Japanese' Statesmen Disagree



Count Yasuya Uchida (left), the foreign minister, and General Sadao Araki, the minister of war, ardent supporters of a strong imperial policy on the continent of Asia. Hitoshi Ashida, spokesman for the Selyukai, one of Japan's principal political parties, declared in the diet January 23 that unless relations between Japan and the United States are improved they will produce renewed armaments competition and possibly a world war, and urged Gen. Araki to "forsake the notion that the army is almighty." Count Uchida responded that the foreign policy was conducted "in accordance with the will of the people and in co-operation with the army," at the same time declaring that "there is no uneasiness concerning our relations with the Uited States."

MICHIGANIS BADLY HIT

Banks Are Closed and Many People Send Money to Canada to Be Cared For

DETROIT, Feb. 15:-Going into the second day of an eight-day bank holiday proclaimed by Governor William Comstock because of difnculties encountered by the Union riust Company, Michigan's nine hundred thousand depositors were encouraged by the promise that nive per cent of their balances would be available tomorrow for emergency purposes.

The Ford banks have hitherto been open and doing business. Many depositors had feared trouble and had withdrawn their money and taken it to the Canadian side and deposited in Canadian banks.

The position of the banks is being screngthened and it is expected they will meet all demands when they reopen.
