ANGLO-GERMAN TRADE WAR LOOMING

ALASKA RADIO STATION TO COMMUNICATE WITH BYRD

Leader of Antarctic Expedition Narrowly Escapes Gas Poison

Explorers of Far South are Now Confined For Long Winter Night to Their Quarters in Little America

NEW YORK, June 25.—A radio station is to be established in Alaska in order to open up more satisfactory communication between the South Polar expedition of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd and the outside world. Experiments have shown that wireless can be more effectively used from Alaska than any other part of the world for communicating with the expedition.

Reports received here at the end of the week were that Rear Admiral Byrd had had a narrow escape from carbon monoxide poisoning, fortunately suffering no serious ill-effects.

It is now mid-winter in the Antarctic and the expedition is confined to its quarters at Little America during the long night.

TORONTO, June 25. (CP)—Henry Arthur Sifton, known as "Harry" to hosts of friends throughout Canada, died here last night. Third son of the late Sir Clifford Sifton and 43 years of age, he was particularly well known throughout the west. He was prominently identified with the newspaper business, being a director of the Winnipeg Free Press, Regina Leader and Saskatchewan Star. For years he had been in frail health.

Berlin Delegates Off To London Today; Talk Tariff Matters

BERLIN, June 25.—The British government's invitation for Germany to send a delegate to London in an effort to avert a threatened trade war has been accepted and the delegates are leaving today for England. The German Reichsbank announced at the week-end that, beginning today, total foreign exchange allowed importers will be fixed daily and will not exceed proceeds from exports, foodstuffs and raw materials to be given the preference.

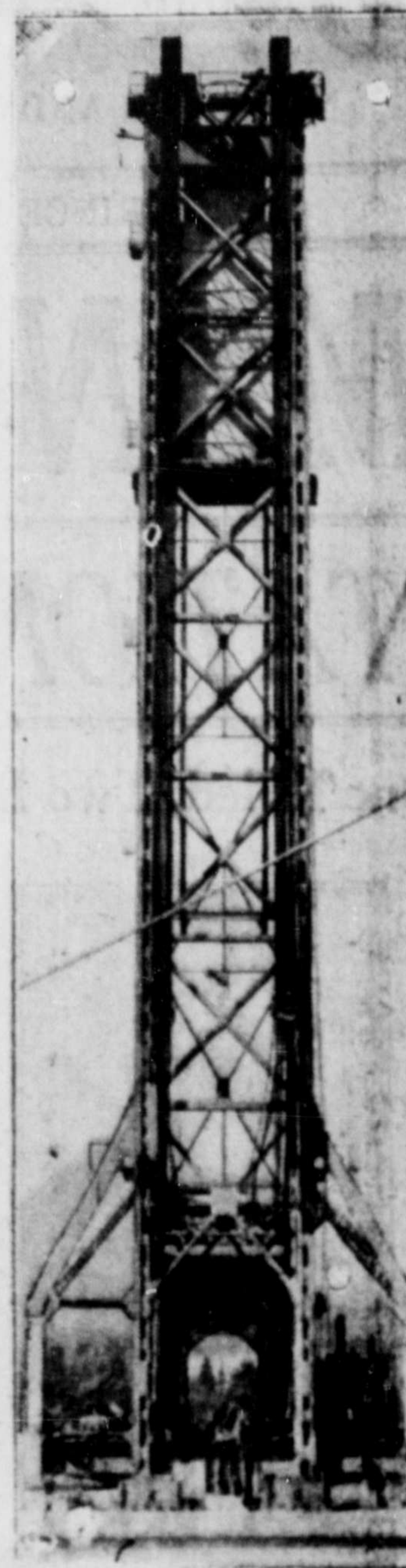

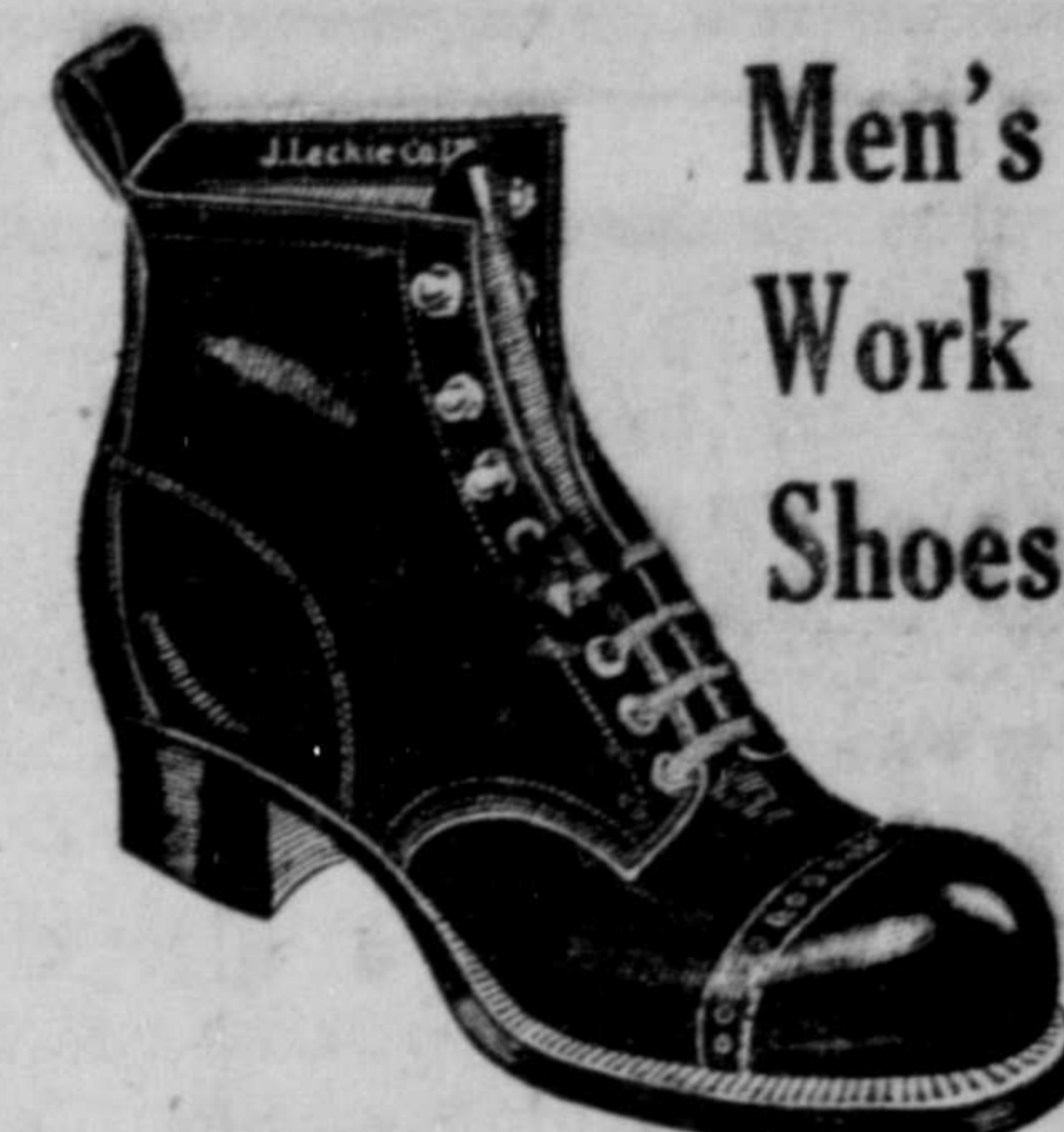

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Many Tourists in Town—Herring On Islands—Kergin Party On Cruise

There were 178 passengers in all aboard the steamer Princess Louise which was in port Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Of this total 112 were round trip tourists. Six persons disembarked from the vessel here while four boarded her here for the south.

Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Kergin left at the end of the week with their power cruiser Full Moon for a week's cruise in district waters, visiting among other parts Portland Canal, Observatory Inlet and Alice Arm. Their guests on the trip include Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Stevenson of Ottawa, Miss B. Fox R.N. of Toronto, Mrs. W. S. Kergin of Premier, Mrs. F. E. Robertson and Miss Margaret Kergin. They are due back in the city next Sunday.

One of the heaviest runs of herring that have been known for years in Skidegate Inlet has been on since the first of April, according to word received in Prince Rupert from the Queen Charlotte Islands. Quite a few schools of sardines have also been showing up there recently. Reports of late from the trolling grounds at Hippo Island have not been good, the fish continuing to be scarce and the boats making little. Quite a few large American trollers have been passing through Skidegate Inlet recently on their way to the fishing grounds on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Late again on account of having had heavy freights for cannery points along the coast, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson arrived in port at 9:45 last night from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox. Stewart and other northern points whence she is due to return here tomorrow morning and sail at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints. The vessel brought north a good sized list of passengers.

Southbound after her first voyage of the season to Alaska, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, her passenger list consisting largely of round trip tourists returning south, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. The vessel had 126 passengers on arrival from the north, one disembarking here.

Making her first appearance of the season here, C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, with Capt. William Palmer in command, arrived in port at 10:30 this morning from Vancouver and sailed at noon for Skagway and other Alaska points whence she is scheduled to return here southbound on Saturday afternoon. The vessel brought in a large passenger list, mostly consisting of round trip tourists for
