IMPORTANT CHANGES IN LIQUOR REGULATIONS FORECAST

Seventy-Three Men Are Believed Conservatives Dead As Result of Destruction Of Giant United States Airship

NEW YORK, April 4: (CP)—Seventy-three men are believed dead as a result of the destruction of the giant United States naval dirigible Akron, queen of the world's airships, at about 12:30 this morning in a lightning storm off the Jersey coast about twenty miles from Barnegat Light and approximately forty-five miles from New York Harbor. Four men, one of whom later died, were picked up by the Danzig Free State tanker Phoebus which answered an "S.O.S." call.

Among those lost are Admiral William A. Moffett, chief of the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics and the ship's commander, Commander F. C. McCord. Lieut. Commander H. V. Wiley and two enlisted men are the only known

Efforts were made to right her by dropping ballast but finally the rudder control was carried away and the descent continued to the water where the ship was demollished in the impact. rson, Former School Inspector Here, Succumbs to Heart Attack

for Saanich near Victoria, succumbed suddenly to heart failure on Wednesday afternoon of last week while paying a visit of inspection to the Saanichton school. Mr. Paterson, who left Prince Rupert some twelve years ago, was inspector of schools at Nanaimo before taking up his appointment at Saamich. The funeral took place in Victoria.

Mr. Paterson was born in Ontario 53 years ago and graduated with a B. A. degree in political science. After a short experience with the Southam Press he commenced his rareer as an educationalist at Guelph, and in 1911 came west to Revelstoke where he taught for four

In 1915 Mr. Paterson became a teacher in the Esquimalt public school and shortly afterwards was active in setting up the municipal

He became an inspector of schools in 1919, when he was assigned to duty at Prince Rupert, being transferred to Nanaimo the following wear. He left the Nanaimo district inspectorate to assume the position of municipal inspector in Saanich. 
