Completed Hop From Fairbanks Successfully During Night-Expects to Reach New York By Midnight Eastern Standard Time

EDMONTON, July 22: (Canadian Press)-Wiley Post, United States round the world flyer, landed here at 6:14 this morning, nine hours and twenty minutes after leaving Fairbanks last night, and took off again for New York at 7:41 a.m. He had a good tail wind as he roared down the runway on the take-off and hoped, on leaving, to be in
