CABINET CHANGE IS NOT IMPORTANT

UNITED STATES' SENATE COMMITTEE CONTINUES PROBE

Tolmie Takes Farms and Hinchcliffe Has Become New Minister of Lands

Had Expected That Ministerial Changes at Victoria Would Have Been Much More Extensive Than They Have Turned Out to Be

VICTORIA, June 1: (Canadian Press)—With Hon. W. C. Shelly, President of the Council, Hon. William Atkinson, minister of agriculture, and Hon. Nelson S. Lougheed, minister of lands, retiring last night, Premier S. F. Tolmie this morning took over the department of agriculture while Hon. Joshua Hinchcliffe, besides his own portfolio of education, assumes responsibility for the lands department. Both ministers were sworn into their new duties at Government House and these changes were the only one that were made in the personnel of the cabinet. It had been originally expected that the changes would be much more extensive than they have turned out to be.

ACTIVITY ON ISLANDS

Dr. Mandy Quite Pleased With Work Being Done There and Possibilities For Future Activity

Men Going Over

The Queen Charlotte Islands are getting quite busy according to Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, who, with Mrs. Mandy, has returned home from an official visit to a number of points there. He states that a crew of five men is going over on the Prince John this week to work for the Haida Gold Mines Ltd. (J. B. Hawkins & Co. of Vancouver) on the Prince Rupert group at Kootenay Harbor. A. J. Ingraham will have charge of the work there for the company. Some island men are also to be employed on the work. Dr. Mandy is well pleased with the prospects at that property which was recently bonded from E. C. Stevens of Skidegate. The deal for the Gold Harbor property was not quite settled when Dr. Mandy was there. W. G. McMorris, managing director of the Kit-sault Eagle Gold Mining Co., is negotiating the deal, the property being controlled by A. J. Gordon of Skidegate.

The resident engineer says there is also a prospect of activity at Cumshewa Inlet this summer, a bond having been taken on the Stevens property there.

In regard to the black sands on Graham Island, Dr. Mandy says a number of men are washing gold and making fair wages. Most of them seem quite satisfied. He says that those who work seem to be making good. The operations are south of Tow Hill and several men are also washing gold on a creek on Massett Inlet and doing fairly well.

As a result of suggestions made by Dr. Mandy, several residents are putting in outfits for cutting and polishing the agates found on the east coast of Graham Island. Some of the stones have been sent away for polishing and the results are excellent. He thinks this may develop into a little industry which would be advantageous to the settlers and would interest tourists.

A number of prospectors are busy on the islands and a good many claims have been staked but no work done on them so far.

While at Skidegate, Dr. Mandy looked over the Security, Golden Anchor and Bottle Harbor groups of free milling gold claims which were recently staked by E. C. Stevens and associates. One of the veins on the Bottle Harbor group is eighty feet wide and can be traced for 1500 feet on the mountain side.

Morgans Could Have Cleaned Up Quarter of Billion In 1929

This Would Have Been Profit Had Securities Received For Forming United Corporation, Utilities Holding Concern, Been Sold Out

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 1: (Canadian Press)—Potential profit of \$122,000,000 for the J. P. Morgan Co. in 1929 if it had sold securities received for forming the United Corporation, a utilities stock holding concern, was outlined today before the Senate finance committee which is investigating the activities of major banking organizations of the country. George Whitney, partner in the firm, admitted that this was correct.

SUCCEEDED IN EXAMS

Excellent Showing by Local Nurses in R. N. Tests—Miss A. Walker Second in Province

Word was received this morning by Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, of the outstanding success of five candidates from the local nurses' training school who tried recent examinations for qualification as Registered Nurses.

Three of the local candidates passed in Class One with marks of 80% or over, these being Miss Annie M. Walker, who passed second in the province, and the Misses Bernice and Oral Ross.

Miss Edna Carpenter and Miss Louise Lindseth, also members of the local training school, passed with standing of over 65%.

Miss Winnifred Bunn, who took her first two years training at Port Simpson General Hospital and the last year at Vancouver General Hospital, also passed with standing of over 65%.

All six young ladies, who recently had their graduating exercises here, will receive the hearty congratulations of many friends on the fine success they have achieved in the tests.

BALANCE IS FAVORABLE

Canada's Exports in 1932 Exceeded Imports By \$72,000,000, It Is Announced

OTTAWA, June 1: (Canadian Press)—Canada's net export balance for 1932 was yesterday announced to have been \$63,000,000 exclusive of capital movements. This represents an excess over imports of \$72,000,000.

POLICE COURT FINES AWAY DOWN THIS YEAR

Police court fines for this city during the month of May this year amounted to only \$55 as compared with \$175 in the same month last year. So far this year fines have totalled \$381 as against \$1,135 in the first five months of 1932.

FIRE LOSS WAS HEAVY

Destruction in City During May Amounted to Some \$8,000, Due Largely to Hotel Blaze

During the month of May the city fire department responded to nine alarms, this being the same number as in May 1932. So far this year, there have been a total of 46 calls as compared with 35 in the first five months of 1932.

Fire damage in the city this May was rather more extensive than usual, due to the destruction of the Seal Cove Hotel which was valued at about \$8000. There was also some \$20 damage to the roof of the home of J. F. Feasby on Green Street. There was insurance coverage in both cases.

LANDINGS INCREASE

Halibut Business of Port For May This Year Showed Gain Over 1932

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of May this year aggregated 1,718,000 pounds as compared with 1,678,000 pounds in the same month last year. American landings this May, totaling 909,000 pounds, were considerably below last year's 1,180,000 pounds while Canadian landings this May were 807,000 pounds or nearly double 498,000 pounds in the same month last year.

LESS SUN: LESS RAIN

Weather Summary For Month of May Announced—Temperature Little Different Than Last Year

Prince Rupert had a total of 100.5 hours of sunshine during the month of May this year as compared with 138.4 hours in the same month last year. There was slightly less rain at 5.25 inches this May than in May 1932 for which 5.9 inches was recorded. From a temperature standpoint, this May was little different than last, the maximum reading for the month this year having been 62 above as compared with a maximum of 65 last year while this May's minimum was 36 as against last May's 30.

PLANS ARE PROTESTED

Local Meeting Expresses Indignation at Latest Relief Plan

Indignation against the proposed new government relief plans was the keynote of a mass meeting of the Unemployed Councils held last night in the Canadian Labor Defence League Hall. The subject under discussion was the threat of the authorities to further reduce and cut off direct relief in the near future and to take men into camps for the performance of road work at 20¢ per day in addition to food and shelter.

The sentiment of the meeting was unanimous that nothing but a flat refusal to the camp proposition will meet the case and the Prince Rupert unemployed will ask for the co-operation of other organized labor.

A signed resolution in protest will be sent to Ottawa and the various labor organizations will be approached for their endorsement and support.

The meeting was well attended. Kenneth Montgomery occupied the chair.

REVENUE STILL UP

Customs and Excise Collections Here Maintaining Marked Lead Over Last Year

Customs and excise revenue at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of May this year, while not heavy at a total of \$9,950.17, nevertheless exceeded the \$8,093.37 collected in the same month last year. So far this calendar year, the revenue has amounted to \$68,234.86 as against \$48,692.97 in the first five months of 1932.

LOADING IS PROCEEDING

Sacramento Valley Expected to Sail With Wheat Cargo About End of Week

Loading of the British steamer Sacramento Valley at the local elevator with a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or Continent is now proceeding and the vessel is expected to be ready to sail on Saturday.

Officials of the Alberta Wheat Pool who are now here from Vancouver have no announcement to make as to the future intentions of the Pool in regard to the local house, the lease on which expires this summer.

Associated Boards To Convene August

Third and Fourth Days of That Month Tentatively Approved For Meeting at Smithers

The dates of August 3 and 4 have been tentatively decided upon for the holding of the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at Smithers. These dates are acceptable to both Smithers and Prince Rupert and are also expected to be approved by other centres in the district which will be represented.

TOOK HIS OWN LIFE

Body of Emil Wikstrom, Well Known Fisherman, Found at Port Edward With Bullet in Heart

Provincial police officers returned to the city yesterday afternoon on board the departmental cruiser P. M. L. 8, bringing in the body of Emil Wikstrom, well known salmon fisherman of some twenty-three or twenty-four years' standing in this district, whose body was found in a cannery cabin at Port Edward where he had shot himself about two weeks ago. A passer-by had seen the body lying on the bed in the cabin which Wikstrom occupied and the police proceeded at once to investigate. Wikstrom had not been seen for about two weeks and it is believed to have been about that time ago that he took his own life.

An inquiry held by Coroner Norman A. Watt established the fact that death was due to suicide. Deceased had shot himself with a 30-30 rifle which was found lying beside him. A bullet had gone through the heart, a stick being used to release the trigger after the weapon had been put in place. Death is believed to have been instantaneous.

Wikstrom was 53 years of age and a Norwegian by birth, having taken out Canadian naturalization in 1914. He was a single man and was very well known in the Skeena River district.

The B. C. Undertakers are in charge of funeral arrangements.

H. F. MacLeod former court and land registrar here, who was recently superannuated, will leave on tomorrow night's train for a trip to the Lethbridge district in Alberta where he will visit with relatives. He expects to be away from the city about a month.

PORT SIMPSON'S CENTENARY

Next year the village of Port Simpson celebrates its hundredth birthday. The post established there by the Hudson Bay Company in 1834 was one of the first in British Columbia. Possibly Fort St. James may have preceded it although that is not sure.

When Lieutenant-Governor Fordham Johnson was there last year he promised that, if invited for the centenary celebration, he would come. High officials of the Hudson Bay Company are also likely to be invited. There is no good reason why it should not be the greatest festival that Port Simpson has ever had.

The townsite of Port Simpson is a delightful one. Many thought it would have been chosen as the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and some still think it would have been the better choice. Happily, however, it was unspoiled in that way and remains a picturesque village with a weekly mail service, a delightful climate, sandy beaches, and people of taste and discrimination. Most of the men engage in salmon fishing during the season and a majority own their own power boats.

The people of Port Simpson have the ability to stage one of the biggest events ever held in the north and, doubtless, next year will see them actively engaged on the project.

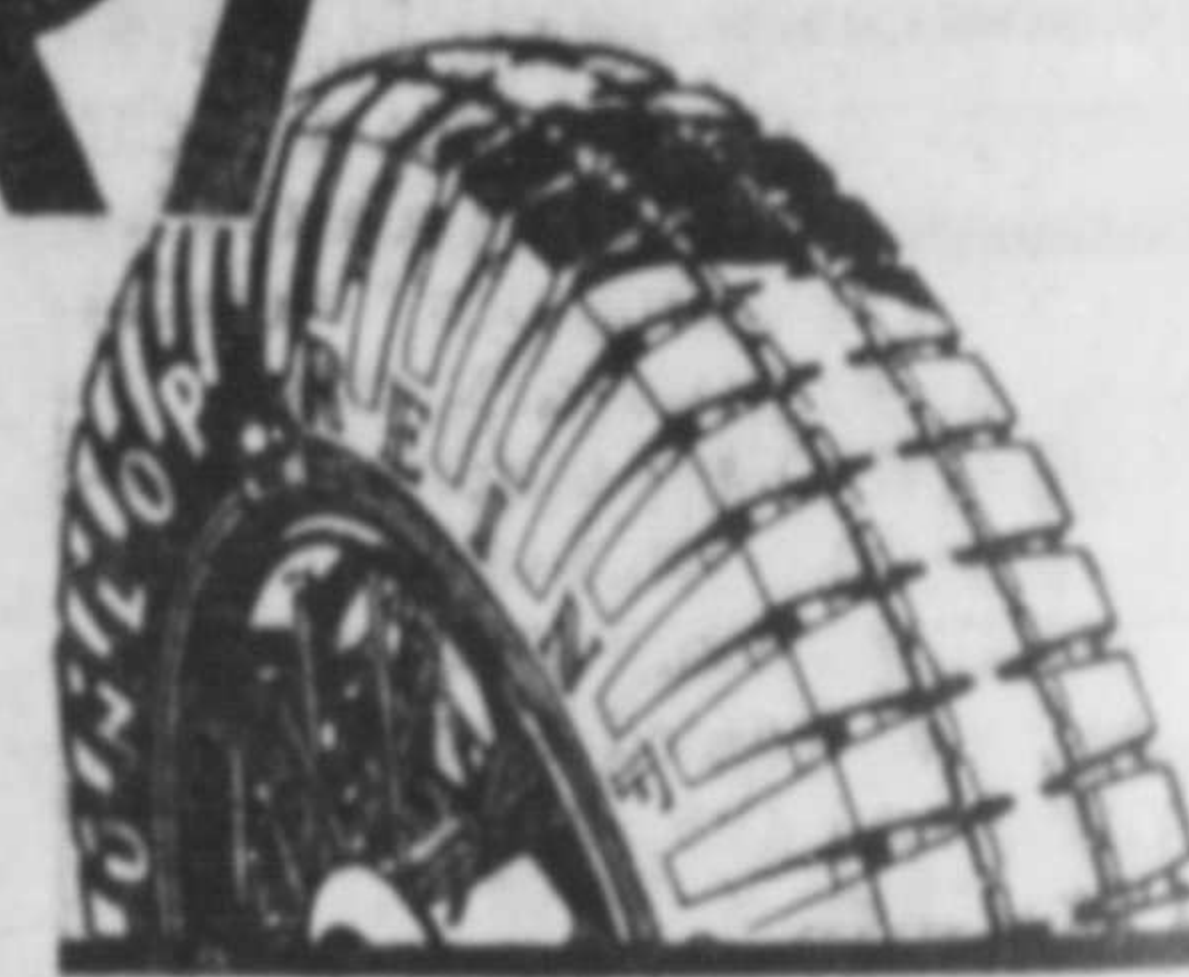

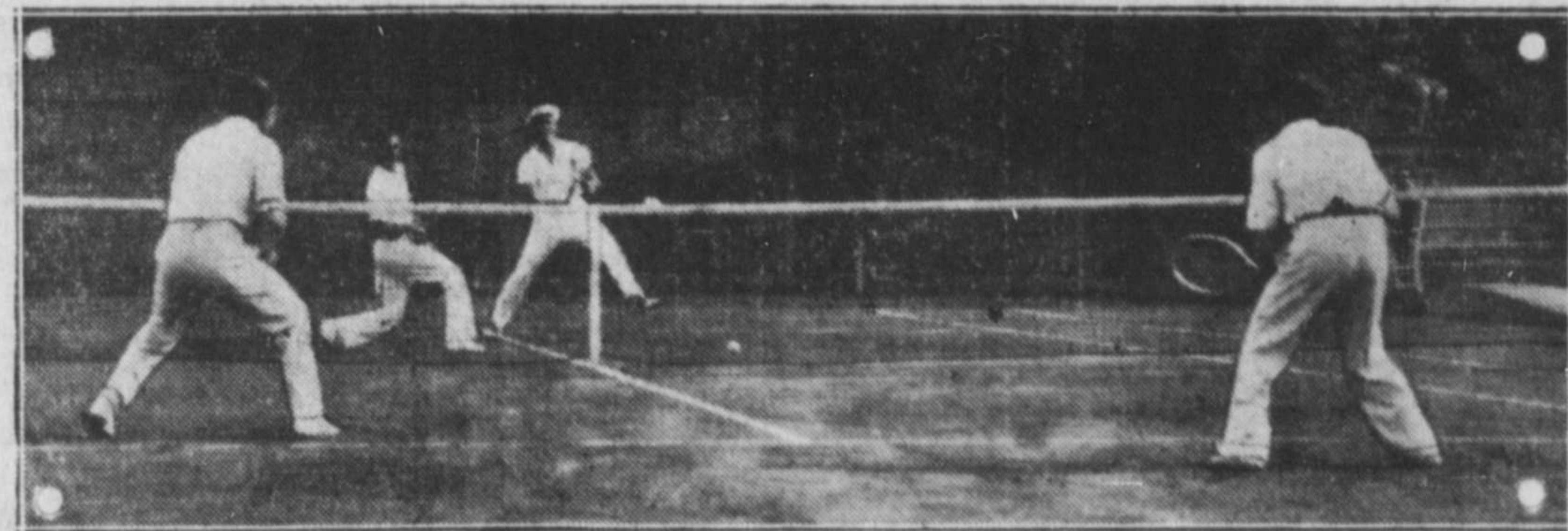

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Completing the company's final voyage of the spring ten day schedule to Alaska, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Six passengers left the vessel here while five left here for the south aboard her.

Capt. William Palmer, after an absence of several voyages, has returned to his duties as skipper of the steamer Princess Norah on the Alaska route. Capt. Albert Rippon, who was acting as skipper during his absence, is remaining on board as chief officer.

WAS REAL PIONEER

Late William H. Keary of New Westminster Was Well Known to Many People in Rupert

William Holland Keary, picturesque pioneer of British Columbia, who had lived in this province since the age of two years and whose death occurred yesterday at the age of 76 in New Westminster of which city he served for seven years as mayor and for the past many years as city clerk, started his active career at the age of 17 as a printer and served for seven years as a printer on the pioneer newspaper Columbian. In 1880 he went to Oregon and remained in that state for a year working as a reporter and school teacher. However, the next year found him back in New Westminster where he opened a bookstore which he conducted for four years before becoming accountant, storekeeper and schoolmaster at the New Westminster Penitentiary following the establishment of that penal institution with the staff of which he was identified for ten years. Later entering the insurance business, he was elected mayor of New Westminster in 1902 and served for seven years as chief magistrate of the city. He also saw 12 years' service as an alderman and for some time was chief of the city fire department. He took an

active part in military affairs during his younger days and for seven years was a member of the early New Westminster Rifles garrison.

Other public and semi-public offices in which the late Mr. Keary served included the honorary secretaryship of the Royal Columbian Hospital from 1879 to 1911 and manager and secretary of the Provincial Exhibition from 1900 to 1911. He was the first secretary and for three years president of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities. He once acted as chairman of a municipal commission appointed by the provincial government.

Married in 1881 to Miss Mary Caroline Eickhoff, the late Mr. Keary had a family of three sons and three daughters. He was a member of the Westminster and Terminal City (Vancouver) Clubs and of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, the Knights of Pythias and Oddfellows' Lodges. He was a Conservative in politics and at one time was a member of the Roman Catholic Church. His principal recreation was boating.

The late Mr. Keary was well known to all pioneers of this province and many Prince Rupert people regretted to read of his death yesterday in an exclusive Canadian Press dispatch to the Daily News.

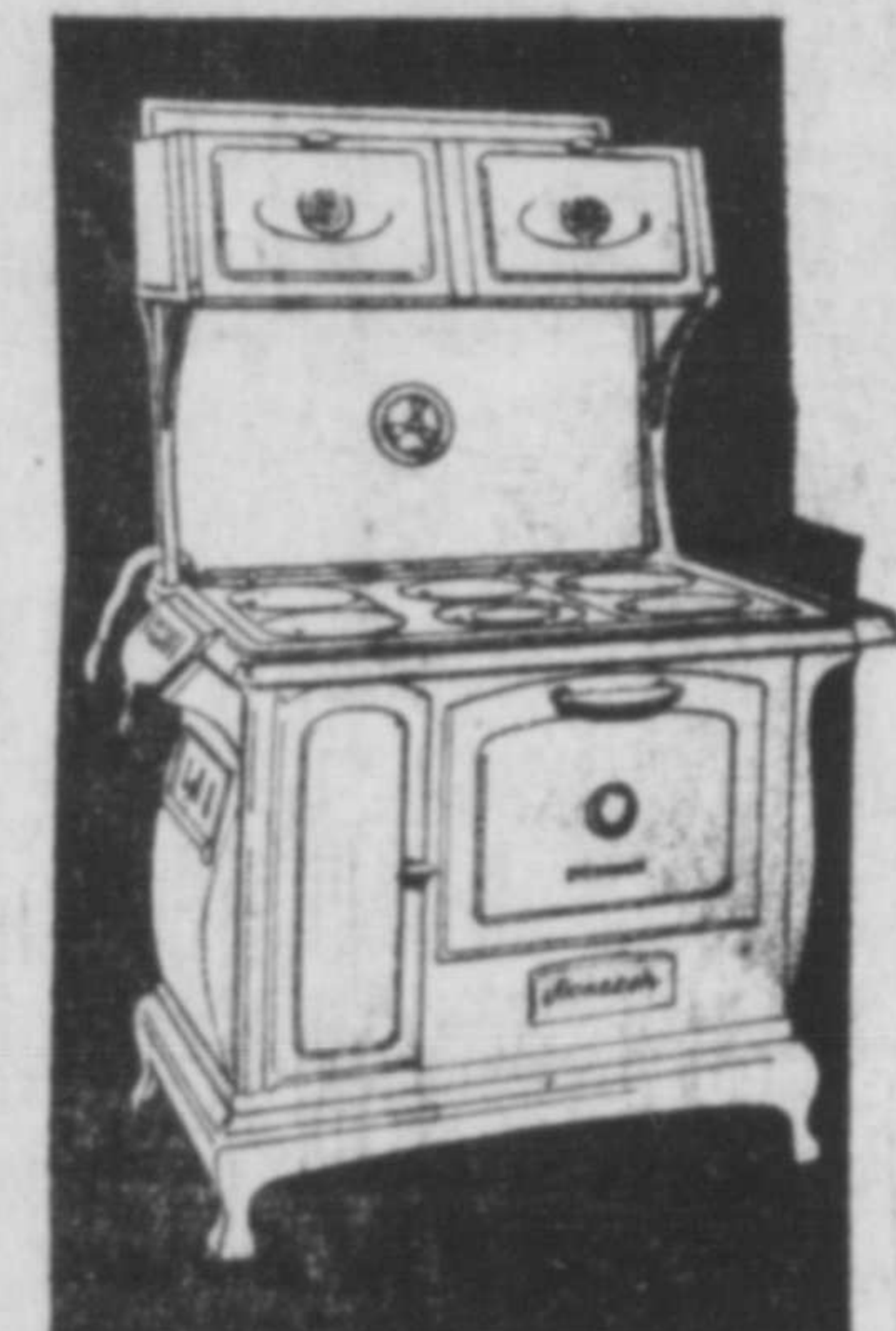
PORT SIMPSON
