POLITICAL CONFERENCE IN VICTORIA JAPAN FORMALLY WITHDRAWS FROM LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Flowery Kingdom Quits Geneva Body on Final Approval of Emperor

Decision is Sent to Geneva After Being Made by Privy Council—Will Continue Its Co-operation In End of Peace

TOKYO, March 27.—Japan today formally ended membership of more than thirteen years in the League of Nations. The final action was taken by the Privy Council, meeting at the Imperial Palace, and the decision was sent to Geneva later today with the approval of Emperor Hirohito.

Despite her formal withdrawal, it was announced that Japan intends to continue co-operation with the League in efforts to assure peace and maintain friendly relations with other powers.

New Trial For Tom Mooney in California, U.S.

SACRAMENTO, March 27.—Tom Mooney, who has served 16 years in the state prison, is to be granted a new trial. Several lawyers have already refused to prosecute.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—A round table conference is to be held here by oil operators with the idea of arranging for the control of production in order to control prices.

Gyro Book Campaign Ends With Total of 2,395 Volumes Donated To Prince Rupert Public Library

The library book campaign under auspices of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, concluded Saturday night with a total collection of 2,395 volumes. Out of these a number will have to be culled as not suitable for the library but there will remain a large proportion of good books which will prove a very valuable aid to the library.

The High School competition was not as successful as was expected but even there the addition of 251 books proved a nice help. The collection at Ormes depot from noon Saturday until closing time that day was 144 and 95 of these books were handed in at the collecting depot in the vacant store donated for the purpose by Dybavn and Hanson. This, added to 1905 previously acknowledged, made the grand total of 2,395.

CHURCH IS DESTROYED

Threat of Incendiarism in Montreal Has Speedy Sequel

MONTREAL, March 27.—Following quickly on an anonymous warning of incendiarism, the intended fire on Sunday morning destroyed St. Jacques Roman Catholic Church here while the morning services were in progress, causing an estimated damage between three hundred thousand and half a million dollars. A number of persons were injured including six firemen.

Three Canneries To Be Operated Again on Naas

Watson Noble, veteran storekeeper at the B. C. Packers' Mill Bay Cannery on the Naas River, was a passenger aboard the Cardena last evening bound north for the season after having spent the winter in Vancouver. George Harris, manager of Mill Bay cannery, and the cannery crew will be coming north next Sunday on the Catala. Some of the Japanese employees are already there.

Three canneries will again be operated in the Naas River area this season—the Anglo-British Columbia plant at Arrandale and the Canadian Fishing Co. at Wales Island in addition to Mill Bay.

Union Government Discussed by Pattullo, Pooley, Howe in Capital City Saturday Evening

Parley Was Arranged by Premier Tolmie—Liberal Leader Demands Negotiations in Writing—Developments Are Expected This Week

VICTORIA, March 27: (CP)—Premier S. F. Tolmie arranged a meeting on Saturday to discuss union government with T. D. Pattullo, Leader of the Liberal Opposition, and late that night Hon. R. H. Pooley, Attorney General, and Hon. S. L. Howe, Provincial Secretary, conferred with the Liberal leader. In a statement following, Mr. Pattullo said:

"We met as arranged and, preliminary to any representations that Mr. Pooley and Mr. Howe might make, I advised them that I had already been approached by the press for a statement and that it should be understood that any proposals they might make on behalf of Dr. Tolmie should later be put in writing to be replied to by me in writing so that no misunderstanding could arise and so that the public might know exactly what had occurred. No written proposals have yet been received by me."

Developments are expected early in the week.

OPPRESSION OF JEWS ENDS IN GERMANY

It is Officially Announced That Uncontrolled Nazis May Have Given Cause For Complaint

BERLIN, March 27.—There may have been cause for complaint at the action of some uncontrolled Nazis in connection with the change of administration in this country but now all that is at an end. This government will not persecute a man because he is a Jew and the communist prisoners admit that they have been well used. That was the statement made by a member of the Hitler administration at the week-end.

An invitation has been extended to the Jews of the United States to investigate charges of physical ill-treatment of Jews in this country.

CONSERVATIVES WILL NOT HOLD CONVENTION REGARD TO POLITICAL SITUATION

Executive of Association in Meeting Saturday Asks Tolmie to Announce Plans For Union Government Soon

VICTORIA, March 27: (CP)—The executive of the British Columbia Conservative Association, at a meeting Saturday, asked Premier Tolmie to announce his plan for a union government within fifteen days after prorogation of the present session. The executive will then hold a meeting in Vancouver and determine the attitude of the party.

ARE DEAD IN CRASH

Thirteen Persons in All Lose Lives In California

OAKLAND, Calif., March 27.—A Varney Speed Line transport plane from Los Angeles crashed into the home of Joseph Arisa at Hayward, killing the pilot, two passengers, a family of six and four friends, 13 in all, on Saturday night. The wreckage burst into flames destroying three homes.

KILLED IN EXPLOSION

GATESHEAD, Durban, England, March 27: (CP)—Bodies were hurled into the air and several buildings wrecked here today by an explosion which killed six persons and severely injured 15 others. Workmen were excavating part of the roadway and many persons were standing by watching them when suddenly a brilliant flash was followed by a terrific explosion that hurled watchers in all directions.

FISH PRICE LOW TODAY

Twenty Boats in With 200,000 Pounds This Morning

With over 200,000 pounds of halibut in, the prices still stayed at the low levels of the past week on the local Fish Exchange this morning, 4.8c and 2c being the highest paid to Canadian boats and 5.8c and 3c to American boats. The American boat the Yakutat, with 30,000 pounds, refused an offer of 4.9c and 2c and left with her catch for Seattle. Following were the sales on the exchange this morning:

Report of Pattullo-Tolmie Alliance in Political Field Is Gaining Ground in South

VICTORIA, March 27.—The rumor of an alliance between the personal followers of Premier Tolmie, who form an important bloc of the Conservative party which has been split open by the entrance into the provincial election field of Former Premier W. J. Bowser as leader of the so-called "coalition" party, and T. D. Pattullo, Leader of the Liberal Opposition and member of the Legislature for Prince Rupert, is gaining ground. There have been a number of developments recently inside and outside the Legislature which tend to lend significance to the mooted rumor. Any such development would, it is conceded by political observers, involve Mr. Pattullo becoming active leader of the new alliance and the appointment of Premier Tolmie as Agent-General at London, a post which it is stated by his close friends, the Premier has already intimated his willingness to accept.


Mr. Pattullo has let it be known many times that he will not sacrifice Liberal principles for the sake of getting into power. At the same time, it is said here that he recognizes the gravity of the situation and would be willing to work with any group to bring about a better condition of affairs as long as he does not in doing so sully himself and his supporters. While the Bowser movement is not being received with very kindly feelings by the rank and file of the voters who do not forget 1916 and its pork barrel and log rolling methods, the general opinion of observers is that, ere the election is held this summer, some new and interesting alliances may be seen in the election field and that further groups may play an important part in the contest.



Jack Lindsay Winner of First Prize in Contest





DIES IN VICTORIA

George McIlmoyle of This City Loses His Father at Grand Old Age of Ninety-Three

Mr. McIlmoyle being the father of nine children—three daughters and six sons. He was predeceased many years ago by his wife.
