It is now intimated from Ottawa that a national campaign to provide work for the unemployed and to pay them wages is to be instituted. That is directly in line with Mr. Pattullo's announcement months ago.

Mr. Woodsworth, member of the Dominion Parliament, having injected himself into the provincial fight on behalf of the C. C. F., it is now announced that Hon. Ian McKenzie of Vancouver and Tom Reid of New Westminster will tour the province between now and election day in the interests of the provincial Liberal party. Captain McKenzie is one of the orators of the federal party and Tom Reid is a speaker of no mean ability. It is understood they will visit Prince Rupert and other parts of Northern and Central New British Columbia.

H. D. TWIGG'S RETIREMENT

It is a matter for extreme regret that H. D. Twigg, member for Victoria in the recently dissolved legislature, is not to continue in politics. He was looked upon by many as the hope of the Conservative party in this province. In the war he took part in the fighting overseas and was prominent in connection with the activities of the returned soldier organizations since then. As deputy speaker of the Legislature and as organizer for the Conservatives he did good work and he is still full of vigor. It is to be hoped that, if he does not reconsider his decision during the present campaign, he will at any rate find himself impelled to take part in political activities at some more suitable time. Possibly he may enter federal politics.


