CALGARY, November 22:—Riley was elected commissioner of Calgary in yesterday's civic elections. Returns up to late last night gave Riley 8323 votes to 6185 for Barnes and 3117 for Day. Two other candidates were trailing far in the rear.

Registration of Voters For Forthcoming Federal Contest Difficult Owing to Distances

Owing to the vast extent of the district and the remoteness of some of the isolated stations, the task of preparing the federal election voters' list for Skeena riding is proving an arduous one for G. M. Hunt, the registrar of voters, and it will be some time yet before it will be possible to announce the total number of voters in the riding. While the work as far as the city is concerned is pretty well lined up, returns have not yet been received on the preliminary registration from some points to say nothing of the revision last week. It has already been announced that there are well over 3000 qualified to vote in the city of Prince Rupert.

Strong Note Sent to Geneva Today by Belgrade Government as Outcome of Recent Killings of King Alexander and Louis Barthou

GENEVA, Nov. 22: (CP)—Hungary was blamed for the assassinations of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France at Marseilles on October 9 by the Jugo-Slavian government in a strong note today to the League of Nations. The note asks the League to conduct an exhaustive investigation into the tragic events. Jugo-Slavia has expressed the opinion on a number of occasions that Hungarian terrorists were behind the assassinations but this is the first occasion that Hungary as a nation has been blamed.

United States Is Extending Aerial Mail Service Now

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 22:—The extension of air mail services in various parts of the country was announced yesterday by Postmaster General James Farley. There will be additional daily trips between Fargo, N.D., and Seattle and between Fort Worth, Texas, and Los Angeles.

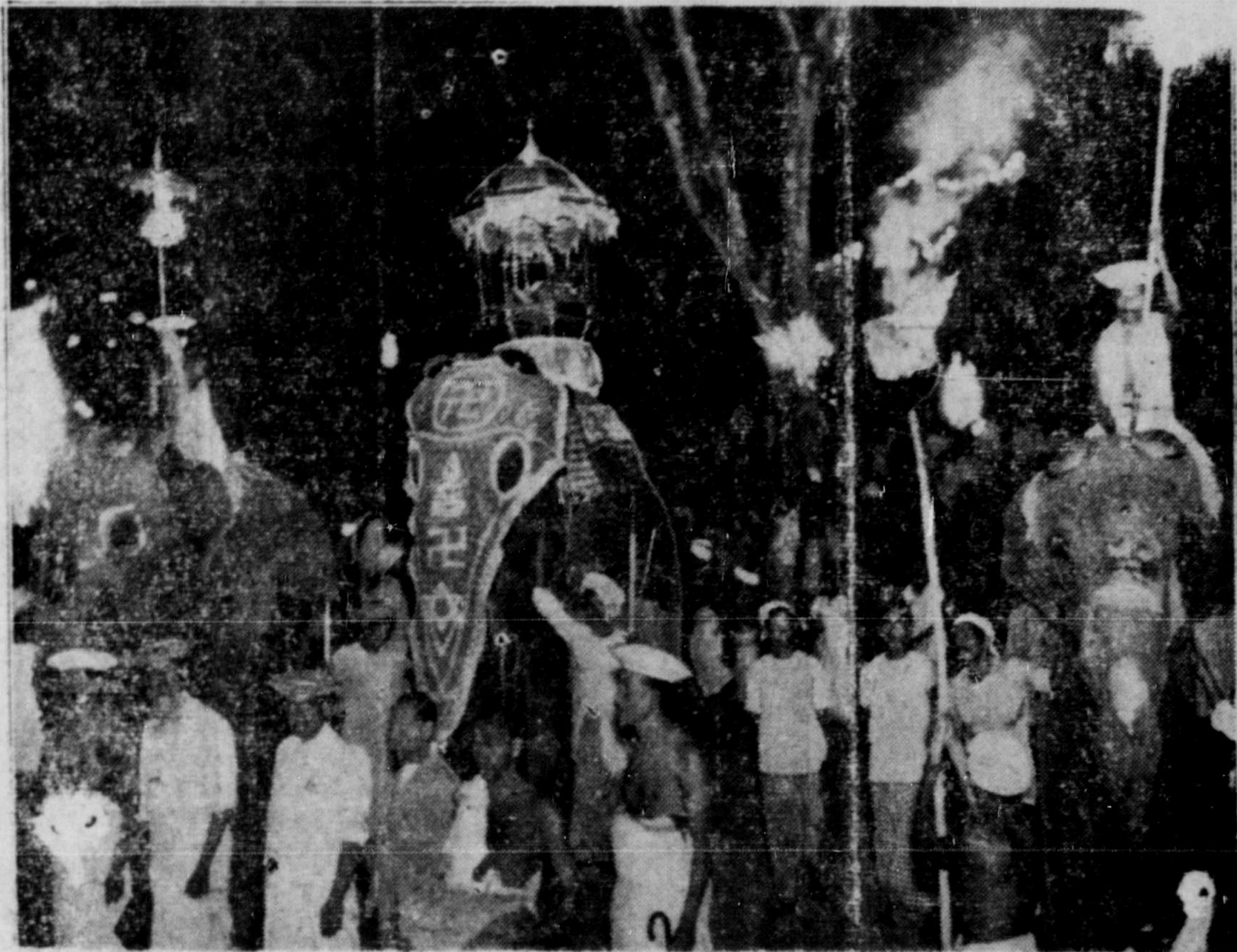
Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar New York Exchange

Vanderbilt Case Judgment Given

Official Decision is Along Lines Anticipated Earlier in Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 22:—Justice John Carew gave his judgment yesterday in the bitter court fight over the custody of ten-year old Gloria Vanderbilt along the lines as unofficially anticipated earlier in the week. The child shall spend five days a week with her aunt, Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, who will superintend her education. Two days a week the child shall be with her mother, Mrs. Gloria Morgan Vanderbilt. Mrs. Whitney, being a Protestant, the judgment requires that a Catholic governess shall be provided for Gloria whose mother is a Catholic.

It is expected the judgment will be appealed by the mother who demands full custody. Meantime the order does not become effective for a month.

Richard Lange, Charged With Murder, Freed

NEW WESTMINSTER, Nov. 22: (CP)—Richard E. Lange of Burnaby was acquitted by an Assize Court jury on Wednesday night on a charge of slaying his neighbor, Hans Ambrosch, on September 11 last.

Sea Monster Found Near Here May Have Been "Caddie" Which Once Haunted Victoria Waters

It seems now that the skeleton of a sea monster picked up on the beach at Henry Island near Prince Rupert may be Caddosaurus seen in life by many people at Cadboro Bay, Victoria. While the vertebrae are not yet all in place since being landed here and some also are permanently missing, those on view now make it pretty clear that it was once a "sea serpent," round like a snake but with jointed flappers on either side and a head something like a horse.

When inspected this morning there were fifty vertebrae on the dock and some in a box in a boat alongside—possibly seventy in all. The small tail bones were missing and it is not sure how far they tapered off. Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, still is strongly of opinion that the extreme length of the creature was thirty feet but it might have been more.

The largest vertebra is nearly eight inches in diameter and four to five inches in length. This one is several feet back from the head. All the flesh has disappeared but cartilage is clinging to most of the bones and the flappers are a mass of cartilage although, at the point where the elbow or the knee should be, the cartilage is very hard, approaching in texture that of a bone, and there is undoubtedly a joint, both in the small and the large flappers. They are thick and have the appearance of hardened jelly.

The vertebrae are perfectly round and hard like those of a snake and there is no semblance of ribs. The head is badly injured but it seems to be somewhat flat. The length of the head cannot yet be determined as only the hard cartilage is left. However, to stand back and look at the skeleton as it now lies on the dock it has a very striking resemblance to the pictures published of the Carboro Bay monster.

One of the spine-like hairs taken from the flesh measured four and a half inches long with a hook at one end which held it in place in the creature's soft flesh.

Tulsequah Plane Here Last Night

Capt. William Strong's Machine Calls Enroute to Vancouver; Local Men Fly South

WORK AND WAGES

Hon. H. H. Stevens backs up the policy of the Premier of British Columbia in favoring embarkation on a huge national scheme of construction. He thinks the federal government should take the initiative in a building program to be financed by the bankers, loan and mortgage companies and insurance companies. The alternative, in Mr. Stevens' own words would be:

"If they (the bankers, loan and mortgage companies and insurance companies) fail to act promptly, then in my opinion the government of Canada ought to take the matter in hand as a government policy. A national program of construction ought to be financed by private capital under public leadership."

Mr. Stevens is as one with the Premier of British Columbia in saying that the spending of forty million dollars by the Dominion on a building program is but a drop in the bucket. He would spend a billion dollars.

What is certain is that the country cannot with safety continue with millions of men out of work. We shall undoubtedly have improved conditions. Already they are better but there is still an army of unemployed who should be put to work.

Ian Mackenzie, one of the Liberal leaders at Ottawa, also urges a forward policy suited to "the social and economic revolution" that is taking place.

THE DIRECT ROUTE

If the influences at work in Vancouver should succeed in their efforts the grain and other exportable farm products of the Peace River country will travel by a roundabout southerly route to Vancouver in order to reach tide-water. If the voice of reason prevails the railway at present constructed along the north side of the Peace River will be extended to a point somewhere between Prince George and Prince Rupert connecting with the Canadian National Railway into Prince Rupert. Grain shipped over this route would command the lowest possible rate, insuring the highest possible price to the farmers.

The possible benefit to Prince Rupert from the construction of this railway should not be considered. The interests of the farmers are paramount. The railway will be built to serve them although, incidentally, it will greatly benefit this port.

Should the railway be built, it will develop a very rich section of British Columbia, a section that is badly in need of development. At present the country is being reached by river boats and airplanes and, even under these handicaps, some progress is being made. With a railway traversing the country the development would be rapid.

MOVIES ARE DISCUSSED

Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth Is Speaker Before Parent-Teachers' Association

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' Association took place last evening in the Borden Street School with Mrs. D. C. Stuart, the president, in the chair. There was a good attendance of members and friends. Mrs. J. W. Kilpatrick reported that the telephone bridge held recently had been a great success. As a result, the association was able to donate the sum of twenty dollars to each of the large schools and ten dollars to Seal Cove School for the purpose of purchasing reference books.

The special speaker for the evening was Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, who took as his topic: "The Child, the Parent and the Movies." Using statistical evidence based on scientific research recently conducted at the University of Chicago, the speaker traced the injurious effects of the average motion picture, with its deliberately intensified emotional appeal, upon the health, emotions and conduct of children.

This evidence clearly showed that the trend of the average motion picture in recent years has been from the romantic love story to dramas depicting sex, crime and violence, with a background of luxury and affluence. Traing the effect of such pictures upon the sleep of normal children, investigators discovered by means of an electrical device called the hypnograph, which registered on a chart every movement of the child during his sleep, that there was a great increase in restlessness which was specially pronounced in children near the age of puberty.

Mr. Hollingworth reminded parents that the emotional reaction of children to pictures was entirely different from that of adults. Hence the reaction of an adult to a picture is no criterion for judging the reaction of a child to the same picture. Scenes of horror, especially if strong and repeated, might even cause permanent injury to the nervous system which, in later years, might result in serious neurotic and psychotic disorders. The tendency of children to imitate what they witnessed upon the screen was fraught with much danger and the resulting ideas of conduct were opposed to those ideals which were taught and inculcated in the home. The school and the church. The speaker illustrated these various points by quoting from case studies obtained from university and high school students and office and factory workers.

Other Diversions

In conclusion, Mr. Hollingworth recommended the providing of substitutes such as outdoor and indoor sports and music and, in this connection, praised the efforts of the Parent-Teachers' Association in providing the weekly story hour for children between the ages of four and twelve. Fundamentally, the solution lies in the hands of parents who should exercise vigilant discrimination in selecting the pictures which they wish their children to see.

During the evening little Miss Phyllis Jenner, a pupil of Miss Margaret McCaffery, with a capably rendered piano selection, and Miss L. A. Halliwell, with vocal solos, accompanied by Miss E. P. Grassie, provided an enjoyable musical program. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the speaker and artists.

The meeting concluded with the singing of the National Anthem, after which refreshments were served and an enjoyable social hour spent.

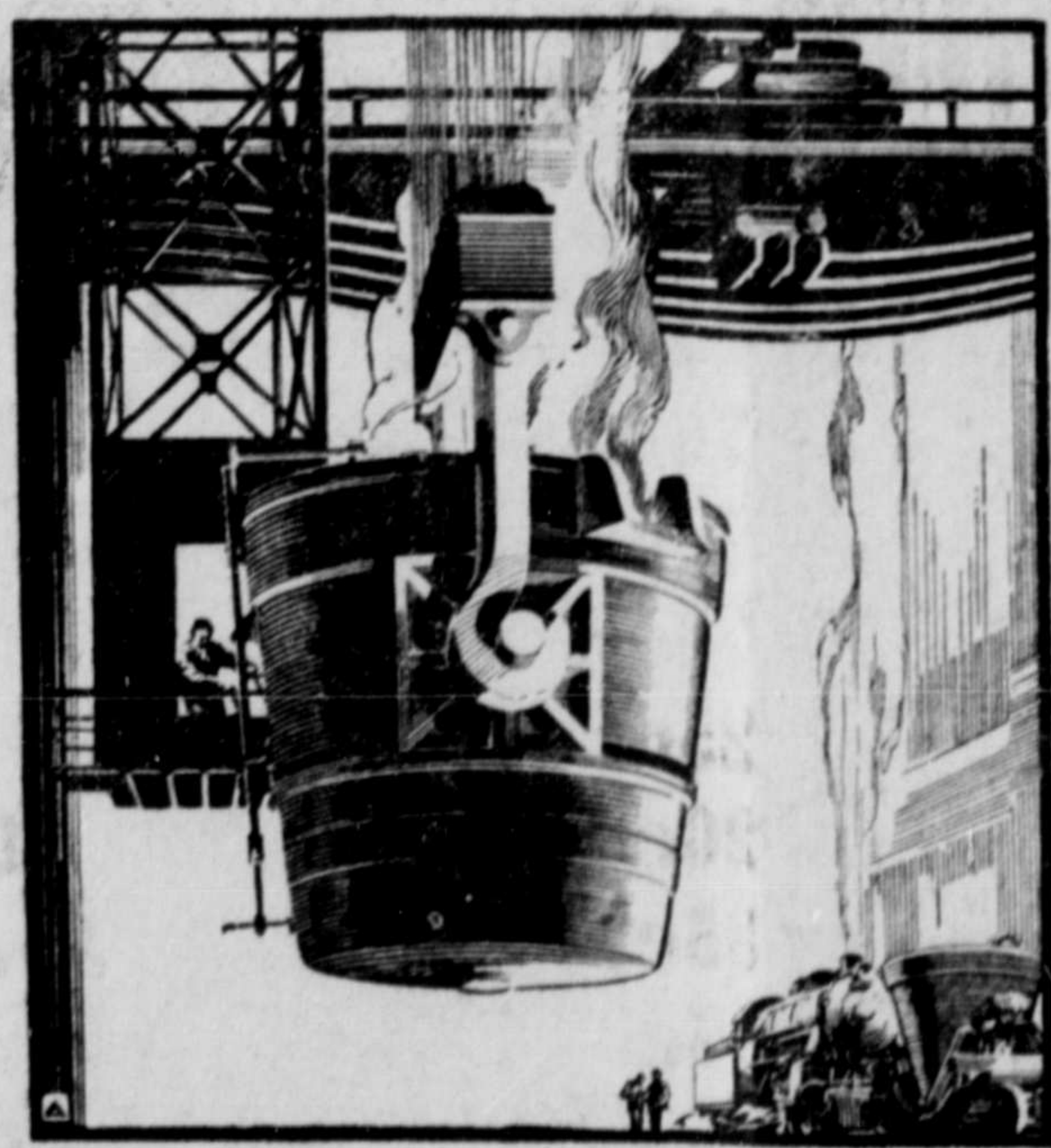

IDENTIFIED AS MAMMAL

Remains of Sea Monster Brought to City and Being Reassembled Today

Red Flesh Found

Further Examination Leads to Belief That Extreme Length Was About Thirty Feet

Having brought in, from Henry Island late last night aboard a fisheries patrol boat which had been placed at their disposal the head, spinal column, two flapper-like appendages, joints of tissues, some cartilaginous body material, quills, hair and skin of a strange marine monster which they had spent yesterday in dissecting, Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, and members of his staff were engaged today in reassembling the body at the government wharf for public exhibit. The object is to reconstruct the remains as nearly as possible to the shape in which they were found a few days ago on Henry Island. Much interest is being taken in the find and the identity of the creature, which in life is believed to have been probably about thirty feet in length, is still a mystery.

On further inspection of the remains yesterday, the interesting discovery was made of large quantities of red flesh around the backbone. This would appear to put the creature definitely out of the fish class and it is now believed that it is some sort of warm-blooded mammal. Before minute inspection was made, it was thought the creature might have been a species of giant ray or skate but the discovery of the red flesh eliminates this theory. The best known of the mammals is the whale but this, of course, is no whale as previous description makes quite evident.

Twenty-Three Feet Long
Dr. Carter announced last night that the intact portion of the vertebrae measured twenty-three feet from the top of the snout. Odd bits of bone found nearby were placed as nearly as possible in position judging by the taper of the spinal column, leading to the belief that the creature in life was probably about thirty feet in length.

After taking minute measurements and making all possible examinations of the remains, which were rather badly decomposed, Dr. Carter had the spinal column cut up in five sections. The material was loaded into a rowboat and towed into Prince Rupert last night by the fisheries patrol cruiser. Work of reassembling started this morning.

Further study is being proceeded with today in the effort to determine the identity of the creature.

GOOD WORK ON ROADS

Visitor From Queen Charlotte City Comments on Way Money is Being Expended

MINE CHANGES HANDS

Good work is being done on the roads on Queen Charlotte Islands according to R. G. McKenzie, proprietor of the Premier Hotel at Queen Charlotte City, who is in the city today. The sum of \$5,000 was appropriated for putting the roads in shape and, under the superintendence of A. R. Mallory with Alfred Cook as foreman, excellent results are being obtained. Mr. McKenzie says he is a Conservative but he is bound to recognize good work when he sees it.

Mentioning the mining progress on the Islands, Mr. McKenzie says it is understood that a deal has been put through for the transfer of the Skidegate Sunrise mine to new owners who have taken it over for the purpose of further developing it.

The Haida Gold Mine at Kootenay Harbor has been temporarily closed down but plans have been laid for starting up again in the near future. When the tunnel failed to drive through pay ore last summer much disappointment was felt but by drifting on the vein they came into good gold ore which carried good values. Further exploration in the mine is planned.

Mr. McKenzie will be returning to the Islands on the Prince John on Friday evening, having arrived yesterday to receive eye treatment.

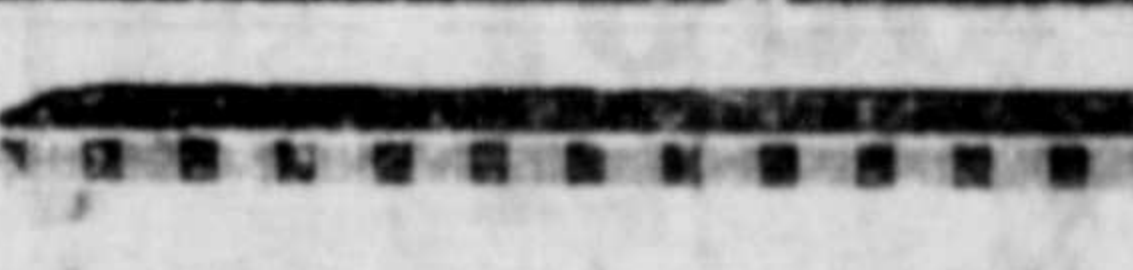
