WILLIE RITCHIE GETS DECISION OVER AD. WOLGAST--WRONG KIND OF IMMIGRANTS COMING

SECRETARY FISHERMEN'S UNION GIVES PRINCE RUPERT BOOST

THIS WILL BE GREATEST PORT ON COAST--MANY HALIBUT FISHING COMPANIES TO MOVE HERE FROM SOUTHERN CITIES.

Believe that Prince Rupert soon will be the greatest fishing port on the coast," remarked P. Gill, the secretary of the Halibut Fishermen's Union, to The News. Mr. Gill was here yesterday with the members of the union.

The banks north of here and off the coast of Southeastern Alaska, the halibut banks of Vancouver Island are about played out and even Hecate Straits are not as prolific as they were. The northern banks will not in any way have a tendency to injure the transportation advantages of the Grand Trunk, as this port is the nearest to any of the banks. The farther north the boats go the farther away they will be from Seattle and Vancouver, making it necessary to have headquarters as near to the banks as possible.

WILLIE RITCHIE GETS VICTORY BEATS WOLGAST IN TEN ROUNDS

WOLGAST WAS OUTFOUGHT AND OUTGENERATED ALL WAY THROUGH--RITCHIE IN GREAT FORM.

(Special to The Daily News) Vancouver, March 13.—A down in the seventh round superior glove work gave Ritchie the victory over Wolgast, the former light champion, at the end of rounds of fighting. The Californian boxer outfought and outwitted Wolgast. He landed heavily with left hooks, solid punches and punches to the head. Wolgast was frequently warned by the referee to stop his apparent rough tactics. After he had protested Wolgast made a rushing battle but after Ritchie floored him in the seventh round with a punch to the stomach it was obvious that he was out of his speed. Wolgast was counted out four before re-

suming. Ritchie made desperate attempts to knock him out. Wolgast fouled in the seventh round, when the champion delivered a hard blow to the Michigan boy's groin. According to a statement made by Dr. C. A. Morter, a member of the State Commission of Boxing, after Wolgast went to the dressing room he underwent an examination. Only in the sixth round did the former champion show any of his old time cleverness, when with right hook to the jaw it was followed by a lefthand uppercut which made Ritchie wobble. The crowd cheered both contestants madly. Wolgast seemed to be the favorite with the house and the crowd frequently rose en masse and cheered him wildly after a brilliant rally.

JOHNSON, PUGILIST, DECIDED TO LEAVE SWEDEN

PORTLAND WATERFRONT SWEEP BY BIG FIRE

Dock and Shipping Destroyed to Extent of Million Dollars.

(Special to The Daily News) Portland, March 12.—Fire early this morning swept all that section of Portland's waterfront on the East Side from Upper to Lower Albina ferries, completely destroying the Columbia Dock No. 2 and Montgomery Dock No. 1. The steamships Cricket and Glen Roy and much other property were destroyed, the whole entailing a loss of \$1,000,000.

The cause of the fire is unknown. The steamship Cricket, which was loaded with asphalt, burned fiercely. As a preventive measure she was cut loose for the purpose of permitting her to float down the river, but instead of going to the centre of the stream she floated along the docks, spreading the flames wherever she approached.

SAID HE WAS SON OF EMPEROR WILLIAM

Charles Coler Dies at Chicago--Was Man Without Work and With Income.

Chicago, March 12.—Charles Coler, who said William I of Germany was his father, died yesterday in the county hospital. His claim had been the cause of much official correspondence, but the replies he received, while polite and ingratiating, were unmistakably in purport.

Right or wrong, the German Empire would have none of him. Notwithstanding this fact, he received a liberal pension from some source. He never worked. He resembled members of Germany's reigning family closely and hundreds of Germans here believed his claim was correct.

He contended he was born in Berlin September 20, 1848, and that by right the throne was his. To the public he never explained why he was an exile. It is said this was made clear in the official documents, but carefully guarded.

WED AT GREINA GREEN IN THE OLD-TIME WAY

London, March 12.—Greina Green, the famous Scottish border village, revived some of its ancient glories yesterday when a wedding after the old fashion of the runaway matches of last century, was celebrated between a man living in Perth and his bride, a native of Bevan.

They chose the place because of its romantic association and without consulting their parents jumped into an automobile and journeyed to the border. According to the old time custom, one of the villagers acted as priest on the spot where, in the old days, the blacksmith united many lovers who jumped out of post chaise in which they had ridden across England to be married only a minute before irate parents arrived in hot pursuit.

SUFFRAGETTES AFTER WESTMINSTER ABBEY

Threaten to Make Mince Meat of Beautiful Windows.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, March 12.—"Our next move will probably be to make mince meat out of the beautiful windows of Westminster Abbey," This is the threat uttered rather sadly by Miss Emerson, commander of Sylvia Pankhurst's East End People's Army while Miss Pankhurst is in jail.

"It is a shame we are forced to such extremes, but since other and more peaceable measures have failed, why, no other course is left. We consider the destruction of Venus one of the most effective blows ever struck for our cause in England."

EXPECT INQUIRY INTO NEWINGTON'S MISHAP

Damage to Fishery Cruiser May Prove More Extensive Than Anticipated.

(Victoria Times.)

Although no instructions have been received from Ottawa as yet ordering Capt. J. Macpherson, wreck commissioner, to hold an inquiry into the Prince John-Newington collision, it is expected that the officers of both vessels will be asked to explain the reason for the mishap. The accident is stated to have been unavoidable.

The repairs to the steamer Newington are expected to prove more costly than was originally anticipated. Before leaving Swanson Bay for Victoria the engineers and officers of the Newington effected temporary repairs to the vessel and by watching the weather the fishery cruiser successfully accomplished the trip south, arriving in port yesterday afternoon. Several plates are buckled and the dints extend to below the waterline. The bulworks on the starboard side are split and the entire damage will not be known until the ship is hauled out.

If it had not been for a number of piles giving way the Newington might have been more extensively damaged. When the Newington was struck by the Prince John she was lying at a dock at Swanson Bay. She was jammed up against the fender piles and the tremendous pressure caused six of them to snap. Had they not parted the cruiser might have been badly jammed.

The Newington is to be hauled out on one of the slips for repairs in a few days. The work will take a couple of weeks to carry out.

EVANTUREL IS EXPECTED TO TENDER RESIGNATION

Toronto, March 12.—Gustav Evanturel says now that he will attend the convention called at Van Kleeck Hill to explain his position. There is no likelihood that any action will be taken either by Mr. Evanturel or the legislature until the end of next week, when the incident will probably be finally closed by the member for Prescott placing his resignation in the hands of the speaker.

Fishing Schooner Arrives.

The halibut fishing schooner Roosevelt, which was recently purchased by the Skeena River Syndicate for their Haysport plant, arrived in this port yesterday. The Roosevelt is a two sticer with a spoon bottom and equipped for dory fishing. She carries a 50 h.p. Standard gas engine. Last evening she left for Haysport and will be immediately put in commission. She is one of two boats purchased in Seattle.

IMMIGRATION METHODS MADE SUBJECT ACTIVE CRITICISM

GOVERNMENT ACCUSED OF BRINGING IN WRONG CLASS--FEWER HOMESTEADS TAKEN.

Ottawa, March 13.—After two minor bills were advanced a stage and a number of questions were asked the House went into a committee on supply. The estimates for the Department of the Interior were taken up and Frank Oliver was disposed to think the department was endeavoring to make an immigration record. They got quantity rather than quality and not enough of the new arrivals were going on the land. Mr. Roche said that many of the new arrivals

were bringing more money than those who came earlier and were buying lands rather than taking homesteads. The reduction of the numbers of American arrivals was due in part to representation of Western Canada made in the newspapers of the United States. Steps were taken to remove these false impressions and the number of homestead entries were likely to decrease until they see arrears opened by construction of additional railways.

HALIBUT FISHERMEN MAKE NEW AGREEMENT

Twelve Fishermen on Each Boat Will Divide Catch Equally--One to Act as Mate.

(Special to The Daily News)

Yesterday afternoon the members of the Halibut Fishermen's Union and the manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company came to an agreement on the division of the fish caught on trawlers. Where dory fishing is done each dory takes its own fish, the same arrangement that has been in force for some time. Where the long lines are used there are to be twelve fishermen on a boat and the catch is to be divided equally among the twelve at 1 1/4c per pound. The captain does not share in the catch, but one of the twelve fishermen acts as mate.

The representative of the union was Mr. P. D. Gill, the secretary-treasurer of the Halibut Fishermen's Union, with headquarters at Seattle. Mr. Gill says a local branch of the union will be formed here and an agent will be appointed about May 1st. This appointment is made by election. The local branch will have control of the affairs of the union for Prince Rupert, Haysport and Ketchikan. The union has some 4,500 members and promises to be one of the strong trades unions of the coast. It is expected to have a rapid increase in membership here with the development of the fishing trade.

A very pretty marriage ceremony took place this morning at 8 o'clock in the Methodist Church when Miss Julia Redden of this city was married to Mr. Denis Horatio Wiles, a civil engineer of Vancouver. Miss Redden was recently employed with Mrs. Frizzell and was very popular with a large circle of friends. In the ceremony she was attended by her mother, Mrs. Cyr. Mr. Herbert Ling was best man. The happy couple took the Prince George for Vancouver this morning, where they will reside. They will make a trip first to Portland and San Francisco. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Mr. Dimmick.

OCEAN FALLS PLANT TO BE AUCTIONED

To Go Under the Hammer in Ten Days—Will Be Competition.

It will be sold as a going concern. The property includes pulp limits estimated to contain over two billion feet of timber, some crown granted timber, complete logging equipment and saw mill, and a new pulp mill that has never turned a wheel, on account of financial conditions of the company. It is rumored that the Anglo, London & Paris Bank interests of San Francisco, who have entered into negotiations for its purchase, will meet competition at the auction.
