

### COLOR IS NEEDED

Now that the season is advancing and those planning flower gardens this year are looking over their seed catalogues and arranging how they shall lay out the garden and what they shall plant, it is well to remember that in a place like Prince Rupert with its surroundings and climate, bright colors are very desirable. A dash of vellow, scarlet, red-any shade in fact that shows up brightly and gives a touch of color to the generally rather drab landscape is like an oasis in the desert.

Those who have not yet considered the question of a garden this year would do well to commence work on it soon. It is always a good plan to get the rough work done as early as possible in order that more time may be given to detail

later.

### SEVEN MILLION DEFICIT

The deficit of seven million dollars for the year ending last March is a huge one for the Province of British Columbia. It means that a large loan will have to be floated to cover the expenditure and this will be a burden on future administrations for the interest and sinking fund will have to be provided each year. Such a huge deficit is a rather severe blow at the credit of the country.

### UNITY FOR ONCE

For once at least in the history of the country all parties in the Dominion House were at one in supporting the League of Nations delegate at Geneva when he voted with the committee of nineteen in condemnation of the Japanese policy in Manchuria. There was a slight qualification in Mr. Woodsworth's support but it was given.

It seems a pity that there cannot oftener be unanimity in regard to great questions. Discussion of details is bound to bring about differences but when great principles are at stake there is no good reason why the opposition should always oppose everything.


