LEGISLATURE DISSOLVED YESTERDAY

ENGLISH PEOPLE QUICKLY SNAP UP CANADIAN SECURITIES

Seventy-Five Million Dollars Subscribed in Sixty Seconds Today For Loan In London

ENGLISH NEWSPAPERS FEATURE UP WONDERFUL RESULT IN THEIR HEADLINES; OVER-SUBSCRIBE ISSUE MANY TIMES

LONDON, Aug. 2:—Subscription lists for fifteen million pounds worth of Dominion of Canada four percent bonds were closed within a few minutes after they were opened today.

"Canada's Proud Achievement" and "Fifteen Million Pounds in 60 Seconds" were typical headlines in the evening newspapers.

The newspaper reports said the loan was over-subscribed many times.

DINNER OF ROTARIANS

Wives and Visitors Entertained at Evening Meal and Taken to Theatre to See Play

Last evening at the Commodore Cafe the members of the local Rotary Club were hosts to their wives and also to District Governor Dinsmore and Mrs. Dinsmore at dinner. After dinner the whole party adjourned to the Capitol Theatre in a body, special seats having been reserved for them and enjoyed 42nd Street."

At the dinner, which was presided over by President John Dybhavn, Mrs. Allen and Dr. Large entertained the party with vocal numbers which were much appreciated. The speaker of the evening was District Governor Dinsmore who spoke chiefly on the application of Rotary principles in daily life. Some felt the ideals were so distant that they failed to live out the small things. While friendship was important in the club, it was not the end. It provided a vehicle for carrying on. He thought it was easier to carry out Rotary work in a small place such as this than in a large city where so little was known of the neighbors. TERRACE, Aug. 2:—Following the recent forced landing of the Alexander-Mattern relief plane on the hayfield of Harry Franks' farm on the bench at Kitsumkalum, agitation has developed here for the establishment of a proper airplane landing field at Terrace. At a strawberry social held by the Terrace Board of Trade in the Canadian Legion Hall last Friday night, speeches along this line were made by such prominent citizens as W. H. Burnett, president of the Board of Trade, who presided, E. T. Kenney, Liberal candidate for Skeena in the forthcoming election, J. B. Agar, chairman of the board of village commissioners, Capt. J. B. Colthurst, O. T. Sundal, Will Robinson and others. Representations are now being made to the governments. The field where the Alexander plane landed, with a few changes, would be as good a site for an aviation field as any available locally, it is felt.

The strawberry social was followed by a dance which continued until the small-hours of the morning, the crowd in attendance including many Prince Rupert visitors. W. H. Burnett was master of ceremonies and music was by Sam Kirkaldy's orchestra.

Lieut. Governor Acting on Advice of Ministers Ends Life of Provincial House

Still in Saddle



PREMIER S. F. TOLMIE Advised Lieut. Governor to dissolve legislature, then set out to campaign in view of coming election

Premier Tolmie Sets Out on Election Campaign Immediately After Announcing Formal Dissolution and Refuses to Discuss Election Date

VICTORIA, Aug. 2:—The seventeenth legislature of the province of British Columbia was dissolved late yesterday afternoon by proclamation of Lieutenant-Governor J. Fordham Johnson, acting on the advice of Premier Tolmie and his ministers. No official date has been announced for the general election but voting is expected to take place about the middle of October.

The dissolution of the legislature brought into effect automatically the 1932 Redistribution Act, cutting the representation in the House by one seat and changing the boundaries of most of the provincial ridings.

After announcing that the legislature was dissolved, Premier Tolmie left on the night boat for the mainland to tour the Fraser Valley areas. He declined to discuss election plans.

Candidates Plenty In Prince George

Deykin Says He Will Remain in Field and Alward and Perry Also Running It Is Said

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 2:—It is announced here that there will be at least three or four candidates in the field at the forthcoming election. Dr. Alward, M.L.A., is said to be likely to enter the field again as an independent Conservative. Harry Perry, former member for the riding is representing the Liberal interests. C. P. Deykin says he intends to stay in the field in spite of efforts made to get him to switch to the federal field. There is also possibility of a fourth man

Demand Is Made by Liberal Leader For Setting of Election

T. D. Pattullo Points Out Bungling Methods of Government in Regard to Conduct of Public Affairs And Asks For Action

VICTORIA, Aug. 2:—T. D. Pattullo made the following statement today: "Announcement is made that the legislature is dissolved but no date is set for the election of new representatives. The administration possesses the superlative faculty for bungling. There are no representatives of the people and no provision made for their selection at the earliest possible date but the country is left in continued uncertainty and doubt."

TO APPEAL MEAL TAX DECISION

VICTORIA, Aug. 2:—The decision of Magistrate J. A. Findlay in Vancouver that the B. C. Hospitals Aid Act imposing tax on the consumer of every meal at a restaurant or hotel of the value of 50c or over was an excise tax and therefore ultra vires of the Legislature will be appealed by the government. It will be argued before the higher court that the tax is not akin to an excise impost and is therefore valid and within the competence of the Legislature. Collection of the tax will be continued, Attorney General Pooley stated.
