Canadian National Steamer Hits Reef Near Anyox But Refloats Few Hours Later

HOLED SHIP IS NOW LYING AT SMELTER TOWN WHARF WITH TWO HOLDS FULL OF WATER—PRINCE RUPERT GOING INTO COMMISSION TO TAKE HER PLACE IN SERVICE.

With her No. 1 and No. 2 holds full of water and the vessel requiring the attention of divers to ascertain the exact extent of damage before the water can be pumped out and temporary repairs made so she can proceed to dry dock at Prince Rupert, the steamer Prince George, Capt. Neil McLean, of the Canadian National Coast Steamships fleet was lying at Anyox wharf today after having struck Vadsø Reef, four miles from Anyox, in a dense snowstorm at 10:40 last night while enroute from Prince Rupert to Anyox on a regular voyage. The vessel was refloated at 4:05 this morning and was safely berthed at Anyox at 5:35 a.m. She is understood to be not extensively damaged and was able to free herself and steamed under her own power to Anyox after refloating.

At 3 a.m. the steamer Prince John, Capt. Dan McKinnon, which had arrived here yesterday morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, left Prince Rupert for Anyox and is due back this evening with officers and crew of the Prince George who will transfer to the steamer Prince Rupert, which has been tied up at the local dry dock for the winter, and sail from here tomorrow morning for Vancouver, picking up the Prince George's regular schedule. The Prince Rupert will await the arrival of the train from the east, due at 3 a.m. Friday, five hours late, to take passengers for the south.

Twelve Passengers Aboard There were twelve passengers aboard the Prince George at the time of the stranding including Thomas Loudon, superintendent of Canadian National Steamships, Vancouver, who was making the round trip on official business. It is believed here that the passengers remained on board the vessel until she was refloated and proceeded to Anyox although small boats went out from Anyox to offer assistance if required. There was no panic among the passengers one of whom was Miss Edith Kergin, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L. W. Kergin of this city, who was bound for Premier to visit with Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Kergin. Some of the passengers, it is expected, will return here tonight on board the Prince John, it being officially announced that arrangements had been made locally at Anyox for the transportation of passengers bound for Stewart on from there.

The Prince George sailed from here at 4:30 yesterday afternoon for Anyox and Stewart, pulling out into the teeth of a blizzard. She was due at Anyox at 11 p.m. and was groping her way into that port when she stranded. The approach and entrance to Granby Bay (Anyox) is well lighted under ordinary circumstances but the heavy snowstorm probably obscured these aids to navigation. The local halibut boat White Hope, Capt. Pete Thompson, left here this morning for Anyox taking

diving equipment to be used in inspecting the damage to the vessel before she is temporarily patched up so she may safely make the trip from Anyox to the local dry dock. Arrangements are being rushed today to have the steamer Prince Rupert ready as soon as possible to take over the Prince George's run to Vancouver manned by the crew from the Prince George.

Advice was received today that the Pacific Salvage Co.'s big salvage steamer Salvage King left Victoria at 2 o'clock this morning for Anyox. Immediately after word of the stranding was received here, equipment of the Armour Salvage Co. here was rushed north with Capt. W. P. Armour in personal charge.

A small tug from Anyox is reported to have assisted the Prince George in releasing herself from the rock.

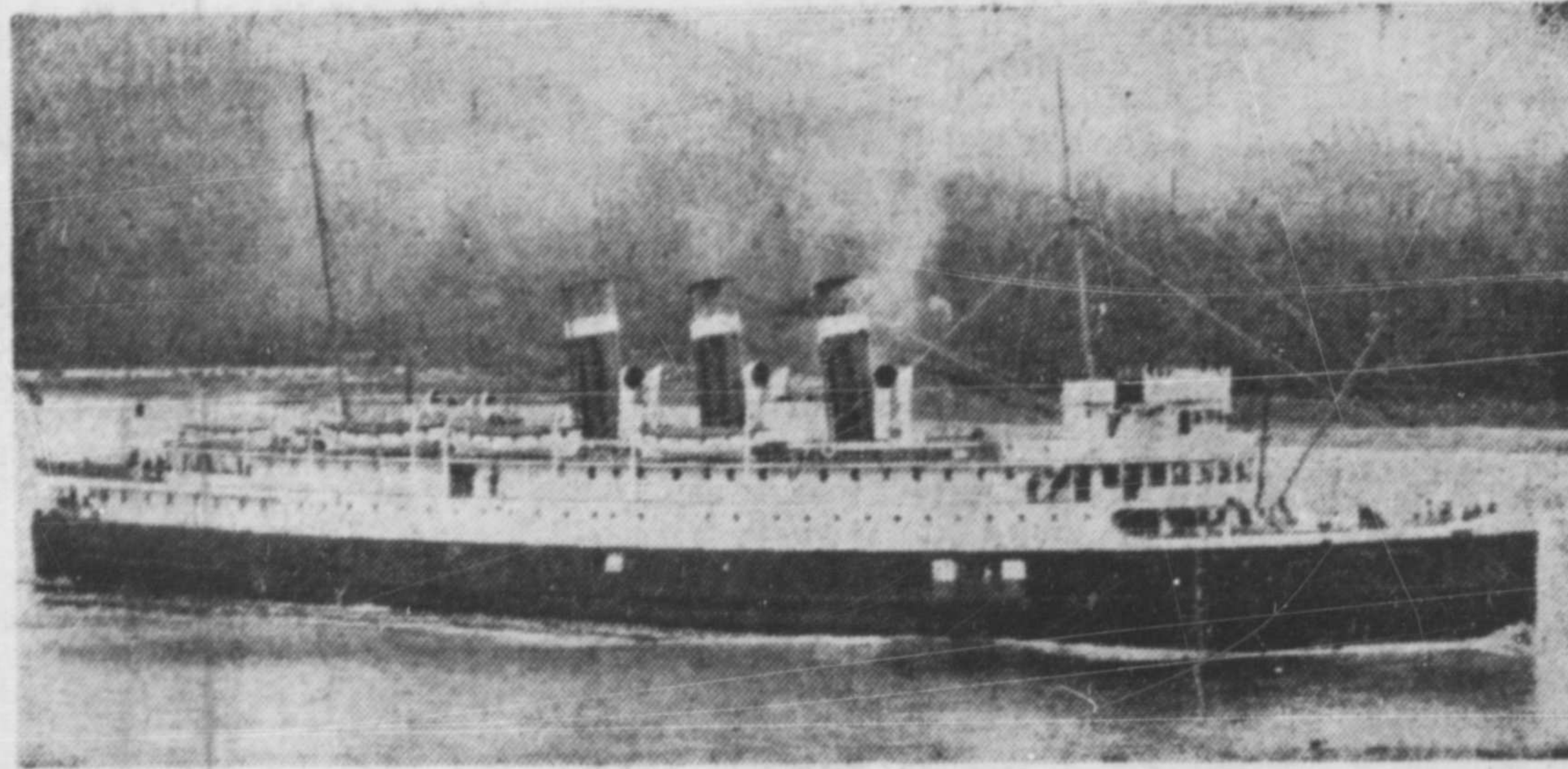

British Columbia Is Returning To Normal After Heavy Weather

Province Has Had One of Worst Batterings in Years From Wind, Tide and Snow—Sixty-Mile Gale and Excessive Rainfall—Damage and Inconvenience Widespread

VANCOUVER, Dec. 21: (CP)—British Columbia began to return to normal today after one of the worst batterings with wind, tide and snow the province has seen in years. A sixty-mile hour gale struck the southern coast yesterday and heavy rainfall was recorded—one inch in Seattle and Portland, three-quarters of an inch in Victoria and half an inch in Vancouver.

PROFESSOR IS HEARD

Women's Canadian Club Hears Enlightening Address by Winnipeg Man at Afternoon Meeting

A highly interesting and enlightening address on the subject of "Social Legislation and Public Service" was delivered before the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon by Prof. W. G. Smith of Winnipeg, late of the faculty of the University of Toronto. Approaching world problems with a distinctly humanitarian viewpoint, Prof. Smith referred, among other questions, to the international debt situation. Had the vast sums which had been expended on the destruction of the Great War been spent for constructive purposes instead, how much further ahead civilization would have been, he conjectured. He referred to the forward-looking policies of President Roosevelt as a result of which not only the United States but the entire world hoped for so much.
