JAPANESE CHARGED WITH ESPIONAGE

OLOF HANSON TAKES UP NAVIGATION AIDS IN COMMONS

Lights on Butterworth Rocks and Bonilla are Again Being Asked For

Strong Plea on Behalf of Prince Rupert Harbor Made by Local Member—Asks Minister to Send Departmental Experts North

OTTAWA, April 29:—Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, made a strong plea in the House of Commons last night during discussion of marine estimates to the Minister of Marine, Hon. Alfred Duranleau, to provide the two lights regarded by Lloyds as necessary to give Prince Rupert Harbor equal insurance and freight rates with other Pacific Coast ports. The minister promised to give the matter consideration.

Mr. Hanson said: "I would like to call the attention of the minister to a matter brought before him from boards of trade and shipping interests regarding the harbor of Prince Rupert. It was surveyed a few years ago and it was found by representatives of Lloyds that, in order that it should enjoy equal insurance and freight rates, it was necessary to have two lights installed—one at Bonilla Island and another at Butterworth Rocks. It was taken up with the department and I think looked into. I wonder if, now that the minister is sending experts to look into the situation at New Westminster and other places, he would have them at the same time see what could be done in regard to these two lights. I know the minister has full particulars and I would be glad if he would give me some information."

LOAN ACCORD BETWEEN BRITAIN AND FRANCE

PARIS, April 29: (Canadian Press)—An accord between the Bank of England and the French treasury by which a sum of between a billion and two and a half billion francs will be made available to the French treasury was signed yesterday.

BENNETT PLEASED

Canadian Premier Satisfied With Washington Conversations — Urges Currency Stabilization

Joint Statement

Reach Understanding for Economic Improvement — To Exchange Commodities

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29 (Canadian Press)—An appeal for stabilization of world currencies was made last night by Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada as he wound up three days of discussion on world economic problems with President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Mr. Bennett declared that the conversations had been of the greatest possible value and expressed warm appreciation of the initiative taken by President Roosevelt.

Prime Minister Bennett and President Roosevelt today announced that an understanding had been reached on the purposes of economic improvement. They also announced that they have agreed to begin a search "for means to increase exchange of commodities between our two countries."

They declared that it was imperative that, as soon as practicable, an international monetary standard be restored. Improvement of silver prices is also under consideration.

Serious Charges Made by Tom Reid in House in Connection With Activities of Orientals

Asserts That Naval Officers Obtained Employment as Fishermen and Devoted Their Efforts to Familiarizing Themselves With B. C. Coastline

OTTAWA, April 29: (Canadian Press)—Charges that Japanese naval officers in the guise of fishermen obtained employment on fishing vessels in British Columbia had actually been devoting their activities to familiarizing themselves with Canada's Pacific coast were made in the House of Commons last night by Thomas Reid, Liberal member for New Westminster, during discussion of estimates of the Department of Fisheries.

Protesting against increasing the number of fishing licences to the Japanese, Mr. Reid declared that any such increase would result merely in the building up of a piece of Japan in Canada.

Many officers of the Japanese naval service made it a practice to secure employment as fishermen on Japanese-owned vessels. "They were spying and I'm not afraid to say so," declared Mr. Reid.

BIG GAIN IN WHEAT

Another Bull Drive Forces Up Nearly Four Cents on Winnipeg Market Today

WINNIPEG, April 29—Smashing gains of nearly four cents were marked up at the close of another bull drive on the Winnipeg wheat market today.

INCREASE HOLDINGS

Pacific American Fisheries Takes Over Eleven Canneries, giving It Twenty-Five in All

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 29 (Canadian Press)—Adding eleven canneries to its holdings and giving it a total of twenty-five canneries in Alaska and on Puget Sound, the Pacific American Fisheries Co. has leased, with the privilege of purchase, the properties of the Northwestern Fisheries in Alaska.

Archie C. Shiels, president of the Pacific American Fisheries, was here yesterday afternoon aboard the steamer Princess Norah returning to Bellingham after a business trip to Juneau.

Police Court Fines Are Down This Year

Police court fines for the city of Prince Rupert for the month of April this year amounted to only \$105 as compared with \$180 in the same month last year. So far this year fines have totalled \$326 as against \$960 in the first four months of 1932.

EVERTON WON CUP

Defeated Manchester City 2 to Nil in English Final—Immense Crowd Present

LONDON, April 29: (Canadian Press)—Before a crowd of 200,000 fans at Wembley Park, Everton defeated Manchester City by a score of three to nil today to win the English Football Cup final. A crowd estimated at 100,000 squeezed into the stadium while as many more clamored outside the stadium, viewing the match from any vantage point.

Everton's attack had the Manchester team up against the wall for the most of the game. Brilliant sallies of combination kept them well on top and, at times, they displayed brilliant football.

Everton's goals were tallied by J. Stein, outside left, in the first half while Dean, one of the greatest of English goal scorers, and J. Dunn tallied in the second half.

LABOR HEAD OPPOSED TO FIVE-DAY WEEK

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29:—Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, told the House of Representatives labor committee that the five-day week plan would make serfs of American industrial workers.

Four Members of Crew and Two Passengers in Narrow Escape as Motorship Burns

KETCHIKAN, April 29: (Canadian Press)—A coastguard cutter reached here yesterday with passengers, crew and mail from the Noyes Boat Co.'s passenger and freight motorship City of Anacortes which burned to the water's edge when a backfiring motor set the vessel afire in Pearce Channel off Halibut Bay near Hidden Inlet while enroute Thursday morning from Hyder to Ketchikan.

The crew of four men and two women passengers had a narrow escape. The captain beached the craft after it had taken fire but those on board had to swim ten yards to shore when the only lifeboat sank. The mail on board was saved but everything else, including five barrels of Canadian beer, was lost.

CAME NEAR TO TRAGEDY

Former Mayor Harry Gale of Vancouver and Family Almost Asphyxiated Yesterday

Maniac Feared

Gas Had Been Released From Kitchen Range and Six Lives Endangered as Result

VANCOUVER, April 29: (Canadian Press)—Gas, released by an unknown hand, almost snuffed out the lives of R. Harry Gale, former mayor of Vancouver and financial agent, and his entire family in their home on Hudson Avenue early yesterday. In addition to the former mayor, others who escaped death were Mrs. Harry Gale, his wife; Harry Gale jr.; the latter's bride of a week, the former Margaret McFarlane; Bobby Gale, a younger son, and May Hughes, a maid.

Mrs. Gale sr. was the most seriously affected by the gas, which was flowing from six jets in the kitchen range, but she has recovered.

Entry was made to the house through the back door apparently between 1:30 and 3 o'clock in the morning. Nothing in the house was disturbed and the police are investigating on the theory that a wanton murder maniac, seeking vengeance for some fancied injury, was abroad in the Shaughnessy Heights district.

The lives of the family were saved when Harry Gale jr. smelled gas and awoke, dashed downstairs and turned the jets off.

The key to the kitchen door had, apparently, been pushed out and the door opened by the intruder by means of a skeleton key. The swing door from the kitchen to the hall leading upstairs was open. The oven door of the stove was also open.

APPROVED BY SENATE

Farm Relief and Inflation Program Passes Upper House of United States Congress

Wide Powers

Given President and Secretary of Agriculture to Assist Commerce and Farming

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29: (Canadian Press)—The Roosevelt administration's momentous farm relief and inflation program was passed by the United States Senate last night by a vote of 63 to 21 and was sent to the House of Representatives where it is believed to be assured of passage.

The measure empowers the president to increase from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 the amount he may accept in silver at fifty cents per ounce in the next six months on war debts payments. This, it is estimated, will reduce the actual payments for debtor nations by thirty percent while not affecting the amount United States will receive under inflation.

The president is also empowered to reduce the gold content of the American dollar by fifty percent.

The measure also vests extensive permissive powers in the president to expand America's credit and currency by at least \$8,000,000,000.

The farm relief section authorizes Secretary of Agriculture Wallace to loan up to \$2,000,000,000 in aiding farmers at a low rate of interest. He is also empowered to set minimum prices for certain farm products as well as to offer certain subsidies.

HIS BODY IS FOUND

Remains of Bert Hinkler and His Wrecked Plane Are Located in Italy Yesterday

CASTLE SAN NICOTO, Italy, April 29—Bert Hinkler, noted Australian aviator, apparently crashed head-on into a mountainside on January 17 in the course of his attempted record-breaking non-stop flight from England to Australia. His body and the wrecked machine were found here yesterday.

A SATURDAY SERMON

Prejudice

(Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, B.A., Pastor, First Presbyterian Church)

In the gospel story we read of only one man who hesitated when invited to become a follower of Jesus Christ. He was Nathaniel. He hesitated because of his prejudice towards the city of Nazareth. "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth?" he asked somewhat scornfully.

History and literature abound in illustrations of the force and power of prejudice. Never was there a new invention or discovery, never was there an original effort for social and religious progress which did not encounter the opposition of prejudice. Let a man change or attempt some change in social life, let him preach the blessings of fresh air and fresh water, for example, and he will be called anything from a faddist to a fool.

Browning indicates the force of prejudice in religious thought when he tells of a cultured poet Cleon who ventured to remonstrate with his king when the latter proposed to study the teaching of the apostle Paul. Cleon is prejudiced and, therefore, scornful. He asks: "Thou canst not think a mere barbarian Jew
 "Has access to a secret shut from us?"
 "Thou wrongest our philosophy, O King."

In the realm of religious thought prejudice is especially evident. Many who are desirous of thinking for themselves in every other sphere of life are not willing to think for themselves when it comes to religion. The result is that those who do attempt to think for themselves are labelled heretics and unorthodox. The opposition to Pearl Buck, well known missionary and author

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WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Activities in Connection With Salmon Trolling—New Engine Installations—Halibut Landings

Spring salmon trolling activities are now beginning to get more fully under way in Prince Rupert district although it is expected that it will be the middle of May before the bulk of the fleet gets out on the various grounds for the season's operations. The run has so far not been of such proportions as to encourage an earlier start than usual and, also, there has been a rather disappointing falling off in prices very recently.

Some fifty boats are now understood to be operating on the North Island grounds, this number being about evenly divided between white and native fishermen and practically all being gasboats. The run there so far has been very light. Fishing activities have not started as yet at Hippo Island on the Queen Charlottes, the native boats of Skidegate waiting for the packers to start service before commencing fishing there.

There is more or less desultory fishing going on at Dundas and Stephens Islands and the grounds closer in to Prince Rupert.

The first fish packer to arrive on the scene at North Island this season under company auspices was the Takla, Capt. Chris Parkvold, regularly a halibutter, which has been chartered for the season by Edmunds & Walker to pack fish from there to New Westminster. Fully outfitted for her first trip, the Takla left Prince Rupert on Tuesday of this week for North Island to pick up her first load for New Westminster. Later on in the season it is expected Edmunds & Walker will have some four or five packers in all making the long run from North Island to New Westminster.

Packing springs from North Island to Butedale for the Canadian Fishing Co. will start next week with the Massett seineboat-packer Edenshaw, Capt. Harry Edenshaw.

Recently a 40 h.p. Finnoy engine was installed for Capt. William Leask of Metlakatla in his well known seineboat and packer Hazel L.

Orville F. Denstedt is due to return to Prince Rupert at the middle of May to rejoin the scientific staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station after having spent the past six months engaged in continuation of studies at McGill University in Montreal.

Cannery Crews Arrive

Delayed by having heavy freights for cannery points along her route, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, running almost 12 hours late, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from the south and sailed an hour or so later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Cardena brought north the crews for the Canadian Fishing Co.'s canneries at Carlisle and Haysport on the Skeena River including A. D. Matheson and Clarence E. Salter, the respective managers. Mr. Matheson was accompanied by his wife.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1933 season continue to maintain their increase in volume over last year. For the present season up to and including yesterday landings at the port had totalled 3,613,500 pounds as compared with 2,972,950 pounds at the corresponding date last year. Canadian landings for this season had reached a total of 1,460,700 pounds as against last year's 1,369,050 pounds at a similar date while the American total for 1933 to date was 2,152,800 pounds as compared with 1,603,900 pounds last year. For the week of April 22-28 this year landings totalled 515,500 pounds comprising 238,000 Canadian and 277,500 pounds American fish. Top price of the week for Canadian fish was 5.3c and 2c which the Prosperity A. received for 22,000 pounds while the low price of the week for Canadian fish was 4c and 2c which the Covenant and Rose Spit received for catches of 25,000 and 23,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the high bid of the week was 6.5c and 3c which the Majestic received for 32,000 pounds and the low 4.1c and 2c which the Tahoma accepted for 7,000 pounds.

The Bruce I, Capt. Brandy Newell, arrived in Prince Rupert yesterday from Vancouver, which port she left on Monday, enroute to the Queen Charlottes to start packing from Hippo Island to Butedale for the Canadian Fishing Co. The B. and Y., Capt. Don Yelf, is due in Prince Rupert next week also from Vancouver and will be used as well in the service of the Canadian Fishing Co. packing from Hippo Island to Butedale. It is possible that the Bruce and B. and Y. may be diverted later from the Hippo Island to the North Island run.

Capt. Johnny Clausen has started packing from the Dundas Island and Warke Canal trollers into the Prince Rupert market.

About the middle of May, or possibly a little later, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. is expected to start its packing services to such fishing grounds as North Island, Hippo Island, Dundas Island and Warke Canal.

The Union Oil Co. has had its tank scow and commissary, with George Smith in charge, on the ground at North Island ready for business since mid-April. Sam L. Simpson of Massett will operate a similar establishment at North Island, handling Home Oil Distributors Ltd. products and is now engaged at Massett in getting the scow and outfit in readiness for business.

Trollers at Dundas Island will be served by a commissary to be operated by the Northern British Columbia Salmon Fishermen's Co-operative Association.

The opening price being offered by the company packers at North Island is 5½c per pound for red springs.

New Engine Installations

The Pacific Machine Works at Prince Rupert is engaged in the installation of Finnoy semi-diesel engines of Norwegian manufacture in a number of local fishing vessels.

The most important of these installations is a 60 h.p. machine which is being placed in Capt. Ole Skog's big seineboat Fredelia, replacing a 40 h.p. Frisco-Standard gasoline engine. Prior to installation of the engine, the Fredelia was at the McLean Ways to receive a new sternpost and engine bed. The engine, which arrived this week, was lifted into the Fredelia by use of the Albert & McCaffery crane.

Finnoy engines of 15 h.p. in each case are to be installed in new 33-foot trolling boats which have been built for Harold Holkestad, who was owner of the halibut boat Helge H., which was lost at the opening of the fishing season, and who has now turned to trolling, and for J. Haggen, who formerly had the troller Whitewater. Holkestad's new boat has been built at Digby Island by Ed. Wahl and is due here any day and Haggen's at Oona River, Por-
