#### City Council Sets Mill Rate For Year at Fifty-Five; Is Unable to Balance Budget

With Mayor Stephens and Ald. Rudderham dissenting on the grounds that the rate failed to provide for the balancing of the 1933 civic budget and could only mean a deficit at the end of the year which might amount to as high as \$150,000, the city council, at its special meeting Saturday night, on recommendation of the finance committee,

the year at fifty-five mills on one hundred percent of the assessed BENNETT TO hundred percent of the assessed value of land and on twenty percent of improvements.

The rate, divided into sixteen mills for debentures and fourteen mills for general expenditure, is based on a total amount to be raised by taxation of \$229,189.23 consisting of \$67,111.79 for general expenditures. The total of \$229,189.23 to be raised by taxation is arrived at by deducting estimated receipts for the year from other sources amounting to \$150.810.30 from total estimates aggregating \$379,999.53.


