FRENCE FOREIGN MINISTER IS ALSO SLAIN AT MARSEILLES

Jugo-Slav Monarch Shot To Death Today by Young Countryman While Visiting France to Talk Politics

WAS MOTORING THROUGH CITY STREETS WITH LOUIS BARTHOU WHEN INCI-DENT OCCURRED, NO LESS THAN TWENTY SHOTS BEING FIRED.

Affair Took Place Before Vast Crowds Who Went Wild

ONE OF ALLEGED KILLERS IS TAKEN BY POLICE WHILE OTHER WAS SLAIN BY INFURIATED MOB-TWO GENERALS ARE ALSO SHOT BUT NOT KILLED.

MARSEILLES, France, Oct. 9: (CP)-King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia was killed today by an assassin's bulet as he was motoring through the city shortly after arnving in France for a visit, Louis Barthou, French foreign minister, who was with the King, was wounded in the arm and internally, dying shortly afterwards from the wounds.

About twenty shots were fired at King Alexander, three of which took effect, death coming within a few

Vast crowds lined the streets and a riot followed as infuriated crowds seized the assassin, a young Jugo-Slavian, whose name has not been determined. He was badly beaten but was rescued by the police.

General Alphonse Georgius of the French Army was wounded as was also a Jugo-Slavian general attached to the King's retinue. A number of watchers were also struck by bullets.

It later developed that two men had been shooting, one being killed and the other captured after the rush by the

King Alexander was on a mission to Paris to discuss the political line-up.




