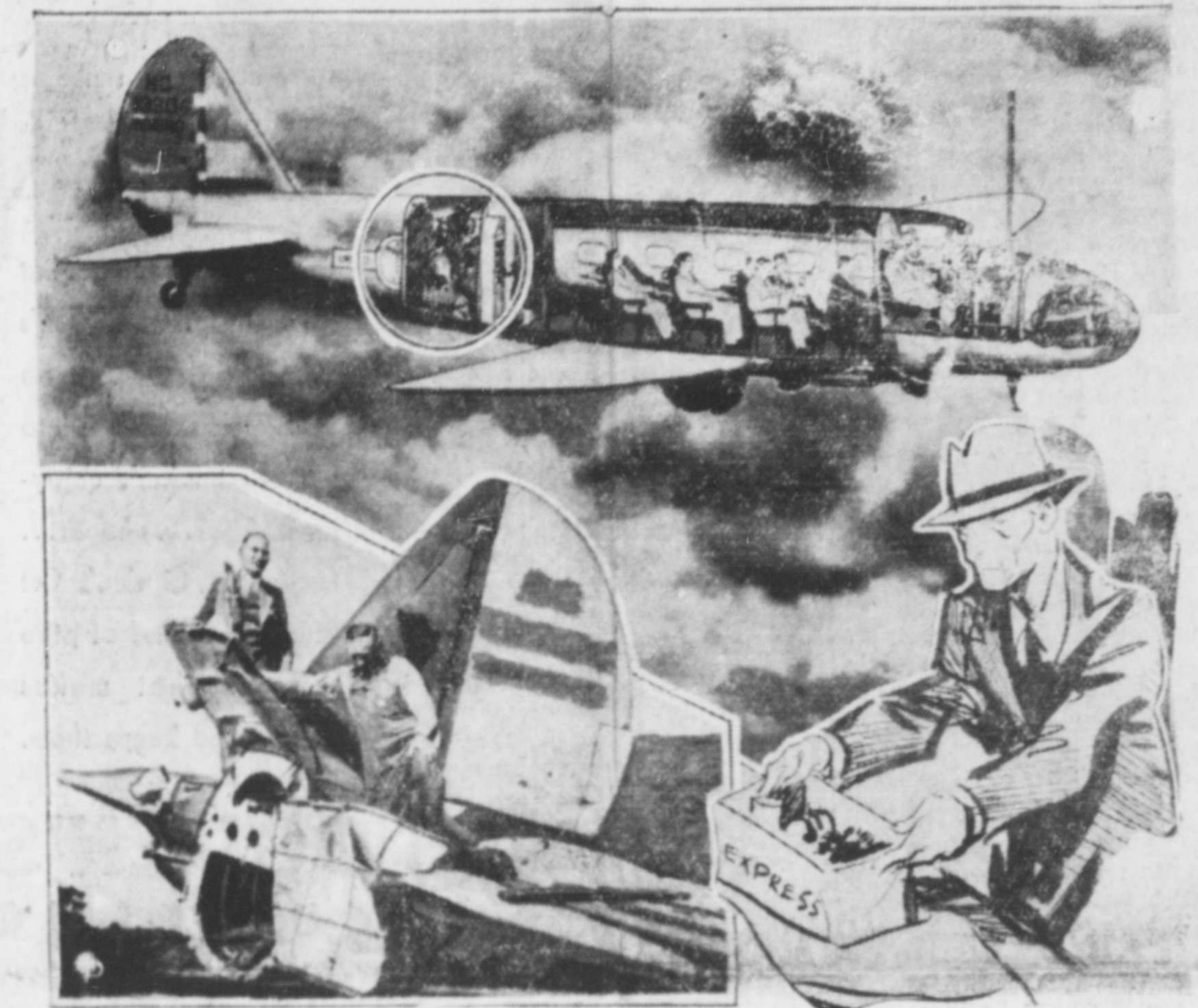

Believe Bomb May Have Killed Seven In Air Crash



Chemical tests of bits of wreckage from the air liner which crashed mysteriously near Chesterton, Ind., lead authorities to believe that a high explosive, not difficulty with the aeroplane, caused the disaster which killed seven persons. The tests were made in the Northwestern University Scientific Crime Detection Laboratory and chemists reported traces of nitro-glycerine. The fact that the aeroplane's tail was blown a mile from the scene of the wreck adds credence to the theory that a time bomb was cached in the cargo space of the aeroplane with express packages, as indicated by the parts in the top picture. The lower picture shows a number of the authorities examining the parts of the wreckage of the tail. Federal men are investigating the suggestion that the bomb was placed by a murderer who wanted to kill one of the seven in the plane, and believed a "perfect crime" could be effected by causing the disaster.

Payment On Account Obviates Necessity of Classing As Default

Out of Total Instalment of \$117,000,000 Due Next Month, \$7,500,000 is Being Paid—Negotiations Come to Conclusion Without Agreement

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 7: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced today that British war debt negotiations had ended without agreement but with the payment of \$7,500,000 by Great Britain on its December 15 instalment to be paid in United States currency in lieu of \$117,000,000 due on that date. The President announced that, in view of the part payment, he would not regard the British government as in default.

In an official statement, the President said that negotiations had concluded without prejudice to either country "until certain factors in the world situation, commercial and monetary, become more clarified."

Kergin, Independent Liberal, and T. W. Falconer, and H. W. M. Rolston trailing.

The engagement is unofficially announced in London dispatches of Miss Ishbel, eldest daughter of Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald, to Prof. King Gordon of a Montreal theological college. Prof. Gordon is the son of Rev. Dr. Charles W. Gordon, perhaps better known as Ralph Connor, the distinguished Canadian author.

The announcement of engagement of Miss MacDonald to Prof. Gordon is of particular interest in Central British Columbia. Prof. Gordon a few years ago having been United Church minister at Giscome, mill town in the Prince George district. Miss MacDonald visited Prince Rupert some years ago during a tour of Canada with her distinguished father and younger sisters.

Hon. Herbert Marler III in Tokyo But Condition Not Regarded As Serious
MONTREAL, Nov. 7: (CP)—Hon. Herbert M. Marler, Canadian minister to Japan, is suffering from pneumonia in Tokyo, according to word received by his son here. His condition is not regarded as serious. The crisis will probably be reached within three or four days.

DOLLAR AGAIN AT PAR

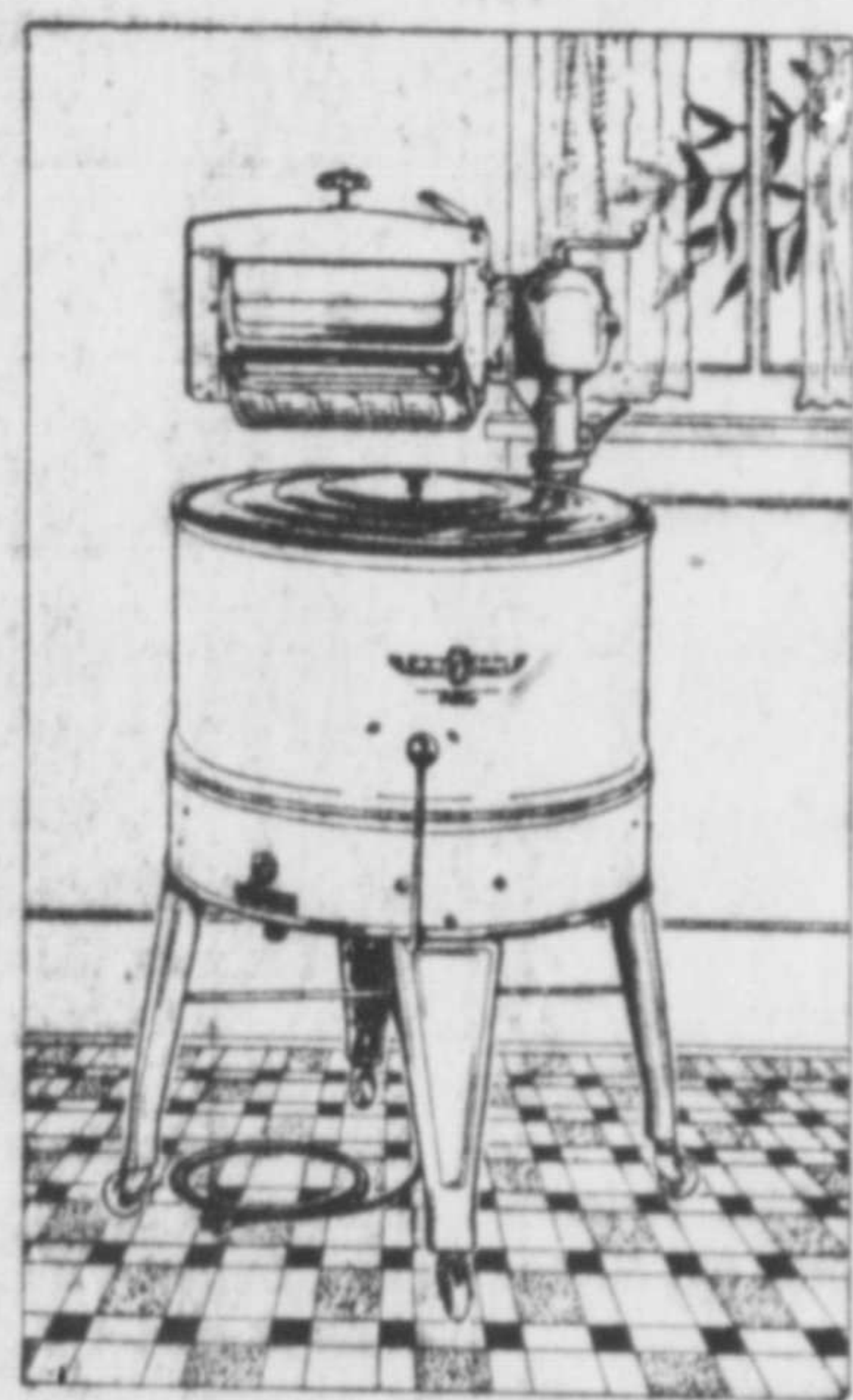

However, while not detracting from later work, there must be acknowledgement of the efforts of the pioneers who did the spade work, who blazed the trails—men who were supported by their faith and lured on by their hopes. 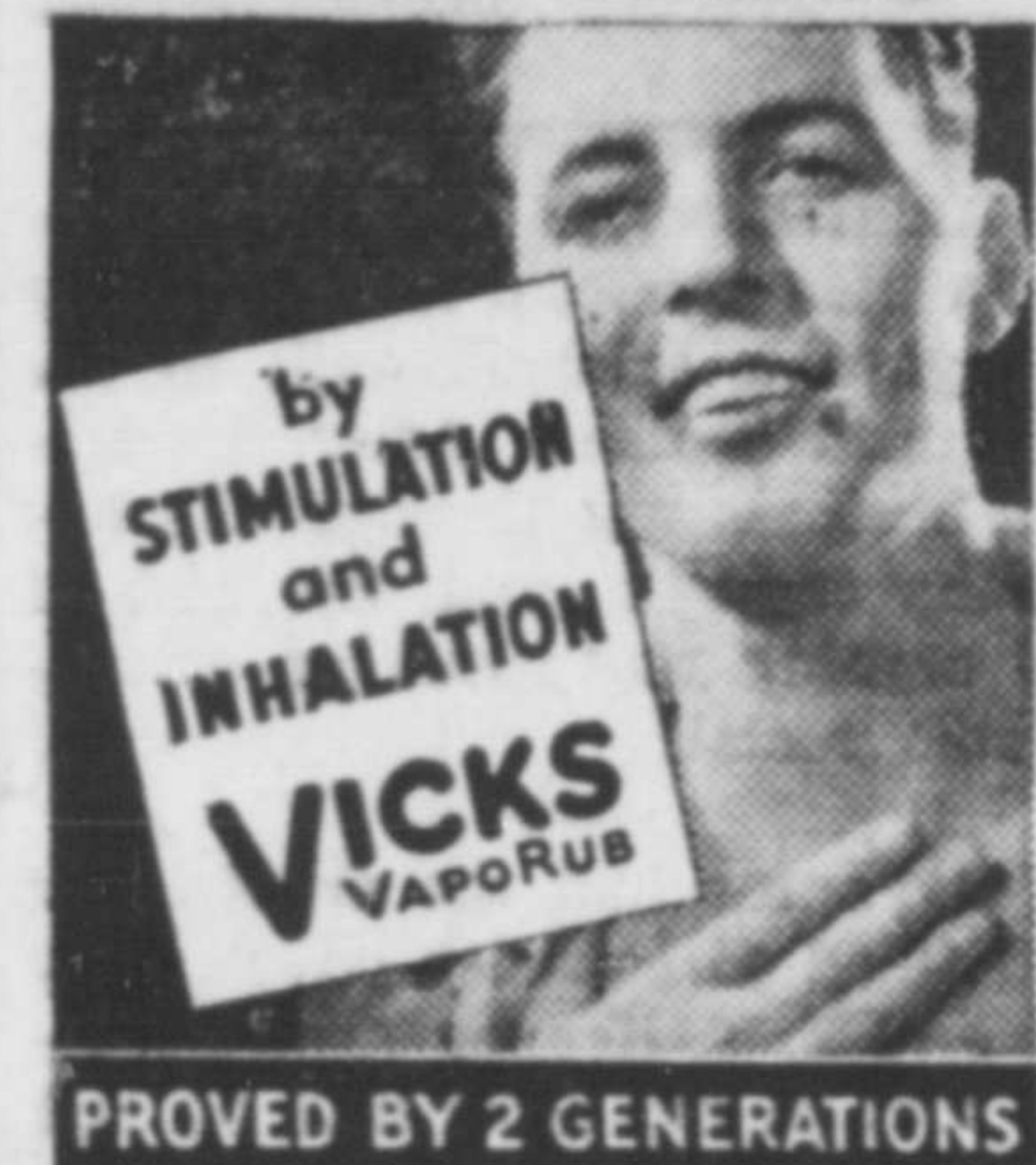
C. P. Ashmore, general manager of the Granby stores at Anyox, was a passenger aboard the Catala today going through to Vancouver on business.

VANDERHOOF DANCE WAS ENJOYABLE CALF SHOW

Hereford Calves of Stony Creek Indians Make Good Showing

VANDERHOOF, Nov. 7.—The calf show held this year at Vanderhoof did not quite measure up in number of calves and of spectators to the high standard set last year. T. G. Stewart of the Dominion Live Stock Branch again officiated as judge and, as usual, proved both instructive and interesting to those who were present.

Four grade Hereford calves brought in from the Stony Creek Reserve by the Indian Department were used by Mr. Stewart to illustrate the reasons for his decisions.

It was made very clear to the attentive audience why one calf would be worth more than another from a butcher's viewpoint.

While in the district, Mr. Stewart paid a visit to the Indian Reserve at Stony Creek and, as a result of his observations, commended very highly the policies being followed by the officials in charge of the Vanderhoof agency in improving the stock and land owned by the Indians. After some persuasion, the Indians agreed two years ago to have the big meadow ploughed and seeded down to red top. The results achieved have surpassed the hopes of those in charge. This year the yield of hay is in the neighborhood of three hundred tons and, at present, over two hundred head of stock are feeding on the aftermath which should provide feed for them until late in the year.

Stock Improved

A pure bred Hereford bull from the herd of D. Donald at Vanderhoof is herd sire and the improvement shown in the quality of the young stock over their dams is very marked. Several good mares were also noticed on the meadow. These are all in foal to the Clydesdale stallion purchased at the coast this spring by the Indian Department. The improvement in the quality of the horses should be as evident in the future as it is at present in the cattle.

A well recently bored in the village is still another big asset to the Indians. Formerly, water was secured from a creek and this undoubtedly was contaminated by the stock that walked continuously through it. The results achieved through the use of high quality pure bred sires and the adoption of intelligent methods of working the land provide an object lesson to many of the white settlers who look down on the methods followed by the Indians.
