NO MORE CHANGES IN HIS CABINET LIBERALS READY TO GIVE PROVINCE GOOD GOVERNMENT

Pattullo Tells Large Audience How Party Would Meet Problems

Unemployment is Most Pressing Matter—Work and Wages Instead of Dole—Reviews Platform

"Let our opponents call it a machine if they will, but I can tell you that the Liberal party has a better organization today than ever in its history and we are ready to take over the affairs of this province tomorrow and enact without delay measures for the benefit of the people as a whole in accordance with Liberal ideals. On the other hand, if you put into office inexperienced men, it will be two years before they will know what to do and the country will continue to suffer during the immediate future when it is so essential that action should be taken. If I am given the majority that Premier Tolmie enjoyed in the last legislature, and I am confident that such a majority is going to be given us on November 2, do you think I will hesitate in putting our policies into effect?"

He spoke T. D. Pattullo, Liberal leader, last night in addressing at the Moose Hall here one of the largest public meetings ever held in Prince Rupert.

Most Important Problem
The most important problem facing the province today, declared Mr. Pattullo, was that of unemployment.

FALCONER IN FIELD

Well Known Alice Arm Merchant to Run in Atlin as Independent

T. W. Falconer, Alice Arm merchant, who was the Conservative candidate for Atlin in the last provincial election, has decided to enter the forthcoming contest as an independent candidate. He makes the fourth candidate in the field in Atlin, the others being W. J. Asselstine, Liberal, T. J. Shenton, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, and H. W. M. Rolston, independent.

Television Test Abruptly Ends

Engineers Experimenting at Dancing Rehearsal Find Rays Reveal More Than Expected

LONDON, Sept. 20: (CP)—An unexpected un-dress rehearsal caused a television test being made by two research men of the British Broadcasting Corporation to end suddenly. They were engineers experimenting with infra-red ray television and were "looking in" at a row of dancing girls who were being televised when, to their astonishment, they noticed that only one of the girls appeared to be clothed.

The experiment finished abruptly and the girls, who were clad in cotton dancing tunics, were told that it could not go on until they dressed themselves in silk. The explanation proved to be quite simple: The dark dyes in the cotton tunics did not reflect the infra-red rays. These penetrated the loose mesh of the fabric, so that the television projector "saw" through everything. The one girl who appeared to be clothed was wearing silk.

employment. He expressed unqualified and complete opposition to the present method of the dole and declared that, for it, should be substituted the Liberal policy of "work and wages" on a national program of public works. For such work, Mr. Pattullo prophesied, the federal government would soon be lending money to the provinces without interest.

"Where precedent has been found to be good," Mr. Pattullo declared, "we will maintain it. Where it has been found to be bad, we will scrap it and, where necessary, we will make it."

Mr. Pattullo reviewed the Liberal platform in regard to financing, promising the abolition of "nuisance taxes" and efforts to reduce interest charges. Provincial and municipal finances would be overhauled so as to make it possible for the municipalities to look after their people and survive. The Liberal party stood for the encouragement of market expansion and the leader promised that it would be his endeavor to co-operate with the federal and other provincial governments, regardless of their political color, with a view to developing markets and in other matters.

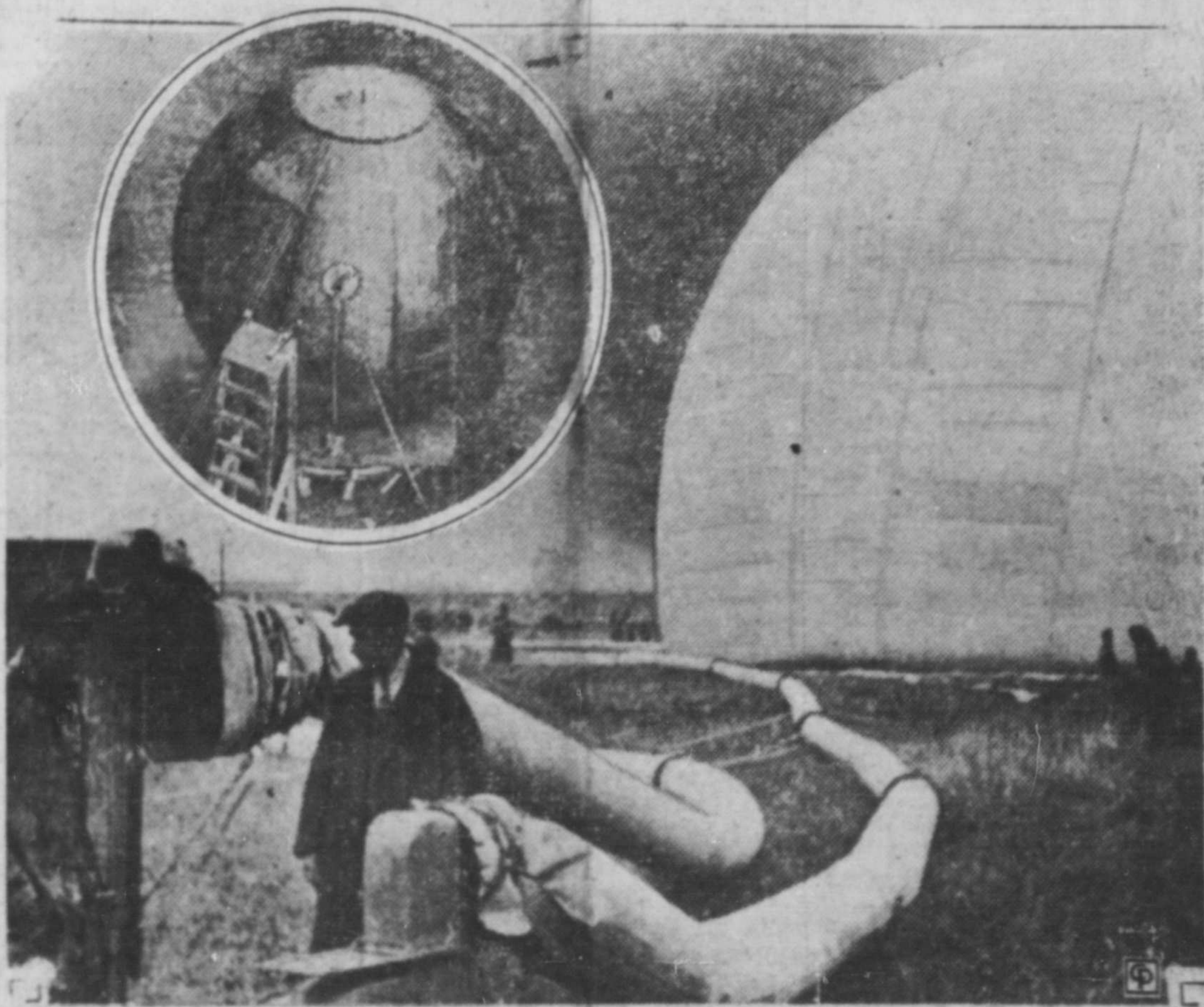
Local Matters
In opening his address, Mr. Pattullo expressed his pleasure at being again in Prince Rupert to address such a large audience. This community, he said, had had many disappointments but he was confident that there were better things in store for the immediate future. He referred to the great potentialities of the north, the development of which must some day be of immense value to Prince Rupert.

The world today, said Mr. Pattullo, was facing more and greater problems in the social and economical field than ever before, these being due largely to the progress of civilization. Turning to matters political, Mr. Pattullo declared that all the multiplicity of parties in the provincial field today had received their inspiration from the Liberal party—even the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation had designed much of its platform from that of the Liberals.

Despite the pussyfooting which might be done to disguise it, Mr. Pattullo declared that the C. C. F. stood for a straight socialistic state and no socialistic state could be maintained without force. Under a C. C. F. government there could be no such personal freedom of expression and initiative as was permitted under the capitalistic system. What the C. C. F. would actually set up would be a socialistic autocracy. The Liberal party took the course that it stood for the greatest benefit for the greatest number. Mr. Pattullo expressed the view

that party government could not be done away with. There were now and there would always be two parties—the "ins" and the "outs."

The financial structure of the province would have to be overhauled, declared Mr. Pattullo. The province could not continue to go on paying interest rates of seven and eight percent.

Education was another important problem which was being felt locally through the raising of the age for children entering school and the imposition of fees on children over 16 years of age.

Provincial - municipal financial relations would also be thoroughly reviewed by the Liberals if returned to power so that the municipalities might be permitted to look after their interests and survive.

In promising the attention of the Liberal party to a policy of market extension, Mr. Pattullo urged the importance of co-operating with the United States with a view, if possible, to having timber restored to the free list and the duty on fish removed.

Turning to unemployment, Mr. Pattullo felt that the present dole system was breaking down the morale of the men. Children were being charged to go to school on the one hand while, on the other, no provision was being made for their employment.

Mr. Pattullo—The banks won't let us have it. The banks will let it do it because they won't have the say whether they will let us or not. (Applause.)

Here Mr. Pattullo prophesied that the federal government would soon be lending money to the provinces without interest at all to assist them in financing public works.

The present system of production and distribution of wealth, declared Mr. Pattullo, was wrong. It was the Liberal policy to do what it could to change it and also to use its influence in the matter.

Under the public works policy which the Liberal party planned to inaugurate, it might be possible for Prince Rupert to have its road in three or four years, Mr. Pattullo suggested.

Conditions for road-building today were different than ten years ago. Inclusion of the road under a national program then would have seemed ridiculous.

"That road was started under me and it is going to be finished under me," declared Mr. Pattullo after some questions had been asked on the subject.

Mr. Pattullo described the Liberal plan to establish an economic council, the membership of which should consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavor such as health, agriculture, labor and industry, for the purpose of studying industrial and social effort in the province and suggesting means to the government of cor-

relating these efforts. Such a committee would familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade and also study such problems as production and consumption, marketing of products, number of hours of work per day and days per week and the standard of wages and commodity prices.

The Liberal leader expressed his appreciation of the electorate of Prince Rupert having supported him so consistently through the past years. The people here had been faithful to him and he believed they could expect he would be faithful to their interests.

Other Speakers The meeting was presided over by G. W. Nickerson. Major S. F. M. Moodie of Victoria, Liberal organizer for the province, and Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, were also heard briefly.

Major Moodie spoke of the political situation in the province. The Independents he described as being really Conservatives now attempting to get into office again by the back door in view of the realization that the Toimie government had been such a failure and the "non-partisan" movement of Mr. Bowser's such an "absolute flop."

While some of the aims of the C. F. E. were to be approved of and were actually contained in the Liberal platform, some of the methods of this party were "entirely undemocratic," Major Moodie condemned the inner group of nine in which so much power was vested.

"I don't believe there will be a handful of C. C. F.'s elected or that the people of this province are going to be hoodwinked by former Conservatives posing as Independents," declared Major Moodie.

Mr. Nickerson, who reminded the audience that he had opposed the Liberal party on occasion in the past, urged that it would be advisable for Prince Rupert to have a friend in the captain of the ship after November 2. Need of government support in municipal finances particularly would be essential if the city were to survive.

OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

T. D. Pattullo in Great Fighting Form at Meeting Monday in Stewart

Reviews Policy

Tells How Liberals Would Go About Facing Problems of Day

STEWART, Sept. 20.—T. D. Pattullo, Liberal leader, was in his best fighting form in addressing a large meeting here Monday night, it being the opening gun in a whirlwind speaking campaign which will take the leader of the opposition all through the province before election day. The meeting was in the interests of W. J. Asselstine, Liberal candidate for Atlin riding.

Mr. Pattullo's speech was constructive throughout. He spent no time on his political opponents but devoted forty-five minutes to a rapid-fire review of Liberal policy, pledging "immediate action in the interests of all the people." Liberal policy, he stated, was not a thing of glittering generalities adopted hurriedly in an effort to please but was the result of earnest thought in which liberally-minded persons throughout the province had been consulted. Openly arrived at in the largest and most representative political convention the province had ever seen, the Liberal platform suggested sane, progressive and immediate action on all the major problems facing the country.

"The greatest of all our problems is that of employment of our citizens," the Liberal leader declared. He would, if returned to power, at once appoint an advisory economic council of experts in all lines of endeavor, recommended by the interests which they represented, to study and advise upon every phase of community life. Necessary public undertakings should be carried forward vigorously now in order that the citizens should be restored to gainful activity.

Freedom of members of the legislature to vote upon public measures as they saw fit "without heed to the crack of the party whip" was an essential plank of the Liberal platform, Mr. Pattullo asserted.

Broad measures to rationalize the educational system, to make fairer the relation of provincial and municipal governments and to remove the anomalies of the present taxation policy were provided for in the program of provincial Liberalism.

W. J. Asselstine, the Liberal candidate, welcomed Mr. Pattullo as "the only real political leader in the province."

Major S. F. M. Moodie, provincial Liberal organizer, analyzed the present political situation.

H. B. Campbell was chairman.

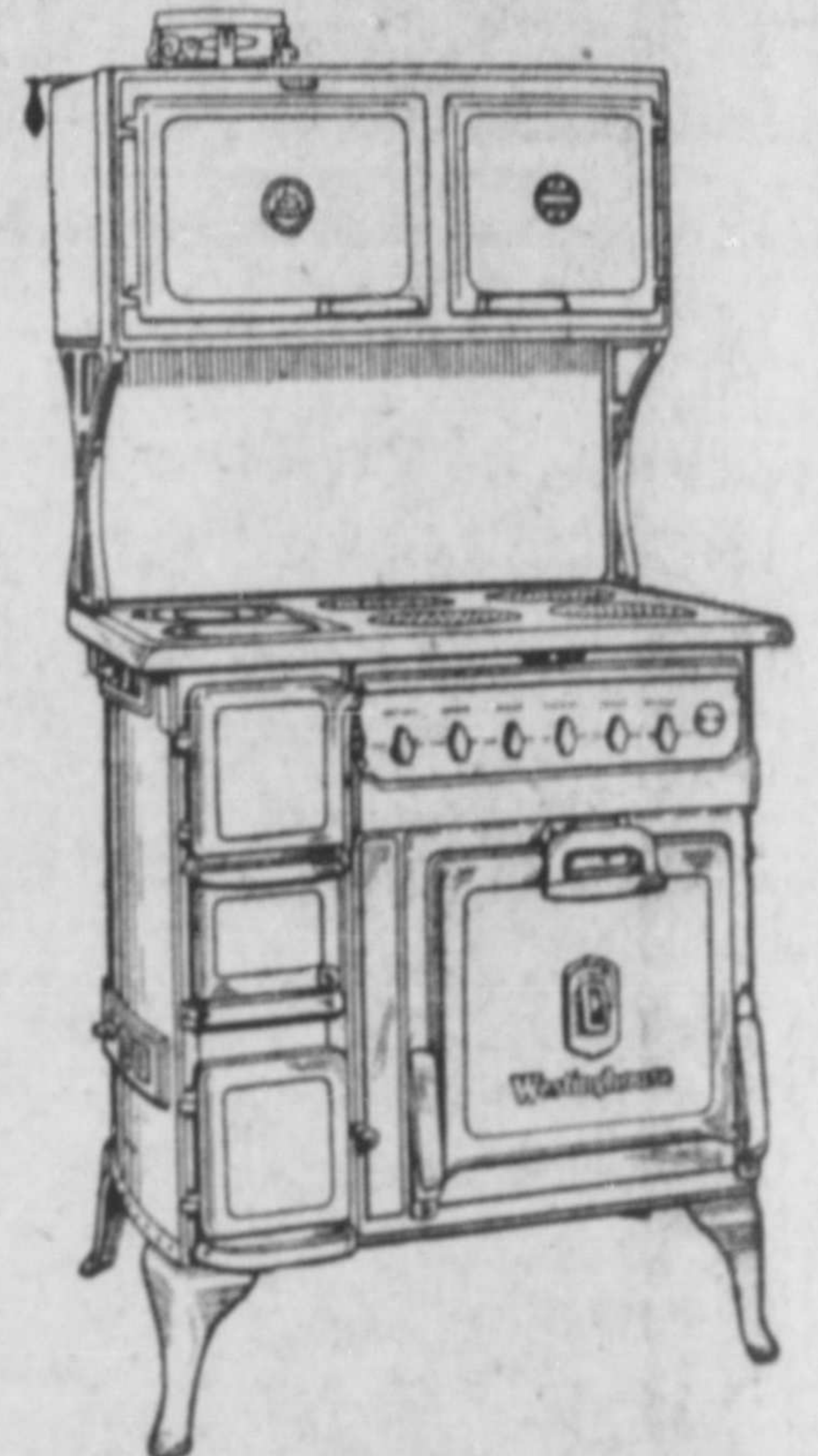
