PARLEY TO CONTINUE --- MacDONALD

KINGSTON RIOTER IS CONVICTED; SENTENCE IS RESERVED

William McCrea Found Guilty and Tim Buck's Trial Now Proceeding

Court Hearings at Kingston Following Penitentiary Disorders of Last October Are Attracting Widespread Interest—Eloquent Plea by Accused

KINGSTON, Ont., June 23:—William McCrea, after an eloquent plea in his own defence, was found guilty yesterday in connection with rioting which occurred last October in Portsmouth Penitentiary here. Sentence was reserved by Mr. Justice Deroche this morning. Tim Buck, former leader of the Communist Party of Canada, was arraigned this morning also on charges of rioting in the same connection.

KILLED IN AIR CRASH

Bill Broatch, Noted Northern Flyer, and Two Companions Lose Lives in Saskatchewan

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., June 23: (Canadian Press)—Three men were killed on Wednesday when a reconditioned airplane went in to a spin while being tested and crashed on Emma Lake, thirty miles north of here.

The dead are: Capt. B. W. (Bill) Broatch, noted northern flyer, 70-year-old; C. Brooks and T. D. Forsyth, mechanics.

The bodies of Broatch and Forsyth were recovered.

Plot Against Government of Tiny Republic

SAN MARINO, June 23—A plot to assassinate two high government officials of this republic, the smallest in the world, seize the government and burn the city of San Marino is reported to have been uncovered by the police.

The funeral of the late Leander Miller, well known local halibut fisherman, who passed away several days ago in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for a month or so following two or three years of indisposition, took place yesterday afternoon from the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Many friends of the deceased, including halibut fishermen and others, were present to pay their final tributes of respect. There were quite a number of floral offerings.

Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, officiated and Peter Lien presided at the organ to accompany the hymns. Pallbearers were Thomas Banbury, Ivor Martinsen, Frank Long, Ole Westad, Hugh McAuley and Lief Tusiek.

The late Mr. Miller was forty-six years of age, a native of Newfoundland and unmarried. He had been engaged in halibut fishing here for seventeen years and had last been employed on the local boat Vera Beatrice. Hugh ("Dusty"), another well known local halibut fisherman, is a brother of deceased who was a member of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

British Premier Says His Heart Is Buoyant For Success of Meet

United States Proposes Reduction of Customs Duties and Trade Barriers—Credit Expansion Advocated in Resolution by Senator James Couzens

LONDON, June 23: (Canadian Press)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull, head of the United States delegation to the world economic conference, yesterday laid down a resolution for consideration of the conference calling for a reduction of customs duties and excessive barriers to trade. Another proposal from the United States came with the presentation of a resolution by Senator James Couzens of Michigan urging credit expansion through open market operations synchronized with public works and in close co-operation with central banks.

He said there were very definite signs in England, Canada and the United States of improvement in business. The increased price of wheat alone was important for it had been stated that every cent increase in the price of wheat meant a million dollars more money distributed through Canada.
