Vote With Almost Four-Fifths of Precincts Accounted For Stands 316,064 to 193,359 Against Continuing National Prohibition Law

SEATTLE, Aug. 30: (CP)—Washington yesterday became the twenty-fourth state of the Union to join the unbroken procession towards repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. Latest returns from Tuesday's voting accounting for 1924 of the state's 2682 precincts showed 316,064 wet ballots to 193,359 dry. There is believed to be no possibility of the precincts which have not as yet reported changing the general result.


