HOUSE HAS HOT FIGHT

Closure Introduced in Two Debates In British Commons Yesterday Before Adjournment

Labor Active

Bitterly Opposed Passage of Newfoundland Bill as Well as Unemployment Plans

LONDON, Dec. 15: (CP)—After a continuous sitting for twenty-three hours, the House of Commons adjourned yesterday afternoon until Monday.

There was unrelenting Labor opposition first to the Newfoundland Bill implementing the recommendations of the recent Amulree Royal Commission to return Newfoundland to colonial status by withdrawing self-government until the finances of the Dominion are rehabilitated which was not passed through the committee stage until 8 o'clock in the morning after twenty-eight separate divisions had been called. Then the fight continued on the government's unemployment financial resolution and Labor divided the House five times.

The closure was introduced in both debates.

CUT PRICE OF LIQUOR

Twenty-Five to Fifty Percent Reduction on Hard Stuff in B.C. Predicted

VICTORIA, Dec. 16: (CP)—Whatever happens to liquor in United States, British Columbians seem assured of a heavy cut in prices. With the province facing stiff competition from across the line, it is felt that between twenty-five and fifty percent will have to be knocked off retail prices of hard liquor here.

It is expected that Premier Pattullo and other western premiers will bring the situation strongly to the attention of the federal government in January with a view to receiving relief from federal taxation.

ELECT FOR JURY TRIAL

Four Unemployed Men of Prince George Charged With Assaulting Officer

Following their committal for trial by Stipendiary Magistrate N. P. Moran of Prince George on charges of assaulting a police officer, Ole Olsen, Carl Peterson, Ragnar Lindal and David Dickenson, who are alleged to have figured in recent disorders of unemployment at the interior town on refusing to leave the court house after demands for relief had been refused following their declining to go to work camp, have elected for trial by jury and will come up at the spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes at Prince George. Pending trial, each of the four men have been released on bail bonds of \$500.

P. E. Wilson K. C. of Prince George prosecuted at the preliminary trial and Gordon Grant of Vancouver appeared as defence counsel.

TWO WELL KNOWN AUTHORS ARE DEAD

NEW YORK, Dec. 16: (CP)—Robert W. Chambers, noted author artist, died here this morning and Louis Joseph Vance, well known author of detective and mystery stories, was burned to death when he fell to sleep with a cigarette in his hand.

Two Fishermen Drown After Having Escaped Flames; Seven Missing

American Fishing Vessel Ellen T. Marshall Destroyed By Fire Off Nova Scotia Coast—Life Dory Capsized In Surf at Seal Island

SEAL ISLAND, N.S., Dec. 16: (CP)—The American fishing schooner Ellen T. Marshall caught fire off the Nova Scotia coast last night and was abandoned by the crew, two of whom were drowned in the surf here this morning when the dory in which they were coming ashore capsized in the surf. The third man in the dory was rescued but seven men from the schooner are still missing.

U.S. Favors Peace Pact In Americas

MONTEVIDEO, Dec. 16:—Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the United States told the Pan-American Conference here yesterday that his country was prepared to sign the pact proposed by Argentina under which war would be outlawed in the Western Hemisphere. The pact would provide for the sovereignty and integrity of each country on the North and South American continents and would oppose all aggression among the nations signing up.

FERNIE IS DEFAULTING

Commissioners Looms For Coal City of Crow's Nest Pass

VICTORIA, Dec. 16: (CP)—Ferne may be placed under a commissionership owing to lack of funds to meet interest on bonds falling due December 19 and 31 and January 31.

With the collapse of its coal trade, Fernie has suffered probably more than any other city in the province and the government has already been compelled to absorb all costs of unemployment there.

LINDBERGH'S IN FLORIDA

American Ace and His Wife Reach Miami Today From San Juan, Porto Rico

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 16: (CP)—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh arrived here this afternoon from San Juan, Porto Rico, thus completing their trans-Atlantic flight from West Africa via South America following their northern crossing of the ocean during the summer and subsequent aerial tour of Europe. From here they will fly up the Atlantic Coast to New York and home.

SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MARKET

NEW YORK, Dec. 16: (CP)—Bar silver closed at 43 1/2c per ounce on the local metal market yesterday. Copper was unchanged at 8c.

Sister of Sam Shequin Asks That New Probe be Made In Case of Alaska Man's Death

SEATTLE, Dec. 16: (CP)—Mrs. Carrie Shequin McArdle of Langley, Wash., whose brother, Sam Shequin, Alaskan mining man, was found dead last April in Vancouver, B.C. under questionable circumstances, has written to Governor John W. Troy of Alaska asking him to reopen the case through diplomatic channels.

"My brother had accumulated \$20,000 in cash and government bonds and I know he never spent it," Mrs. McArdle said, "but we have never been able to find any trace of it since his death. I have found, however, why he withdrew the money from his bank in Seattle in August, 1930. He was afraid a girl was going to bring suit against him for breach of promise. I have been able to trace \$6000 of the money to Reno but no farther. Shortly before he disappeared he spread the story that he had lost the money on the races but I know he was not a gambling man."

STATEMENT BY FRENCH

Expected to Declare Arms Deadlock With Germany and Opposition To Mussolini Plan

PARIS, Dec. 16: (CP)—A Franco-German deadlock on arms and a firm stand against the attempt of Premier Mussolini of Italy to revamp the League of Nations will likely be proclaimed by the French cabinet tonight.

A UNITED FRONT

The people of Western Canada owe a debt of gratitude to Premier Pattullo of British Columbia for calling the western premiers promptly into conference and putting before them a program for dealing aggressively with the unemployment situation and the related evils which have brought about that situation or resulted therefrom, says the Edmonton Bulletin.

The fact that the four premiers were able to conclude their conference in a single day, and conclude it with unanimous approval of the program, is proof that Mr. Pattullo knows very definitely what he wants to do, and that his method of attacking the problem recommends itself readily to those who have been at close grips with it. That the Liberal premier of British Columbia, the U. F. A. premier of Alberta, the Conservative premier of Saskatchewan and the Coalition premier of Manitoba found themselves in agreement as to the proper line of action vetoes any suggestion of partisan or political trend in the proposals.

As a result these four provinces will speak as one to the other provinces and to the Dominion government on the subject that has puzzled and paralyzed every government in Canada for the last three years. Whether they will be able to enlist the support of the eastern provinces and gain the assent of the Dominion government remains to be seen. If not, the fault will not be a lack of known and positive agreement among the western provinces. These will now present a united front, and a common demand for action.

The program they have adopted will be widely discussed in detail. For the moment the important thing is that they have agreed to make common cause and have charted the course. It is due to Premier Pattullo to say that in the few days he has been in office he has done more to inspire and organize a drive for recovery than all the governments in Canada together have done in three years.

It was the spirit of loyalty in the hearts of the pioneers of Prince Rupert that made the little city started in the wilderness of the north grow into the size of the Prince Rupert we know of today.

The fact that our city is passing through times of depression should awaken that loyalty anew and there is no better way of showing this than by patronizing our local stores and spending our money in our own town.

Money spent thus is circulating amongst us, giving a new start in business circles, and putting into our public funds sufficient means to carry on and to improve the good work started many years ago. Our excellent fire department, police protection, pure water supply, sanitary regulations, good roads and many other privileges we enjoy, must be kept up by us. Our local schools, which are equal to any in the province, must keep the standard they have obtained. The wonderful opportunity of education has been given us and if we want to carry on we must do our best to help the city which pays the teachers' salaries. DEFAULTED ON DEBTS

Esthonia Only European Nation to Pay Full Instalment to U.S. Yesterday

Token Payments

Made By Britain and Italy, France And Other Nations Fail To Pay

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 16:—Of \$153,000,000 due in war debt payments to United States yesterday, only \$9,000,000 was actually received. The Department of State announced last night.

Great Britain, Italy and some of the smaller nations made partial "token" payments, Britain remitting

by check \$7,500,000, 6.4% of the \$117,500,000 due.

France, Belgium and Poland, as they have done since last year, again defaulted outright as did Esthonia. A note from Belgium stated that no further war debts could be expected from that country until Germany resumed reparation payments.

Finland was the only nation to meet its instalment in full yesterday, paying over \$239,000.

Almost Dead Issue

LONDON, Dec. 16:—That United States had no hope of collecting from now on any more than a small percentage of "token payments" on war debts from any of the European nations and that even these would probably be soon discontinued was the view expressed in official quarters here yesterday as obligations of fifteen nations became due, all but Finland defaulting either partially or entirely.

Patrick O'Farrell Publicist, Is Dead

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16: (CP)—Patrick A. O'Farrell, aged 77, well known Irish-Canadian-American publicist and world traveller, is dead in Dublin, according to advices received here.

Tonight's train, due from the east at 10 o'clock, was reported this morning to be on time.

J. W. McAuley, locomotive foreman here for the Canadian National Railways, left on last evening's train for Prince George where he will spend the next month on relief duty.

Included in the tour were a Chevrolet, Buick, Oldsmobile, LaSalle, Cadillac, two Pierce-Arrows, G. M. C. truck, Studebaker, Pontiac, and other makes, as well as two Fords.

It is interesting to note that it was reported on the arrival of the caravan at Edmonton from the Peace River Country that the V-8's were the only units which made the round trip through mud without having to be towed. On a close check we find one of the V-8's travelled ten continuous hours in low gear, the temperature never exceeded 140 degrees and gasoline consumption was one gallon to ten miles while running in low gear. All the other cars had boiling radiators and required repeated additions of water.

premises and double his warehouse capacity. The one will enable him to candle and grade eggs thereby securing a higher return, while the other will permit the storing of vegetables and other produce enabling it to be sold as required and without the necessity of selling it immediately and being forced to accept lowered prices.

Two other features are necessary in order to properly supply the market. The first, a small freezing room to facilitate the handling of dressed meats, poultry and other perishable produce. This is a necessity if meats are to be handled.

The second feature necessary rests upon an additional concession by the railways in the shape of an extra baggage car attached to the regular trains. At present, local freight goes only once a week arriving at Prince Rupert on Saturday rendering it virtually impossible to maintain a regular supply of produce. The cost of this service would not be very great and the extra volume of business handled would, in a short time, more than repay the railways.

Merchants state that they would be only too glad to do business with the interior farmers since they realize that their prosperity varies directly with conditions in the outlying district. Farmers, however, must realize the fact that their produce must be attractively prepared and of saleable quality and, most important of all, that they will have to accept the market value for their produce in line with Vancouver and Edmonton prices.

This coming winter is a good time for farmers to plan on making a bid for the first \$200,000.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Value of Fishery Production Higher—Prince William Offered For Sale—Hunting Tapering Off

Features of October operating results in British Columbia were increases in salmon and herring catches and landed values and an increase in halibut value in spite of a drop in catch, federal statistics reveal. Pacific Coast salmon landings for the month were some 37,000 hundredweights larger than in October, 1932, and totalled 188,375 hundredweights. Their landed value was about \$288,140, a gain of \$110,000. There was a substantial drop in the quantity of halibut taken, only 13,980 hundredweights being brought ashore as against 21,360, but higher prices lifted the landed value total by more than \$22,200 and put it at \$103,880.

Tenders are being called by the Canadian National Railways for the purchase of the steamer Prince William which the company operated for one season three or four years ago on the run out of Prince Rupert to the Queen Charlotte Islands and Skeena and Naas Rivers and which has since then been tied up at the local dry dock. Tenders will close at Winnipeg at noon December 20.

Hunting activities have been quiet hereabouts during the past week or so. Travelling conditions have been none too good owing to the cold northeasterly winds which have stirred up outside waters considerably and made the going rather tough. Preparations for the Yuletide season, too, have had the effect of keeping the would-be nimrods otherwise engaged. As is usual at this time of year, the number of those engaged in hunting will gradually taper off until they disappear altogether.

John Dybhavn, member of the Biological Board of Canada, and Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, will be leaving the city on Christmas Day for Ottawa to attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada which will be held in the federal capital the week following. Mr. Dybhavn, while away, will, as usual, visit other eastern cities on fisheries business.
