WINNIPEG, Feb. 14.—Captain Charles Graham Brown of the Lord Strathcona Horse was dismissed from military service for his "scandalous conduct" in connection with an affair at Fort Osborne Barracks last Hallowe'en night. Captain Harry Rebbit, a fellow officer, charged with firing a gun at Brown after his wife said that Brown had molested her, will be reprimanded, -


