Five British Naval Officers at Dutch Harbor in Ketch Enroute From Hong Kong to England

DUTCH HARBOR, Alaska, Aug. 21: (CP)—On a trip half way around the world in a small specially built ketch without an auxiliary engine, five British naval officers are here after sailing from Hong Kong. They are Lieutenant Commander Sherwood, Lieutenants Ryder, Salt and Frances and Surgeon Commander Davis.

The party, which left Hong Kong on May 31, intends to continue south along the Alaska, British Columbia and United States coasts enroute to England.

DISCUSSING CABINET

The composition of T. D. Pattullo's cabinet is being seriously discussed even by the Vancouver Province, which is opposing the party headed by Prince Rupert's representative. That indicates that most people expect Mr. Pattullo will be returned with a sufficient support in the Legislature to enable him to form a cabinet.

Liberals did most of their nominating some time ago and have not been much heard from while the other parties have been trying their best to uncover likely candidates in some cases with little success. This has meant that the minor parties have been more in the newspapers of late than the Liberals.

Once campaigning commences, however, there will be a merry jumble of political talking and, even if the Liberal talk is not quite as loud as that of other groups, doubtless it will be heard.

GOLD DISTRIBUTION

George Clothier, formerly of Prince Rupert but now resident mining engineer for the western mineral survey district, in his report to the government, issues a note of warning to investors to beware of buying worthless stock certificates and urges a strict accounting from the officials of new companies as to what is being done with the money received from stockholders.

Mr. Clothier also remarks on the wide distribution of gold which, until the past year or two, has not been realized. He says there has been more prospecting this year than for many years and it is certain that the development of gold properties will be the greatest ever.
