JUNEAU, Aug. 24: (CP)—The gasoline boat T-1547 exploded, burned and sank without trace, carrying her owner, John Dahl of Petersburg, to death, according to advices received here.

DEATH IS ACCIDENT

Fatality at Haysport on Sunday Night Last is Probed by Coroner's Jury

Verdict of accidental death from injuries sustained on being struck by some part of the engine or tender of last Saturday night's east-bound passenger train at Haysport cannery was returned yesterday afternoon by the coroner's jury before Coroner Norman A. Watt.

Witnesses were Dr. C. H. Hankinson, Dr. A. E. Perry, Indian Agent W. E. Collison, Conductor W. D. Moxley, Engineer C. J. Graham, Fireman H. Hodgson, Brakeman Al Berner and George Moore, an Indian.

Dr. Hankinson and Dr. Perry described the injuries sustained by deceased and Indian Agent Collison testified as to an ante-mortem statement made by Fowler.

The coastal liner Madison, which had been reported yesterday to be in distress off the Virginia coast, limped into Norfolk this morning under its own power, reporting that the second mate and a quartermaster had been swept overboard when they went on deck to investigate damage which had been done by the first wave of the hurricane.

Eight persons were killed in the state of Virginia, damage to Virginia Beach alone being estimated at a million dollars. The gale smashed seashore resorts, marooned communities and wreckage of small craft dotted the Atlantic coastline.

POSSIBILITY OF NAVAL BASE AT RENNELL SOUND DISCUSSED AGAIN; SURVEYS BEING MADE?

Following a visit to the head of Rennell Sound on the west coast of Graham Island earlier in the year by Commodore Walter Hose, chief of staff of the Royal Canadian Navy, and planes of the Royal Canadian Air Force, it is reported that two survey parties are operating there just now—one British and one American—presumably in connection with the possible establishment of a naval base at that place.

VIENNA, Austria, August 24—Chancellor Dollfuss has ordered over one thousand picked marksmen in the Austrian Heimwehr to be immediately mobilized in preparation for a rush on the Bavarian frontier.

The local clinic, which opened Tuesday afternoon, is continuing today, and may extend into tomorrow. Dr. Lamb is being assisted by Miss J. B. Peters R.N., clinic nurse.

Dr. Lamb will proceed on tomorrow evening's train to interior points after visiting which he will continue to Vancouver. Miss Peters will sail tomorrow night on the Cardena for Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 24: (CP)—Olier Besner of Prince Rupert, injured in the recent crash of an airplane in Anderson Lake in the Bridge River district, is making satisfactory progress toward recovery but will probably be confined to St. Paul's Hospital here for another two months. It was stated last night, Gordon McKenzie, pilot of the ill-fated plane, which carried three persons to their deaths, was removed from the Vancouver General Hospital to his home yesterday.

### C. C. F. FAILURE

The C. C. F. failed to make any impression in the Nova Scotia elections. They did not have many candidates in the field and they elected none. Possibly that was because the people of the far eastern provinces were not as badly hit by the depression as the people of the west.

For many years Nova Scotia had a Liberal government but the tide turned and at the last election but one the Liberals were defeated and the Harrington administration was formed. Now the turn has come again and the Liberals will again take charge of the affairs of the province.

### TITLES UP AGAIN

Somebody is always bringing up the question of titles. Now it is Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in London, who urges that they might be given but not to politicians.

We are unalterably opposed to the granting of titles to anyone but if they are to be given we see no reason why politicians should be excluded. Premier Bennett and Mr. Mackenzie King are just as much entitled to recognition as any other people in Canada if it is felt that they have done their work well.

The difficulty in regard to titles is that they often go to the wrong people and those who are really deserving are left out. The man who does any kind of work well is entitled to official recognition. Let a laborer dig ditches better than the ordinary and he is entitled to recognition just as much as the chief justice who has always drawn a good salary and held in his hands the balance of life and death.

The better plan is to avoid titles altogether. It encourages the pulling of strings to obtain recognition and is a fruitful source of snobbery and an instigation to socialism, communism and all the other isms to which we object.

Sound is uninhabited although fishermen occasionally drop in there and prospectors have of late become interested in the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands owing to the favorable reports being sent out in regard to the gold mining activities on Kootenay Harbor and Gold Harbor not far south of the sound but on Moresby Island instead of Graham Island.

No explanation is given as to the reason why an American survey party should be operating on Rennell Sound. In fact the whole operation is shrouded in mystery. During the past season or two Canadian destroyers have visited Skidegate Inlet but no word was received of their having gone up Rennell Sound although they may well have done so when protecting the seal herds on their annual northward migration.

## HAD BEEN DESPONDENT

Joseph Renner Who Shot Himself Recently on Queen Charlottes Was Highly Respected

Further particulars have been received from the Queen Charlotte Islands in regard to the recent death of Joseph Renner. It seems that he shot himself in the woodshed adjoining his home with a twelve bore shotgun and was quite dead when found by a harvest hand who ran to the spot when he heard the report of the gun.

The man at once rowed to Queen Charlotte City and reported the tragedy to Police Constable G. C. Sharpe who fetched the remains to the village. An inquest was conducted by A. L. Mallory.

Mr. Renner was well known and highly respected in the community. At one time he owned a large dairy farm in California but sold it to join the rush to the Klondike. He then went to Atlin and operated placer mines. It was in 1907 that he went to Queen Charlotte Islands and took up land at Maude Island in Skidegate Inlet where he was looked upon as one of the successful farmers.

A little over a year ago Mr. Renner lost his wife who died following a brief illness at the Queen Charlotte City Hospital. Since that time he had been despondent and many times told friends he wished he were with his wife.

The remains were buried at the Queen Charlotte cemetery, all local pioneers attending. Pallbearers were H. Beavan, A. C. Pallant, E. C. Stevens, G. Carmichael and Capt. John Haan. Rev. Mr. McKenzie officiated.
