

Amalgamation of Two **Big Steamship Lines** Near Accomplishment

Plans Being Considered For Completion of Giant New Vessel Now on Stocks, Giving Employment to 25,000 Persons in Shipyards

LONDON, Dec. 13: (CP)-Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain. Chancellor of the Exchequer, told the House of Commons today that negotiations for an effective merger of the Cunard and White Star North Atlantic fleet has reached a stage justifying the assumption that the amalgamation would be accomplished at an early date. Plans are being considered to complete the giant Cunarder "534" thus giving employment indirectly to 25,000 persons.

Chilliwack, Abbotsford and Sumas in Darkness With Power Lines Down

Seven Hundred Men at Work Endeavoring to Restore **Electric and Communication Wires Rendered** Useless by Heavy Rain and Blizzard

VANCOUVER, Dec. 13: (CP)—Fifty families in Sumas Prairie have been rendered homeless by floods following heavy rains. Chilliwack, Abbotsford and Sumas are without power as a result of the transmission lines having gone down in Monday night's blizzard.
