## S.S. DOLPHIN STRUCK A REEF OFF PEARSE ISLAND

### NO LIVES WERE LOST AND THE VESSEL WAS FLOATED OFF THE ROCKS LEAKING BADLY

### LOCAL MEN SECURE CONTROL OF CONTINENTAL TRUST CO.

"UNCLE JERRY" KUGLER DISPOSES OF HIS INTEREST TO ALDERMEN G. R. NADEN AND M. P. McCAFFERY.

A financial deal of more than ordinary importance was consummated on Saturday, when Messrs. G. R. Naden and M. P. McCaffery, two of Prince Rupert's best known real estate men, purchased from "Uncle Jerry" Kugler the controlling interest in the Continental Trust Company. That local men of such business integrity as Mr. Naden and Mr. McCaffery rather than an outsider having no other interests at stake in Prince Rupert should get control of the institution is a matter upon which its clients can congratulate themselves.

The Continental Trust Company is essentially a home institution, practically all the stock being held by local people, and it is the first institution of its kind organized in Prince Rupert. It has been doing business for two years, during which time its business has steadily increased. The numerous clients speak in the highest terms of the management of the institution and have no complaints in regard to the general service that has been rendered them. In Mr. M. J. Robin the company has a most capable manager who has handled its affairs in a sane, businesslike method.

Mr. Kugler has been forced to relinquish his control of the company as a result of his accident of a few months ago. Not having entirely recovered from its effects, he is unable to attend to business and for this reason his son, Jay H. Kugler, who has been looking after his interests here, finds it imperative to go to Vancouver permanently to take charge of his father's business affairs there. Mr. Kugler's removal from Prince Rupert will be regretted by a host of business friends and acquaintances.

The annual general meeting of the Continental Trust Company will be held in this city on July 7th, when new officers and directors will be elected.

### CLERGY SHOULD NOT DICTATE TO PEOPLE

Rural Dean Cayley Points a Moral Line of Conduct for Toronto Pastors.

Toronto, June 28.—That individuals have no right to pass censorious judgment upon the habits of their fellowmen unless the thing was undoubtedly immoral was the claim made by Rural Dean Cayley, in the course of a striking sermon at St. Simon's Church Sunday.

Telling how speakers in a church gathering recently had urged their clergy to denounce members of their congregations who attended the theatre and the races, he asked what right they had to assume guardianship of another man's conscience. He did not think that a clergyman, or any Christian had any right to dictate specifically to others as to the theatres or other places of amusement. There was a difference of opinion about these things and no one had any right to dictate as to what anyone should do.

The function of the church was to lay down the great ideals and principles as set by Christ, it was to set forth the responsibility of man to man, but each Christian must be left to apply these truths for himself.

### FORCES OF BULGARIA ARE UTTERLY ROUTED

After Desperate Fighting in Macedonia the Bulgars Flew, Leaving Many Dead.

Belgrade, June 26.—The Bulgarians have been defeated at Zletove. An official report states that the Servians went into the positions only when the heavy forces of Bulgarians began to cross the river.

After desperate fighting the Bulgarians broke and fled, leaving behind many dead and wounded and abandoning all the positions they had seized in Servian territory.

London, June 26.—According to Servian reports, a serious battle occurred yesterday at Bkonena Zletove, near Istip, between the Servians and Bulgarians.

Whether this outbreak will obstruct the projected Russian arbitration by strengthening the war party in Serbia will be seen when Premier Pachich, with his reconstructed ministry, meets the Skupshina in extraordinary session.

### PRINCESS REFUSES TO TRAVEL SECOND CLASS

Thinks Russian Government is Rich Enough to Pay First Class if They Want Her

New York, June 28.—The Russian government will have to produce something better than a second class ticket if it expects to drag Princess Olga Golitzine back to the Czar's court and away from America and her ambitions to become an actress. The Princess was traced here by Russian secret service agents after she had fled from her husband.

When the Russian consul sent the steamship ticket to Princess Olga's apartment and she found it was for a second-class passage, she rebelled.

"I am not so far gone that my wealthy government can send me home second class," the Princess declared. "I will not go." And she didn't.

### SENTIMENT OF PROVINCE IS INSTINCTIVELY LIBERAL

DECLARES PARTY'S PROVINCIAL ORGANIZER, WALTER W. BAER, WHO WILL SHORTLY ADDRESS MEETINGS HERE AND THROUGH DISTRICT

"There are many thousands of good Liberals in this province. They need only to be brought together," says Walter W. Baer, organizer of the Liberal party in British Columbia. Mr. Baer, who arrived here from Vancouver on Saturday will spend a month in this district. He leaves with the excursion to-morrow for Hazelton, from which place he will proceed to Telkwa. When passing through Hazelton he will make arrangements for addressing a big public meeting there on his return. He expects to be back in Prince Rupert in about twelve days and anticipates that there will be arranged here one or perhaps two public meetings for the discussion of Federal and Provincial politics. During the remainder of the month which he will spend in this district Mr. Baer intends to make trips to the north and south ends of Graham Island, to Stewart, Granby Bay and other places.

"So you think that the prospects for Liberalism in this province are becoming decidedly more favorable, Mr. Baer," queried the News reporter.

"Not only do I think that but I would contend that this province is instinctively Liberal, despite the complexion of its present government," said Mr. Baer. "During the past eight or nine months I have covered the territory in the south section of the province from the Crow's Nest Pass to the Boundary country, all the lower mainland constituencies and all the Vancouver Island constituencies. The reorganization and rehabilitation of the Liberal party has proved a pleasant task. The hearty cooperation of the Liberals in the theory and system under which the reorganization is being effected constituted one of the most encouraging features of the work.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brewer came out from Ootsa Lake a few days ago, being the first settlers to bring a wagon through from Ootsa.

W. W. Wrathall, the Hazelton photographer, who recently visited Smithers, has some excellent views of the townsite and surroundings.

J. Linkin King, C. E., who has charge of Harold Price's surveying operations in this district is expected to arrive here shortly to undertake surveys in this vicinity.

F. B. Chettleburgh will pay a visit to the Copper River coal fields to arrange for the continuance of development work, which will be in charge of J. K. Ashman.

It is understood that Lynch Bros. of Prince Rupert will establish a branch of their grocery and provision business in Smithers as soon as trains are running to this point.
