Heavy Fighting Continues in Civil War With Socialist Rebels Still Appearing to Keep Upper Hand—Great City is Today Bloody Battlefield

LONDON, Feb. 14: (CP)—The United Kingdom is in agreement with other nations, notably France and Italy, which hold that the integrity and independence of Austria must be maintained, Sir John Simon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, declared in the House of Commons yesterday. At the same time, the Foreign Minister made it clear that Great Britain has assumed a "hands off" policy toward the entire Austro-German situation until the matter is given consideration by the council of the League of Nations. The United Kingdom would not interfere in the internal affairs of any nation, he said. Sir John was referring particularly to the Austrian declaration that she will appeal to the League of Nations against what she considers German interference in her domestic affairs.

#### Socialists Winning

VIENNA, Feb. 14:—The Socialist rebels, who are seeking to overthrow the Dollfuss dictatorship, still appeared to have the upper hand as bloody civil warfare continued in Austria throughout the night and into today, the streets of the ancient cultural and educational centre, darkened except for flashes of gunfire and deserted except for government troops and police on one hand and rebel forces on the other, resembling a veritable battlefield with scores lying dead and wounded therein.

As the forces of the authorities continued the weary defence after forty-eight hours of battle already, the rebels were rushing up reinforcements for the attack on various sectors. Howitzers, machine guns, armored cars and airplanes are all figuring in the sanguine conflict. There was heavy gunfire in the city throughout the night.

The number of dead was today estimated at upwards of one thousand with more than three thousand injured. This was in the city of Vienna alone and did not include the casualties in other cities and the provinces which is known to be heavy. It was reported that 135 had died of wounds in Vienna hospitals aside from many who have been killed in battle outright and numerous unaccounted for.

In another effort to gain the upper hand, it was stated that the government intended to use even heavier artillery against the rebels today.

#### Today's Fighting

The conflict took on renewed vigor at noon today in certain sections of Vienna with the Socialists recapturing some strongholds which had been taken from them late last night by government troops. Socialist women fought grimly beside their men.

The Floridsdorf, a suburb of Vienna, one of the centres of Socialist population, was a shell-torn shambles today, many buildings having been wrecked by artillery fire while a number of others were burning.

Linz, where the original revolt started, was reported to be fairly quiet today.

One hundred and fifty Socialists were stated to have been arrested up to last night, eight of whom have already been executed.

Twenty thousand Nazis were reported last night to be marching through Germany towards the Austrian frontier.

#### Note From Paris

PARIS, Feb. 14:—The French government sent a note to Berlin yesterday declaring that France would not tolerate any further Nazi armed forces being raised in Germany.

### Chicago Banker With Pneumonia On Death's Verge

CHICAGO, February 14:—Melvin Traylor, prominent banker, was still hovering between life and death last night after having been critically ill for thirty-two days with pneumonia. Attending doctors stated that Traylor's chance of living depended entirely upon the ability of his heart to stand the continued strain which has already been most intense.

### Back From Three Months' Trip To California State

Ex-Mayor and Mrs. M. M. Stephens returned home on the Prince Rupert this morning following a three months' holiday visit in California, the trip proving enjoyable, interesting and beneficial to both. They went south principally for the purpose of visiting two sons—Melvin in Los Angeles and Elgood in Berkeley. Both boys are doing well in the Golden State.

### Saw Hand of Sankey in Lindbergh Kidnapping

He also had planned to kidnap the mighty Babe Ruth, baseball king (lower right). Sankey banged himself in Sioux Falls penitentiary a few days ago.

### Liberal Amendment to Throne Speech Beaten By 110 to 76 Division

C. C. F. Leader Introduces New Resolution in House of Commons Declaring That Government Has Failed In Dealing With Unemployment

OTTAWA, Feb. 14: (CP)—The House of Commons yesterday voted down the Liberal want of confidence amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne by a division of 110 to 76. Soon after, J. S. Woodsworth, Labor member for Winnipeg and national leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, moved another amendment declaring that the government had not taken such steps as were necessary to deal adequately with unemployment and other problems.

### Eighth Prisoner Dies as Result Of Pen Outbreak

WALLA WALLA, Wash., February 14 (Canadian Press)—Ernest Alonzo, prisoner, died in hospital yesterday from machine gun injuries sustained in the State Penitentiary riot here Monday night, making the ninth fatality resulting from the outbreak, eight being prisoners and the other a guard. The authorities are preparing to lay murder charges against ring-leaders in the attempted jail break as a result of the killing of guard H. L. Briggs.

#### WARM IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, February 14 — Temperature of 80 degrees above is recorded here as compared with the average of 66 for this time of year.

### Pres. Roosevelt Places Wreath on Lincoln Memorial

WASHINGTON D.C., February 14 —President Franklin D. Roosevelt visited the Lincoln Memorial here on Monday and placed a wreath thereon in honor of the birthday of the famous statesman.

#### Price of Gold

MONTREAL, Feb. 14: (CP)—The price of gold advanced twelve cents to \$34.90 per ounce today. In London the price improved six pence, closing at \$34.59.

### Veteran Coast Liner Prince John Once Again Harbinger Of Prosperity For District

Brings Eighty Loggers From Vancouver to Queen Charlotte Island Camps, Mill Machinery For Usk, Boom Timbers For Assembly Wharf

Bringing north from Vancouver to the Queen Charlotte Islands eighty men for various re-opening logging camps and into Prince Rupert a carload of mill machinery for the Columario mine at Usk and two big new boom timbers for the derricks of the lumber assembly wharf which is being put in shape for use again, including the shipment of aspen

timber from Fraser Lake to the Orient, the steamer Prince John, which arrived in port early this morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, had the aspect of a real "boom ship." The stout old coastal liner, which has figured prominently in the ups and downs of this district for well over two decades, is indeed playing her part in helping to bring prosperity from around the corner.

Of the eighty loggers, who took up all passenger accommodation on the vessel, making the largest list the Prince John has had in many

years, thirty-seven were for the J. R. Morgan Logging Co.'s camp at Rescent Inlet and the balance for the A. P. Allison camp at Cumshewa and the T. A. Kelley Logging Co.'s camp at Atli Inlet. The mining machinery for Usk was discharged at the lumber assembly wharf, whence it will be transhipped by rail to the interior.

LECTURES TO FISHERMEN ON PRESERVATION OF FRESH FISH AT SEA

A series of two lectures on advances in the preservation of fresh fish at sea will be presented by the Fisheries Experimental Station (Pacific).

The first of these lectures will be given in the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union Hall at 8 p.m. Friday, February 16th, and will be illustrated with slides showing how discoloration is caused. The second lecture will follow on Wednesday the 21st, and will include a discussion of means of overcoming this discoloration by demonstration of a model of a modified type of fish hold.

### SUN LIFE MEETING

MONTREAL, Feb. 14.—Ten years ago the Sun Life had less than one billion of assurances in force. Today it has two and three-quarter billions and ranks high among the insurance companies of the world.
