(Continued from page one) deliberations. Before anything could be accomplished, it was essential that God's kingdom on earth should be accepted as a practical reality.

What World Has to Do

The world had to get away from thinking that God was far removed and lived only in Heaven, declared the speaker. People were inclined to worry too much about the hereafter and forget the present. Worry and not work was killing people. It was necessary that people get back into contact with God and make His Kingdom a practically reality of their lives. By remanifestation of God's kingdom on earth and by this means alone would come the new perfect order and system. God's God's will would have to be done and the affairs of the world governed by the rules he had set down. Saturday, July 15, 1933 "We must be workers together with God."

Delving deep into Biblical history, Mr. Springett described how veloped the Great British Commonwealth of Nations of today which was still no less the House of Israel and the "chosen" people.


