## CONFERENCE SAVED FROM WRECKING

### IMPORTANT CHANGE IN SCHOOL POLICY IS ANNOUNCED

#### Agreement Is Reached Between France and United States To Postpone Stabilization Talk

Fresh Instructions Being Sent by Special Emissary From President Roosevelt to American Delegation—Reduction of World Wheat Production to Be Taken Up

LONDON, June 22: (Canadian Press)—The United States delegation to the world economic conference said in a statement today that the United States government feels that currency stabilization now would be untimely and possibly would "cause a violent price recession" to the detriment of the conference. Simultaneously with the publication of the statement, it was authoritatively said that the conference had been saved from foundering on the stabilization issue as a result of an agreement between French and United States representatives to postpone discussion of the question until later.

#### MONTAGU CONVICTED

British Peer and His Companion Found Guilty by Victoria Magistrate on Charges of Assault

VICTORIA, June 22 (Canadian Press)—Lord Edward Montagu was found guilty of common assault on the person of John Forbes and was fined \$90 and \$7 costs, with option of ten days' imprisonment, by Magistrate George H. Ay in police court here yesterday. C. W. Brooks, co-defendant with Lord Montagu, was found guilty of assault causing grievous bodily harm and was fined \$40 and \$7 costs, with one month's option.

The magistrate commented that both Lord Montagu and Brooks were responsible for the helpless, drunken condition of Forbes and the conduct of both was reprehensible. There was no doubt that Lord Montagu had lost his temper and that Brooks had used unnecessary violence considering Forbes' condition and the two blows that Brooks had struck were unjust. Lord Montagu paid his fine last evening but Brooks remained in jail.

#### Nationalists Are Raided

BERLIN, June 22.—In order to further strengthen his own position, Chancellor Adolf Hitler yesterday ordered Nazi officers to occupy offices of the Nationalist party and take possession of same with all their contents. The order was immediately acted upon. A round-up of Nationalist leaders has also been undertaken by the government to insure allegiance to Chancellor Hitler.

#### Search For Victims Of Skeena Drowning Tragedy Continues

Search for the bodies of three victims of Sunday night's drowning tragedy in the Skeena River at Copper City near Terrace is being continued. Halibut hooks and other additional gear were sent to the interior Wednesday night to be used in the dragging operations which, as far as could be learned, had been still unsuccessful up to this afternoon.

#### Children Under Seven Not To Be Admitted in Future; Charge Over 16

Staffs of Local Educational Institutions Being Reduced and Wages Cut—Westview Closed and Only One Teacher at Seal Cove

Important changes in local school policy designed in the interests of economy were announced in a statement today by City Commissioner W. J. Alder. The commissioner announced that, after the present term, children under the age of seven years would not be admitted to any of the city schools while boys and girls sixteen years and over, whether in public or high school, would be required to pay \$50 per year for tuition except those who were unable to pay and who showed unusual proficiency in which cases scholarships might be granted on the recommendation of the principals concerned.

#### WAGE CUT IS FACED

Clerical Employees of C.N.R. Face Reduction on July 1—To Postpone U.S. Reduction

MONTREAL, June 22 (Canadian Press)—Clerical and other employees in the same class on the Canadian National Railways face a reduction in pay on July 1 of ten percent from the basic rates, making a total cut within the past two years of twenty percent.

Fifteen thousand persons are affected by the latest wage cut, classes including stenographers, accountants, office boys, filing clerks, etc., passenger station help, freight shed workers round house and car shop employees and yard store departments.

A new ten percent pay cut affecting 35,000 shopmen on the Canadian National Railways will be put into effect on July 16, officials and company heads stated here today.

**Reduction Postponed**  
NEW YORK, June 22.—It was intimated here yesterday that the ten percent wage cut on several important American railway lines which was recently announced would probably be postponed and the present arrangement extended until May 1933 by which time it is hoped improved general conditions may obviate the necessity of making the reduction at all.

#### Noted Expert is Engaged in Case

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 22.—The defence announced yesterday that Prof. Heinrich, noted criminologist, had been retained in the case in which David A. Lamson of this city is charged with the murder of his young wife and it was expected that expert evidence to be adduced from him would prove the innocence of accused who is alleged to have slain his wife with a piece of iron pipe in the bath tub of their home.

#### DEPOSITS INCREASE

United States Banks Received \$224,000,000 More During Past Week, It Is Announced

NEW YORK, June 22.—As a result of recently enacted new banking legislation it is believed, bank deposits in the United States increased by \$224,000,000 during the past week, it was announced in banking circles here yesterday.

#### ASKING FOR EXTRA MAIL

At Present Four Trains a Week Each Way But Only Three Carry Letters For Post Office

The unsatisfactory condition of His Majesty's mails under the new train service is being drawn to the attention of the Post Office Department at Ottawa by the Chamber of Commerce which asks that, as there are four trains a week in and out of Prince Rupert, there shall be also four mails each way.

Mails now arrive in Prince Rupert Mondays and Saturdays at 2:15 p.m. and Thursdays at 10:20 p.m. The mixed train arriving Tuesday at 10:20 p.m. does not bring mail.

Outbound mails leave Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 9:30 p.m. but the Saturday night train does not carry mail. It is asked that the outbound and inbound trains which do not at present carry mail shall give a baggage-car service, at least, to serve local points.

#### INDUSTRIALS WERE STRONG

Rails Also Firm But Utilities Weak In Yesterday's Trading on New York Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, June 22.—Strength of a number of individual industrial issues featured yesterday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange. Rails were also firm but utilities displayed weakness.

Industrials closed at an average of 95.91, up .68; rails at 44.39, up .17, and utilities at 34.95, off .03.

#### SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MART

NEW YORK, June 22: (Canadian Press)—Bar silver closed at 35c per ounce on the local metal market today. Copper remained steady at 36c.

#### DAYLIGHT TIME OFF

City of Wenatchee and Chelan County Announce They Are Returning to Standard

WENATCHEE, Wash., June 22.—Mayor John Mooney announced yesterday that the city of Wenatchee will abandon daylight saving and go back to regular time on Monday next.

No matter what the city might do, it had been previously announced that Chelan County had abandoned daylight saving and its offices would be so governed.

#### UNITED STATES GRAIN CROP FOR YEAR LOWEST SINCE 1894, ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 22.—United States Department of Commerce statistics made public yesterday estimate the 1933 grain crop of this country at 525,000,000 bushels, the smallest since 1894 and 150,000,000 bushels below domestic requirements. Against this, however, must be considered a carryover of 264,000,000 bushels from last year which still leaves the country with a surplus.

Such was the result of a showdown which France and the central European bloc has been seeking for the past few days in regard to stabilization of the United States dollar and the British pound sterling. France had been insisting that such stabilization be brought about while United States had been equally insistent that it was not practicable at this time.

It was made clear in high government circles at Washington that the United States administration was disposed to postpone further discussion of monetary stabilization until domestic prices have climbed to a higher level with the aid of the President's economic recovery program.

Lack of unity among members of the United States delegation has been continuing to delay the work of the conference. It was announced last night that Assistant Secretary of State Moley had just been sent from New York with fresh instructions from President Franklin D. Roosevelt to be conveyed to the delegation.

**Turks Heard From**  
The Turkish delegation to the conference yesterday proposed the gradual abolition of bi-lateral agreements, of quota measures, abnormal prohibitions and exceptional restrictions of export bounties, taking the financial and economic equilibrium of each nation into account.

The Wednesday edition of the London Daily Telegraph said that it had been informed that the world economic conference will begin immediate discussion of a plan for reducing the world's wheat output by fifteen percent and absorbing the total carryover in a two-year period.

**War Debt Conference**  
It is understood here that, if the world economic conference is concluded by the end of July, Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, will go to Washington to discuss war debt settlement with President Roosevelt.

#### MITCHELL IS FREED

Former Chairman of National City Bank Acquitted on Tax Charges

NEW YORK, June 22: (Canadian Press)—Charles E. Mitchell, former chairman of the board of directors of the National City Bank, was acquitted by the jury today on all counts in an indictment charging him with income tax evasion.

NEW YORK, June 22.—Having failed after several hours deliberation to reach a verdict, the jury in the case of Charles E. Mitchell, former chairman of the National City Bank, who is charged with evading the federal income tax law, was last night ordered locked up for the night.

#### Lieut. Governor Of Washington Is Garnisheed

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 22.—After presiding over the session of the State Senate which removed the prohibition on employees of the state of Washington being garnisheed for debt, Vic Myers, colorful orchestra leader-lieutenant governor of the state, was the first to be made a defendant under the new legislation, a Seattle men's furnishings firm entering suit against him for \$64.

#### Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, June 22.—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.18 1/2, on the local foreign exchange yesterday. The Canadian dollar closed at 90.1-3c.

#### HONOR FOR PRESIDENT

Capt. Ben Pine Heads Gloucester Fishermen in Making Presentation to Executive

GLOUCESTER, Mass., June 22.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt spent yesterday here in the course of his holiday cruise along the New England coast in the sailing yacht Amber Jack II.

In addition to attending to certain official business, President Roosevelt during the day received a delegation of Gloucester fishermen, headed by Capt. Ben Pine, skipper of the famous racing schooner Gertrude L. Thebaud, and was presented with a handsome painting of the schooner as a memento.

The chief executive left last night in continuation of his northward voyage which will take him to Portland, Maine, tomorrow and Campobello, New Brunswick, where his mother has a summer home, for the week-end.

#### ISSUE IS IN DOUBT

Question of Stabilization Threatens To Make or Break Economic Conference

LONDON, June 22.—The question of stabilization of the United States dollar and the British pound sterling was still the vital issue at the closing of yesterday's session of the world economic conference here. Within the next day or so, it was expected, adjustment or otherwise of this matter would mean the success or wrecking of the conference. Meanwhile, desperate efforts were being made by conference leaders to save the momentous parley from failure.

## WORK HERE SUCCESSFUL

Oxford Group Head Departs Grati- fied by Experiences in Canadian Tour

NEW YORK, June 22: (CP)—The work of the Oxford Group in Canada has been highly successful, declared Dr. Frank N. D. Buchman, rotund, bespectacled leader of the modern religious movement, as he sailed for the United Kingdom after six months' work in Canada and the United States. Dr. Buchman indicated, nevertheless, he had no intention of diminishing his drive for converts.

The Rev. Dr. George Pidgeon, first moderator of the United Church of Canada, said this demonstration marked the greatest spiritual awakening in the history of Canada. Dr. Buchman said, "Premier J. E. Brownlee of Alberta remarked he had never seen anything like it even at election time. He said the enthusiasm went way ahead of elections and that it showed people were awakening to find the answer to the unrest and depression in the world today."

Dr. Buchman was optimistic about Vancouver where, he said, a great religious revival had occurred, with thousands turned away from the Oxford Group's meetings, and every church in the city crowded to the doors.

"At one house party in Canada," the group leader declared, "a Conservative and a Liberal both spoke and remarked that it was the first time they had ever stood on any platform side by side. Well, there's your answer to coalition government. Let God control it. Liberals and Conservatives will get together when a new quality of life binds them."

Dr. Buchman sailed on the Berengaria to act as master of ceremonies at a house party at Oxford, for which he already has received 1,600 acceptances, some of them from delegates to the London Eco-

## SALES TAX POPULAR

So Says William Randolph Hearst in United States

NEW YORK, June 22: (CP)—Canada's sales tax is hailed as "painless" and "immensely popular" by William Randolph Hearst, who is conducting a campaign for a similar tax in the United States. Editorials praising Canadian taxation methods appear almost daily in Mr. Hearst's string of newspapers and frequent cartoons depict the easy path the American publisher believes Canadian taxpayers have to tread.

One cartoon shows John Canuck riding along the open highway in an up-to-date truck with the Canadian budget, heavy as it is, in no way straining the resources of the sturdy vehicle which represents the Canadian sales tax. Alongside runs Uncle Sam in his old flivver, "Antiquated Income Tax," heavily burdened by the lop-sided United States budget.

The New York American, one of the Hearst chain, quotes "America's foremost authority on taxation," the late Thomas S. Adams of Yale University, as saying after a thorough investigation of the Canadian tax: "By reason of the general set-up of the tax the consumer never knows he is paying the tax."

Addressing the ways and means committee of the United States Adams said: "I have no doubt that, if you provide in the tax law for the same administrative celerity and elasticity found in the Canadian law, a tax on the Canadian model would be absolutely practicable for the United States and would produce large revenue."

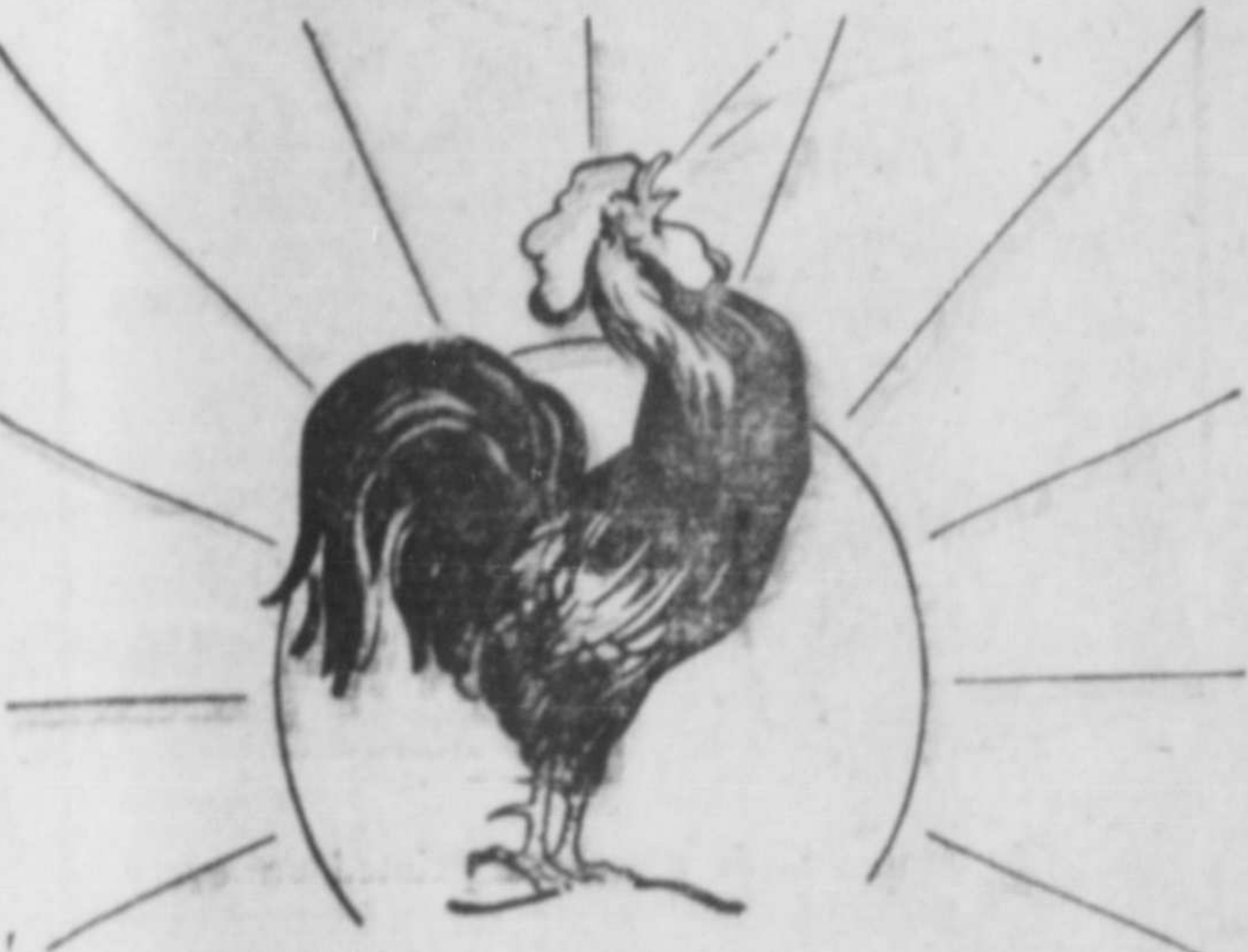

### HAWAII TO FAR NORTH

Interesting Party of Thirteen Boys Here Yesterday Aboard SS. Prince George

An Hawaiian-Alaskan Expedition party of boys, the most of whom are from Honolulu, passed through the city aboard the steamer Prince George yesterday enroute north on a two months' trip to Alaska and the Yukon. The party was under the leadership of two young men, Bayne Beauchamp of Honolulu and J. B. Sturgess of Los Angeles, and consisted, besides these two, of eleven lads between the ages of fourteen and nineteen years. They expect the entire trip will take about two months' time.

Crossing from Honolulu in the liner Monowai, the party of boy from Hawaii landed at Vancouver on June 16. From Skagway they proceed to Whitehorse by rail and from there will travel 1600 miles down the Yukon River and up to the Nenana River to Tanana in four rowboats one of which will be equipped with an outboard motor, the other three being oar-propelled. Two of the river boats are already at Whitehorse, having been used by a similar party last year, and the other two will be built before the party starts off down the Yukon.

From Tanana, the boys will travel by motor stage to Valdez where they will embark by an American steamer for Seattle whence they will proceed in cars to San Francisco where they will embark for home after their memorable trip on the liner Malolo.

In addition to Messrs. Beauchamp and Sturgess, the party consists of Bill Dunbar, Gilmer Shingle, Benny Kneubuhl, George Schnack, Harold Schnack, Arthur Waal, Gerald Greenwell, Ted Grounds, Jack Dyer and Gartley Wilson, of Honolulu and Dallas Beachamp of Glendale, Cal.

### Violent Language In British Films is Now Being Banned

LONDON, June 22: (CP)—Violent language, with the use of such words as "damn" and "blast," is to be banned in future from the films made by the British and Dominion Company. The "provinces" are responsible for this decision.

"When my film, 'The Little Damsel,' was shown in Leeds," Herbert Wilcox told a reporter, "the manager of the cinema informed me many of his patrons wanted to know why it was necessary to use such words as 'blast' and 'damn,' and that it was regarded as a reflection upon our ability if we were not able to express ourselves sufficiently well without resorting to such words. Since then I have discovered this view is general in the provinces. Many people attending a cinema idolize the stars and are badly disillusioned when they hear them use strong words."

### Converting Left-Handed Pupils Is Prohibited

LONDON, June 22: (CP)—Kettering Education Committee has forbidden its teachers to stop left-handed children from using the left hand for writing and other manual work. This has been done in consequence of a report by Dr. C. B. Hogg, the medical officer, whose attention has been directed to certain cases of stammering. The inquiries revealed that a number of these cases were left-handed children who had been converted to writing with their right hands. Dr. Hogg cited facts showing that of 41 left-handed children who were compelled to use the right hand 24 became stammerers. In a further case 12 right-handed children were trained to use the left hand, and within five months all developed a stammer.
