
ISLANDER GOLD HUNT IS CONTINUING CANADIAN BREWER KIDNAPPED--\$150,000 RANSOM SOUGHT

Bow of Treasure Ship To Be Raised; Believed It May Contain Vaults

Returns From Salvage Operations Near Juneau So Far
Have Been Disappointing—To Work For
Another Thirty Days

JUNEAU, Aug. 15: (CP)—The wrecked Alaskan ship Islander having so far yielded a disappointing amount of anticipated gold to the salvors, another thirty days will be spent to bring up the bow of the steamer which dropped off into 190 feet of water. It is thought possible that the treasure vaults, containing the gold bullion believed to have been aboard the ship, were in the bow.

Treasure Ship Taken From Alaskan Waters



Hitched between two salvage vessels is the skeleton of treasure ship, s.s. Islander, after she was lifted bodily from the ocean's floor in Stephens Passage, Alaska, where she has lain in 365 feet of water since 1901. The Islander was reported to be carrying a vast fortune when she sank after striking an iceberg carrying 72 men to their deaths. Salvage workers have found gold on the vessel after clearing away tons of mud and sea barnacles, and the bones of victims—but it is uncertain how much of the rich cargo can be recovered as gold dust or nuggets, or how much has rotted away in the form of paper securities. Salvage operators occupied two years and cost \$200,000.

John Labatt Abducted While Driving Tuesday From Sarnia to London

Is First Affair of Its Kind in Canada—Intensive Search is
Initiated by Police For Capitalist and His Captors

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 15: (CP)—John S. Labatt, president of the Carling Brewery Limited, was kidnapped yesterday afternoon while motoring between London and Sarnia on his way from his summer home near the latter point. His car was found here with a note pinned inside demanding ransom of \$150,000. It is the first kidnapping of its type in Canada and police have already instituted a great manhunt.

Labatt is internationally known as a brewer, sportsman and business leader.

The ultimatum found in the abandoned auto was signed "Three-Fingered Abe." It demanded \$150,000 within twenty-four hours under threat of death and warned the family not to notify the police.

A few hours after Labatt disappeared his brother, Hugh Labatt, went to Toronto where he had been instructed to leave the ransom money.

Police declare it the first case of its kind on Canadian criminal records. The criminal is a new type of lawbreaker in this country.

Every available resource of the Ontario provincial police will be thrown into the task of apprehending the kidnapers of Labatt, according to an announcement made by Attorney General Roebuck.

RETURNS TO HOLLYWOOD

Mary Pickford Returns to Movie
Capital and Doug Fairbanks
Lands in New York

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 15:—Mary Pickford returned to "Pickfair" yesterday from a business trip to Chicago. Douglas Fairbanks returned to New York today after an absence of a year abroad. Miss Pickford let it be known that she and Fairbanks planned to meet, probably in Hollywood, but she did not indicate that any reconciliation between them might be possible. "Possibly the less said about that, the better," commented "America's Sweetheart" to inquiring reporters.

Apart from a disclosure that she would soon confer with her estranged husband, Miss Pickford revealed no details of the nature of the conference and the possibilities of a reconciliation with Fairbanks. They were separated more than a year ago. Miss Pickford would only say: "I predict I shall have even less to say following the conference with Mr. Fairbanks than I have now."

PRESIDENT IS COMING

Roosevelt Planning Alaska Visit
Next Summer—Has It to Do
With Fortifications?

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 15:—It was intimated at the White House yesterday that President Franklin D. Roosevelt is already planning a journey to Alaska next summer. If he goes, he will be the second chief executive in the history of the nation to visit the territory during his term of office. President W. G. Harding having made a trip to Alaska in the summer of 1923 just before he died.

In some quarters significance is attached to the President's projected trip to Alaska in connection with mooted plans of the United States to establish fortifications and a naval base in Alaska in the event of failure of the disarmament conference.

OPPOSED TO COMMUNISM

American Legion in California Endorses Administration's Deportation Move

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15:—United in its determination to quell communism, the California department of the American Legion declined yesterday to take a slap at Secretary of Labor Perkins.

While 2,000 delegates on the floor of the Civic Auditorium arose and unanimously cheered a vigorous anti-communistic address from National Commander Hayes, two committees were battling fiercely over a resolution demanding deportation of communists. The resolution had been unanimously approved by the Americanism committee. It would have had the California department censure Secretary of Labor Perkins for her activity in deporting communists arrested in recent labor disturbances. It would have been a direct slap at the administration.

FULLERTON IS COMING

Accompanied by Trustee Labelle
And President Hungerford,
Rail Chief to Visit West

MONTREAL, Aug. 15:—Hon. C. P. Fullerton K.C., chairman of the trustees, Canadian National Railways, and J. Edouard Labelle K.C., trustees, left Montreal Tuesday on an inspection tour of the company's properties which will take them as far as the Pacific Coast. They are accompanied by President S. J. Hungerford and C. B. Brown, chief engineer of the system.

While travelling in the west, the party will be joined by A. E. Warren, vice-president in charge of western lines.

After visiting the principal western points as far as Prince Rupert and Vancouver, Messrs. Fullerton and Labelle will return to Montreal, reaching here in early September. They will be in Prince Rupert on August 27, arriving there by rail and leaving for Vancouver on the steamer Prince George.

DETROIT IS SERIES MAD

Tigers Score Double-Header Win
Over Yankees For Fourteen
Straight Victories

DETROIT, Aug. 15: (CP)—World Series fever attacked Detroit baseball fans yesterday afternoon when news reached here that the Tigers, who have not had a pennant since 1909, had scored a double-header victory over the once invulnerable New York Yankees before seventy thousand howling fans at the Yankee Stadium in New York. It was the fourteenth straight victory for the Tigers who, under the leadership of their new manager, Mickey Cochrane, who took over the pilotage of the club this year, have now built up a margin of six and a half games. Three more games are scheduled for the crucial series. The Yankees are now considered virtually eliminated from the pennant race.

In the National League, there was no change in the situation, the first place New York Giants and second place Chicago Cubs losing to the Pittsburgh Pirates and Boston Braves respectively while the third place St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Phillies.

PROMINENT VISITORS

During the hard pinching days of the depression people did not travel much and very few prominent people visited Prince Rupert. Now that the world is moving once more, we find men and women of note coming this way. Prince Rupert will have an opportunity of entertaining at least one cabinet minister from Ottawa, the heads of the railway, and possibly next year President Roosevelt may be induced to make the trip to Alaska by way of this port. As we get into our stride and the world gets to real spending again, we shall have more and more notables visiting this part of the world. With an election in the offing we shall doubtless have leaders of the various parties touring the west and we shall welcome any and all of them to Prince Rupert. They come to see us only when they want our support but even that is better than total neglect. Let them come—the more the better.

TIE CUTTING JOBS

A few years ago Prince Rupert sent many men to the tie camps during the winter to get out railway timber. During the lean years very few went. The result of the policy of cutting down is that the railway is not in very good shape for fast trains and the men have had to be supported from relief. Now there is a lot of work to be done on the line and many ties will be needed and we are told that many of the unemployed will find work getting out the needed supply. Men who have been receiving relief doles will welcome the opportunity to earn once more.

AN IMPORTANT MOVE

The move on the part of the provincial government to prevent reversion of city lands may prove of great benefit both to the city and to owners of property who have been unable to keep up their payments. Every encouragement is being given owners to meet their engagements instead of having their holdings confiscated for non-payment of taxes. As long as the concession is not abused it will prove of value.


SPORT CHAT

Known and idolized as "Uncle Robby" everywhere, Wilbert Robinson, colorful Big League baseball figure who died last week at Atlanta, gained recognition as one of the shrewdest strategists and most expert handlers of pitching talent in the major leagues. His success as a manager largely was due to his uncanny ability in developing young twirling prospects and rejuvenating veteran timber. To the modern fan, Dazzy Vance, sensational strikeout king of 1924 and voted the "National League's most valuable player" that season, stands out as the most notable of Robinson's products but old-timers recall that Robinson was also responsible for developing Rube Marquard. Vance, a castoff, came close to pitching Brooklyn's 1924 club to a pennant by winning 28 games. The team finished second after a terrific fight with Pittsburgh and New York, the latter finally winning in the last few days of a stirring campaign.

Robinson started his major league career in 1886 at the age of 19 and was one of the first backstops to catch behind the plate all the time. He broke into fast company with the old Philadelphia Athletics, then members of the old American Association, and five years later went to Baltimore, where he was one of the leading spirits in lifting the Orioles from tail-enders to champions. After nine seasons with Baltimore, Robinson was sold to St. Louis in 1900, along with John McGraw and Billy Keister, but after a season in the middle west came back to Baltimore to organize a stock company and place a team in the new American League. He remained there three seasons, taking up managerial reins for the first time in 1903. He retired from the majors the following year and did not re-enter them again until 1911, when he joined the New York Giants as a coach under his old associate, McGraw. He remained for three years in that capacity in all of which the Giants were pennant victors, before taking the helm at Brooklyn.

Altogether Robinson had been on eight pennant-winning clubs, three with Baltimore, three with New York and two with Brooklyn. His record as a player, over a span of 17 years from 1886 to 1902, inclusive, shows he compiled a batting average of .380; scored 629 runs and rapped out 1386 hits. It is interesting to recall that Robinson, whose rotund figure was familiar to modern fans, ranked among the fastest men in the game in his early playing days. He celebrated his first big league season by stealing 42 bases. Robinson was born June 2, 1867 at Hudson, Mass. He began his professional career in 1885 with the Haverhill Mass., Club and went to the Athletics the following year.




