British Columbia Association Decides Not To Participate in Approaching General Election

Not Afraid of Future

Local Tory Organizations to be Allowed to Support Union Candidates or Nominate Straight Party Men as They Desire, it is Announced

VANCOUVER, April 24: (Canadian Press)—The British Columbia Conservative Association late Saturday reached the decision to take no part in the next provincial election campaign but will allow its local organizations to support union government candidates or to nominate Conservative candidates as they desire. The main effect of this decision is to withdraw official central support in the campaign to the local ridings, leaving the executives in each an entirely free hand to act as they see fit in connection with the contest.

LOST LIFE IN SKEENA

Louis Lockerby, Young Indian, Drowned on Saturday When Trying to Capture Swimming Deer

Louis Lockerby, 20-year old Port Essington Indian, lost his life by drowning from a rowboat in the Skeena River just above Essington late Saturday afternoon, according to word reaching the city over the week-end. With another young Indian, David McLean, Lockerby was out rowing when it is understood they saw a deer swimming in the river. They endeavored to capture the animal and, in the attempt, the rowboat was upset and Lockerby was drowned.

After report of the fatality had been received at district headquarters here, provincial police officers were dispatched to Port Essington to investigate the circumstances and drag for the body which, up to this afternoon, had not been recovered.

Broke His Leg in Fall; Is Also Fined For Trespassing

Lewis Willick of Dawson Creek has been sentenced to thirty days' imprisonment on a charge of trespassing on railway property, according to report received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. Willick, it is alleged, became intoxicated and boarded a railway engine in the yard, falling and breaking his leg.

Youth for Whom Ransom Was Demanded Comes to His Death Near Capital

Police Working on Three Theories—May Have Been Suicide, Might Have Fallen From Embankment or Been Thrown Out of Car

VICTORIA, April 24: (Canadian Press)—Positively identified as being that of Stewart Ashley, missing 19-year old Vancouver substitute teacher, a body was pulled out of the slough on Industrial Reserve yesterday. It has cleared up the disappearance of the young man but the cause of death is, as yet, undetermined. Police say it may have been suicide or, alternatively, Ashley could have been walking on the track and tumbled down the embankment or could have been thrown from a motor car while coming from Esquimalt into the city.

CONFERENCE CONTINUING

Further Progress Reported to Have Been Made by Roosevelt and MacDonald in Their Conversations

Herriot Arrives

Premier Daladier of France Intimates Desire of That Country to Co-operate

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 24:—Further definite progress in the endeavor of Great Britain and United States to reach a formula for the solution of world economic problems in preparation for the world economic conference to be held in London in June was reported last night to have been made as a result of the conversations between President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States and Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain which were continued yesterday. Almost throughout the day, President Roosevelt and Premier MacDonald, surrounded by financial and economic technicians, were in session at the White House.

Former Premier Edouard Herriot of France arrived in the capital last night to participate in the conversations. Co-incident with his arrival, Premier Daladier issued a statement in Paris, saying that France would join in and co-operate as far as possible in every effort to restore world commodity prices and international prosperity.

According to a despatch received from Vancouver, the members of the Conservative executive cannot agree on the question of leadership so they have thrown up their hands, so far as the coming election is concerned.

IN THE LETTER BOX

COMMENT ON PATTULLO'S ADDRESS

Editor, Daily News:-

I would like to comment briefly on the suggestion made by T. D. Pattullo in regard to the creation of an economic council in B. C. The time has arrived when the direction of the main industries of the country must comply with the necessities of national economy and not be left to the absolute discretion of the individual.

The present struggle is between extreme individualism or free competition, on one hand, and solidarity of production, on the other. The lack of co-operation between all the forces of production and distribution bring about chaos and unemployment.

The direction of enterprise must be subordinated to a national advisory board of experts, selected from the best men of the different branches of production, exchange and finance, so as to avoid abuses, duplication, ill-considered planning, speculation at public expense and waste.

Mr. Editor, we must realize that the fundamental wrong is excessive individualism and lack of co-operation.

A new social organization is necessary to meet the new situation. The creation of a national council of economy is merely one of the necessary steps towards the new

government requirements to adjust future economic relations.

The next important plank is the one to adjust the rate of interest on money in keeping with the present condition so as to enable the taxpayers to carry on. This is a very important measure as it is utterly impossible for the public to meet the excessive rate of interest of 6% and 7%.

Mr. Pattullo pledges his administration to mobilize the credit of the nation to provide work at a fair wage. This should meet the endorsement of every citizen because work is the only thing that will break the vicious circle of unemployment and restore normal economic conditions.

R. D. Gregor, assistant district forester, is at present on a trip to the Smithers district on official business.

G. W. Laidler, local manager of the W. H. Malkin Co. Ltd., sailed last evening on the Catala to make the round trip to Anyox and Stewart on company business.

Rev. William Burton, United Church missionary at Kitimaat, and Mrs. Burton were here Saturday afternoon aboard the steamer Cardena going through for a trip to Vancouver.

W. C. Cowell of the Canadian immigration department arrived in the city on the Princess Norah this morning from Vancouver. He is here on business in connection with deportation proceedings here.

Ole Rollag, who has been spending the past several months in the Liard River district in the employ of the Berner mining syndicate of this city, returned here last weekend, having come out via the Peace River and Edmonton.

There were 85 passengers aboard the steamer Princess Norah which was in port this morning north-bound from Vancouver to Skagway. Four passengers left the vessel here while three embarked on board her here for the north.

Following the decision of the Mine Workers' Union of Canada to call off the Anyox "strike," a number of former employees of the Giasby Co. left here last night on the Catala with a view to resuming work at the smelter town.

Having been delayed by having heavy freights to discharge at waypoints, Union steamer Catala, Captain A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 9 o'clock last night from the south, sailing an hour or so later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning and sail at 1:30 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Having on board a large number of northerners going into Northern British Columbia and the Yukon for the season, C. P. R. steamer Norah, Capt. Albert Rippon, arrived in port at 9:45 this morning from Vancouver and sailed at 12 noon for Skagway and other Alaska points on regular schedule. The vessel had 85 passengers on board. Four persons disembarked here from the vessel while three went north aboard her.

The number of migrant birds going north is steadily increasing. Yesterday among those seen in the city were robins, varied thrushes, whistling thrushes, juncos, song sparrows, white crow sparrows, golden crown sparrows, Townsend's sparrows and blue jays. So far none of the finches or other seed-eating birds seem to have shown up. Last night at about eleven o'clock one resident had four birds strike the window, attracted by the light within. One of the birds, a Townsend's sparrow, was taken inside and examined and then liberated.
