Premier Bennett Indicates Resumption of Awarding of Titles in Canada This Year

OTTAWA, Dec. 30: (CP)-Premier R. B. Bennett last night expressed the opinion that conferring of honors by the King upon Canadians should be resumed and announced that recommendations had been made that certain Canadians should share in the New Year list of "honors and awards" by His Majesty. This indication that honors would again be conferred upon Canadians after a lapse of some years came as a general surprise.

It is understood here that Hon. George Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner at London, and Hon. Lyman Duff, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, may be included in the New Year's honor list.

France is at present facing the same crisis which confronted the United States a short time ago, with starving men, women and children flocking to the nation's capital for aid. Plans for drastic economies and new taxes are before the French Chamber of Deputies, which is divided between holding confidence in the new premier and backing up the pleas of committees of taxpayers who are hotly opposing the taxation increases as un employment grows.


