Daring Robbery on Fourth Avenue At Alma Road in Vancouver

On entering the bank, the bandits demanded that the staff, consisting of J. B. Barnum, manager, George Coombe, cashier, and C. W. Harrison, clerk, enter the strongroom. The staff refused to meet with the demand, declaring they could not orr the vault.


