

Flowery Kingdom Quits Geneva Body on Final Approval of Emperor

Decision is Sent to Geneva After Being Made by Privy **Council—Will Continue Its Co-operation** In End of Peace

TOKYO, March 27:-Japan today formally ended membership of more than thirteen years in the League of Nations. The final action was taken by the Privy Council, meeting at the Imperial Palace, and the decision was sent to Geneva later today with the approval of Emperor Hirohito.

Despite her formal withdrawal, it was announced that Japan intends to continue co-operation with the League in efforts to assure peace and maintain friendly relations with other powers.
