WASHINGTON, March 8:-President Roosevelt intends to continue his command of the United States monetary situation until permanent legislation is possible, he indicated today.



LONDON, March 8:- The famous Cheltenham Flyer of the Great Western, which at present holds the blue ribbon of rallway speed with an average of 714 miles per hour between Swindon and Paddington, is going to be deprived of the honor if the plans of the German State Railways come to fruition. 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
