## LOST BOAT IN STORM

Well Known Fishing Vessel Gertrude Smashed To Pieces After Swamping In Storm Near Oona River

### Narrow Escape

Ole Welle, Owner and Skipper, and Companion Had Close Call Last Thursday While Bound For Here

Reporting the loss of his 28-foot trolling and halibut boat Gertrude in a storm while bound from Oona River to Prince Rupert with a load of lumber on Thursday morning of last week. Ole Welle, well known Prince Rupert fisherman, has returned to the city from Porcher Island. When half a mile from Oona River while heading for the sheltered Kelp passage, the Gertrude was swamped in the tempestuous sea which had been lashed to fury by a fierce southeast gale. The gasboat rapidly filled and Welle and his companion had to jump for their lives, the former managing to make his getaway in the one-man skiff and the latter clinging to floating lumber and paddling his way to shore where he swoomed and lay on the beach for an hour and a-half utterly exhausted. The Gertrude, which was equipped with an 8 h.p. two-cylinder Easthope gas engine and which was uninsured, was found later on the beach smashed to pieces.



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### Laying Plans For the Coming Summer



It is not hard to picture what the garden will be like when the plants have grown and the seeds are up.

The continuation of mild weather with very little rain has induced a good many local people to dig their gardens or at any rate to begin on the job. Manure is being spread, perennial plants being moved and ditching being carried out.

Nothing is so important in a Prince Rupert garden as ditching or under draining. In these days many people cannot afford tile or even rough lumber for drains. The next best thing is open ditches to carry away all surface water and to provide an outlet for the frequent deluges that make gardening so difficult here. Ditching is even more important than fertilizing.

One advantage in digging the garden now is that if frost comes later, it will pulverize the soil and make it much easier to work. In the late spring when there is so much to do it will be found a great advantage to have had the soil turned over in February.

Many garden plots lend themselves to mixed gardening with flowers alongside the walks and vegetables behind. If kept tidy the vegetable plots are not objectionable. Some people like to see them better than flowers.



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
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
