FOUR OFFER ESQUIMALT

Captain R. P. Matheson, President of the Board of Trade, Latest Candidate in Field

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—There is considerable opposition to Attorney General R. H. Pooley in Esquimalt constituency. The latest candidate to be announced there is Captain R. P. Matheson, president of the Esquimalt Board of Trade. He comes out as an independent. In that riding there are also announced Hon. R. H. Pooley, supporting Dr. Toimie; James Elrick, supporting W. J. Bowser, and C. E. Whitney Griffiths, the official Liberal.

Preparations For Election

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—Preparations for the election are being made at the government departments responsible for the taking of the vote in the battle of the ballots about to take place this fall. Activity is seen everywhere but so far Premier Toimie has kept his lips sealed in regard to the actual date.

Conditions in Island Have Been Steadily Growing Worse And Committee is Considering Possibility of President's Retiring

HAVANA, Aug. 10.—Conditions in Cuba have been growing steadily worse until it has been found necessary for the president to declare that a state of war exists and put the country under military rule. Popular opinion against the present regime seems to be growing.

The question whether President Machado shall resign his position to bring peace to the country now under a formally declared state of war as a result of the menace of revolution was today placed before the National executive committee of General Machado's Liberal party.

The trouble commenced with a strike of transportation and allied trades and gradually spread until rioting took place in which windows were broken, stores looted and rural guards had to be called out. Twenty thousand persons were directly affected by the strike and a larger number indirectly.

PINK RUN IS LARGE

About 120 to Boat Taken Yesterday on Skeena and 150 on Naas River—Sockeye Diminishing

Reports from the Skeena River in regard to yesterday's fishing were that boats were averaging 120 pinks but that the number of sockeye had fallen off to about eight to the boat.

The pink run continues good at the Naas River where the average to the boat is still given at 150 with about ten sockeye. Seiners off the Naas are also making pretty fair catches.

Cohoos are being taken on the trolling grounds in increasingly large numbers with a diminishing number of spring salmon. These fish are not expected to reach the Skeena River until late this month and there is some speculation as to what the demand for them will be if they come in any large numbers.

Bride 44 Times

Miss Kitty Allen, Fashion Model, Has Plenty of Experience With Bridal Bouquets

TORONTO, Aug. 10. (CP)—Miss Kitty Allen, noted fashion model of London, England, is taking up residence in this city, where she has relatives. Interviewed by The Star she said she had been 44 times a "bride." Although actually only married once in a marriage that, she says, will last all her life.

But, she is a model and 44 times now, Miss Allen has donned white satin and a flowing veil, clasped her arms around a shower bouquet in the traditional manner, and either modelled in person or posed for photographs to be used in advertisements.

PRICES ARE HIGHER IN THE SOUTH

Newspaper Discovers That Some Goods Have Advanced Fifty Percent Recently

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—Commodity prices have advanced and will continue to advance considerably, a survey of the situation in Victoria revealed to a representative of the morning newspaper here. Basic food and clothing prices already have risen, a news reporter discovered after interviewing big buyers along wholesale row and among the larger retail stores.

There are several causes for the advance, but the one that appears to have the greatest bearing on the situation is President Roosevelt's inflation policy, and his scheme of national industrial codes, which is raising wages, shortening hours and generally causing an upward revision in the cost of commodities and labor.

Flour Higher

Flour has jumped 50%, due chiefly to the rise in wheat on the Chicago and Winnipeg grain exchanges but more particularly in anticipation of production limitations brought about by international agreement. While the advance at present has been 50%, a bigger increase is anticipated as the 1932 wheat is depleted.

Sugar has jumped tremendously owing to the new sales tax imposed, and this has reacted on the price of canned goods has been the price that canners, during the past few months, have been selling at cost to dispose of last year's stock. The new stock is now coming into the market.

Canned Goods Up

A rise of 10% to 15% in the price of canned fruits is anticipated as the stock on hand is absorbed by the general public. Similarly an increase of 7% already has taken place in the price of jams.

Tea has increase in price 100% due to restrictions placed on production in Ceylon. Pickling of the leaves have been reduced, to keep the production under control, it was learned.

As a barometer for meat prices, it was pointed out that bacon had increased 50%. This, it was explained, augured a general rise in the entire meat range, but more particularly pork, which during the past few months has been selling as low as 8 and 10 cents a pound.

New Settlement Scheme For British Families Planned According to General Hornby

Support Secured of All Governments is Stated by Sponsor of Movement in London Who Would Establish Farming Communities

LONDON, Aug. 10. (CP)—Declaring his opinion in favor of resumption of immigration on a normal scale seems to be gaining ground throughout Canada, and asserting his plan has the broad support of the Dominion and provincial governments, Brig-General M. L. Hornby has circulated a new explanation of his plan for "British community settlements" in Canada.

The Hornby plan would send to the Dominion small communities of selected British families, established on areas of proven good mixed-farming land of 5,000 to 10,000 acres in extent, to be sponsored by the existing voluntary migration committees of the counties and towns in the United Kingdom.

Declaring Canada, by the establishment of so great transportation, educational and other services, has already made its share of any 50-50 financing, Brig-General Hornby proposes the United Kingdom make the necessary loans available to the county, city or town committees here at a low rate of interest.

The sponsor of the plan quotes from a letter sent by Hon. W. A. Gordon, Canadian minister of immigration, at the end of June, in which the minister said: "In my judgment there can be no two opinions as to the importance or desirability of furthering British settlement in Canada as rapidly as conditions will allow. I am interested in and sympathetic with any practical scheme which will encourage the successful transfer to and establishment in Canada of the right type of British settlers."

The Canadian provincial governments, too, he asserts, are favorable. "In the course of my recent visits to the capitals of Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario, and during my conference with the premiers and members of their cabinets," he says, "it was made clear to me the provincial authorities are warmly in favor of a large increase in the proportion of British immigration into Canada as soon as economic conditions warrant the admission of immigrants on a normal scale. The government of Ontario in particular sees no reason for any further delay."

Girl Murdered and Man in Precarious Condition Result of Suicide Pact

Evidence Given in Sensational Trail Case Which Indicated That Drinking Had Led to Crime There Yesterday

TRAIL, Aug. 10.—The whole city was stirred yesterday by news of a sensational crime in which a well known girl lost her life and a local businessman is in such a condition that he is not expected to live. The woman in the case was Betty Chilcott who was killed yesterday in the basement of Hunt's store. She came to her death from gunshot wounds caused by a gun in the hands of Sidney Hunt, the coroner's jury decided last night.

Hunt, who is 54 years of age, a merchant of Trail, is in a precarious condition from gunshot wounds believed to have been self-inflicted. The police express the belief that the affair was the result of a suicide pact.

Hunt said he shot the girl because she said she wished to die first. He said he was tired of life. His estranged wife lives in Vancouver.

Miss Chilcott came here from Ontario and had been once fined \$25 for drunkenness since coming here while both she and Hunt had been in an automobile accident which resulted in Hunt losing his driver's license.

Evidence at the inquest disclosed that there had been drinking Tuesday night and yesterday morning.

Work Proceeding On Jessie Mine in Smithers District

Good Results So Far Obtained From Work Done on Property Which is Close to Transportation

SMITHERS, Aug. 10.—All eyes are now on the Jessie mine, the enterprise which was started up through the co-operation of local people who had sufficient faith in its possibilities to put in several thousand dollars of their own money. Work is being continued there drifting on No. 3 vein, exploring the gold bearing quartz which was struck just before work was closed last year.

The work has been financed in the south where through the efforts of L. S. McGill the money was subscribed.

The property is close to transportation and the ore so far has been carrying gold values around twenty dollars a ton.

NAVY FLYERS WERE KILLED

Seaplane Crashed at Honolulu, Only One Man Escaping and He Was Injured

HONOLULU, Aug. 10.—Five flyers of the United States navy were killed in an accident yesterday. The sixth occupant of the plane was injured, when the twin motored seaplane crashed on its back a mile offshore after its tail surfaces had been stripped away.

The dead are Charles Hill, pilot, Lieutenant Marshall and three enlisted men.

BRITAIN IN SUPREMACY

Imperial Airways Forges Ahead of French In Profitable London-Paris Competition

LONDON, August 9.—Officially compiled tables of the working of Imperial Airways during the past five years provide interesting evidence of the steady advance of British air transport to the point where it will fly itself without any artificial support in the shape of government subsidy. Comparisons are given with the operational results obtained by French air transport concerns over the same period.

Statistics comparing the results achieved by the British company and by Air Union in direct competition over the London-Paris route are particularly important. They show the lead held by Imperial Airways in 1928 in the carriage of passengers and mails had been considerably reduced by 1931, and by that time Air Union had definitely gained the ascendancy in the carriage of goods.

But in 1932 the intensive working of the new-type aeroplanes on the British services—notably the Handley Page Type 42 biplanes—radically altered the situation. Between London and Paris the British company carried in 1932 no less than 98 percent more passengers than in 1931. Air Union passenger traffic increased by 15 percent and in the upshot the British concern more than regained the favorable position of 1928.

Both companies suffered a decline in the amounts of mails and good airborne—doubtless a reflection on the prevailing economic crisis—but the decrease was much less on the British side than on the French. Finally, in 1932, the Imperial Airways machines carried more passengers than did the aircraft of all the French air transport concerns put together.

Reflecting directly the "economic" value of the craft employed is the fact that in 1932 the British fleet required little more than one-fifth the amount of government subsidy absorbed by the French companies—£549,950 as against £1,000,000.

Furthermore in proportion of earned revenue to actual subsidy payments the British Company outshone its French contemporaries to the extent of 140 percent in spite of the heavy initial expenses involved in the opening of new airways outside Europe. There would seem little doubt as to which nation, given free and untrammelled opportunities for expansion, will be first to establish profit-earning, unsubsidized commercial flying.

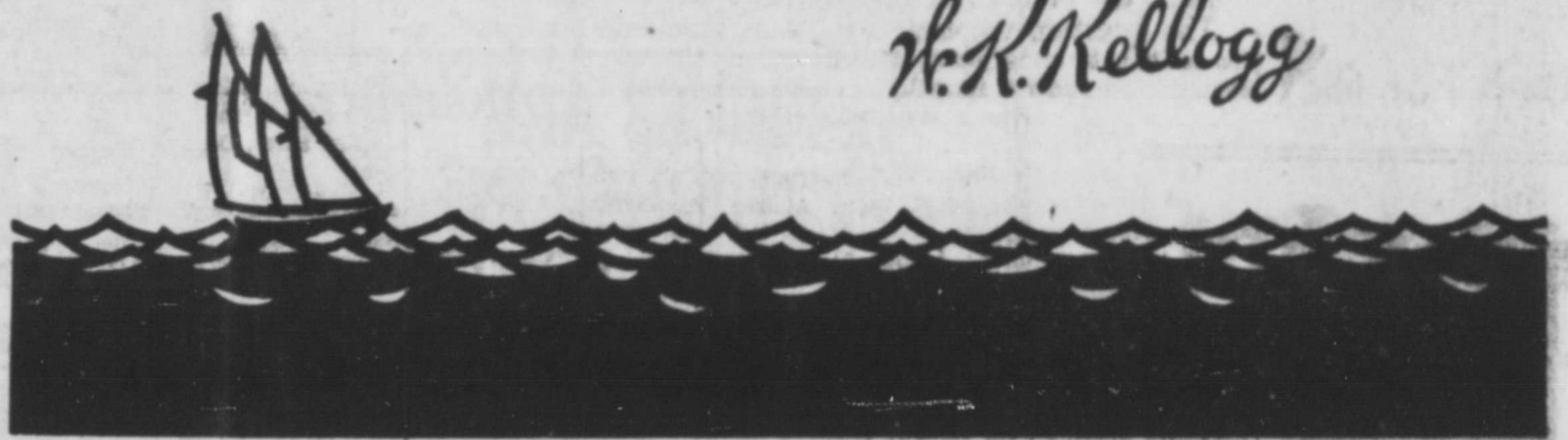

MARKETING INTERIOR PRODUCTS

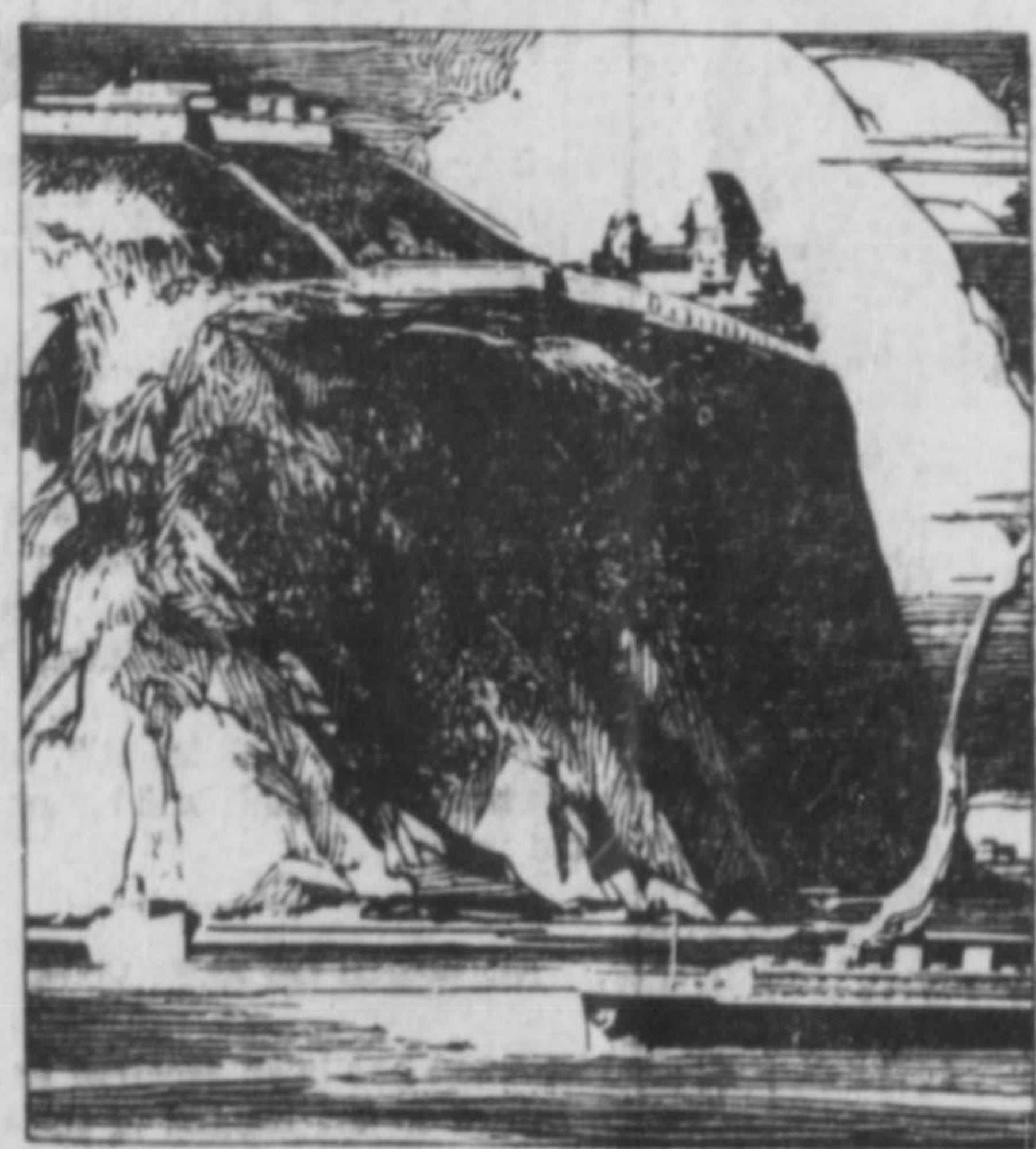

The offer is being carefully considered, according to information received from interior points. Whether the building is used for the purposes suggested or not, it seems likely that some more determined effort will be made soon to capture part of the Prince Rupert market for interior products.

EYES ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Real mining seems to be going on at the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands on Kootenay Harbor and also on Gold Harbor. At the former place development work of a most encouraging nature is being carried out and at the latter, the mine has reached a stage where a mill is being installed and very soon gold will be shipped. These are new developments and when taken along with the Porcher Island mining developments will prove a real asset to the Prince Rupert district.

A LEADER NEEDED

Smithers Convention Notes

Fight For Lower Rates on Autos—Two Federal Members Present Are Good Friends—Other Prominent People Among Delegates

(By G. A. Hunter)

SMITHERS, Aug. 10.—John Dybhavn, Prince Rupert delegate, told the Board of Trade convention here recently that the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce was carrying its fight for lower freight rates on carriage of automobiles on the railway between Prince Rupert and Hazelton direct to the Board of Railway Commissioners and that the matter would be pressed at a meeting of the commission to be held in Prince Rupert in the near future.

In vacating the chair following the election of officers, H. W. Smale, the retiring president from Fort Fraser, expressed appreciation of the harmony and co-operation that had existed during his term of office.

L. B. Warner, in assuming the presidency, expressed hope for continuation of the successful operation of the Associated Boards. Mr. Warner was vice-president of the Associated Boards last year.

At the start of the convention, Mr. Smale expressed disappointment that such little action had been obtained on fifteen resolutions which had been passed at last year's convention. He felt that the organization was entitled to more consideration than mere formal replies from ministers and government officials.

George Ogston of Vanderhoof defeated Sidney Godwin of Burns Lake in a contest for the secretary-treasuryship. Mr. Godwin was not present at the convention.

The auditors' report, presented by H. M. Mathews of Smithers, showed the Associated Boards had a balance of \$139.41 in the bank, revenue for the year having amounted to \$144.41. Only two member boards, Vanderhoof and Fort Fraser, had paid up their dues.

A formal vote of thanks was tendered the Smithers and District Board of Trade for its hospitality in connection with the annual convention.

A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring officers—H. W. Smale, Fort Fraser, president; L. B. Warner, Smithers, vice-president, and J. Falkner, Fort Fraser, secretary-treasurer for their work. The usual honorarium of \$75 was voted to the secretary-treasurer.

The resolutions committee, of which J. O. Wilson of Prince George was chairman, was tendered a vote of thanks on being discharged.

It had been expected that a provincial cabinet minister might have been present at the convention but Government Agent H. B. Campbell of Smithers was requested by Premier Tolmie to attend as official representative of the government.

Two federal members—Olof Hanson, Skeena, and John A. Fraser, Cariboo, were in attendance at all the convention business sessions and social functions and showed themselves, although political opponents, to be on the best of terms personally and were usually in each other's company. In fact, the camaraderie of Hanson and Fraser is well known in Ottawa as well as in the west. Sharing federal representation as they do the far flung expanses of central and northern British Columbia with so many allied interests, they are both enthusiastic exponents of the potentialities of their frontier constituencies and, often in the past, have found
