Reginald McRae, Aged Twenty, Is Shot and Dies After Robbery

Two Companions Escape With \$263 From Club in Vancouver-Constable David Richardson in Hospital With Bullet in Leg

VANCOUVER, May 19: (Canadian Press)-Reginald McRae, aged 20, is dead and Constable David Richardson of the city police is in hospital with a bullet wound in the leg as a result of a running gun battle on Robson Street late last night following the hold-up and robbery of the Service Recreation Club. Three armed men held up occupants of a room, looted a cash regis-X

ter of \$263 and escaped from the premises as Constables Richardson DESTROYER nd Veitch arrived.
