WINNIPEG, Oct. 18: (CP)—On the strength of reports that France was offering to sell wheat at prices meeting those of the Argentine, there was a break in grain prices on the Winnipeg and Chicago markets yesterday.

Steps Being Taken to Export Hemlock Logs From Here Under Permit Granted by Government

The council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, with Vice-President C. V. Eviitt presiding yesterday afternoon, set a number of committees to work with the purpose of taking advantage of the special permit of the provincial government allowing the cutting and marketing of thirty million feet of hemlock logs in the Prince Rupert district.

The lumber committee of the chamber has the matter in hand and has asked the members of the Northern B. C. Lumbermen's Association to co-operate with it in getting in touch with possible buyers and in putting buyers and loggers in touch with each other.

Finally, the chamber of commerce, being now wholly without funds, the membership committee under Paul Armour will make a drive for new members in order that it may be possible to properly finance the work of the various committees in connection with the organization of the whole scheme.

FUNERAL OF KING

Belgrade Crowded as All Jugo-Slavia Unites in Grief

Fears Were Felt

Special Precautions Were Taken to Prevent Untoward Incidents

BELGRADE, Oct. 18: (CP)—There were nearly 500,000 visitors in Belgrade today for the funeral of King Alexander, slain monarch of Jugo-Slavia, who was assassinated in Marseilles last week.

An atmosphere of terror prevailed lest anarchists should attempt to take the lives of Little King Peter, the successor to the dead monarch, King Carol, King Boris or other of the notables. Secret service agents made many arrests as they mingled among the crowds seeking firearms and bombs.

### POLICY REGARDING ROADS

The Vancouver Province, by inference, editorially belabors the Pattullo government for using part of it in each constituency instead of spending the million dollars it got from the Dominion on hard surfacing the highways in the south. If that policy had been carried out it would have meant that Prince Rupert would have had no highway work this year but the money would have been spent in the south, "frittered away" to enable the people of the B. C. metropolis to ride in greater comfort in their limousines.

It is the advocacy of a policy such as that which justifies the remarks of Clive Planta, member for the Peace River, when he speaks of Vancouver as "an octopus."

It seems likely that Prince Rupert will have to organize a pilgrimage to Vancouver in the near future to meet its board of trade, its newspapermen and other citizens and talk to them plainly, just as Mr. Planta has been doing. They must be taught that, if they are going to consider themselves the whole of British Columbia, it is time the northern section separates itself from the south and lets them spend their own money at home but, as for our money, we will spend it in the north where it is needed and where it belongs.

The southern part of British Columbia comes north for its spruce for its mills. The southern section comes to the Skeena River for its salmon, bringing along its own supplies and taking back the canned goods to be shipped from the port of Vancouver. The south comes to the Premier mine for its dividends and its business. It sends its ships to supply the whole of the coast and the interior with its needs and then it complains because the money borrowed for the development of the whole province was not expended in the south on hard surfacing for the limousines of the rich Vancouverites who are fattening on the people of the north.

We do not believe in setting one part of Canada against another. We did not altogether agree with Mr. Planta when he spoke of Vancouver as the octopus, but such editorial articles as those appearing in the two Vancouver evening newspapers from time to time wholly justify the remarks of the Peace River member.

Kelley, head of the Kelley Logging Co., who has been paying one of his periodical visits to his logging operations at Athol Inlet, the company service boat Norah-Jane arrived in port last evening from the Queen Charlotte Islands. Mr. Kelley will sail by the steamer Prince George tonight on his return to Vancouver. Capt. W. L. Dass, regular skipper of the Norah-Jane, will also go south tonight for an extended vacation. At Vancouver he will be joined by Mrs. Dass and they will tour Europe, spending the winter on the Mediterranean. Capt. Norman Davis will be skipper of the Norah-Jane during Capt. Dass' absence.

Capt. William Gleeson and other officers and members of the crew of the steamer Prince Charles, which returned here at the first of the week following a special voyage to Vancouver with a cargo of canned salmon from Butedale and the Queen Charlotte Islands, will sail

on the Prince George this evening for their homes in Vancouver. The Prince Charles is being withdrawn from service and tied up for the winter at the local dry dock. Queen Charlotte Island fishermen are reported to be indignant at the action of the government in putting on the new 7c tax on fuel oil. 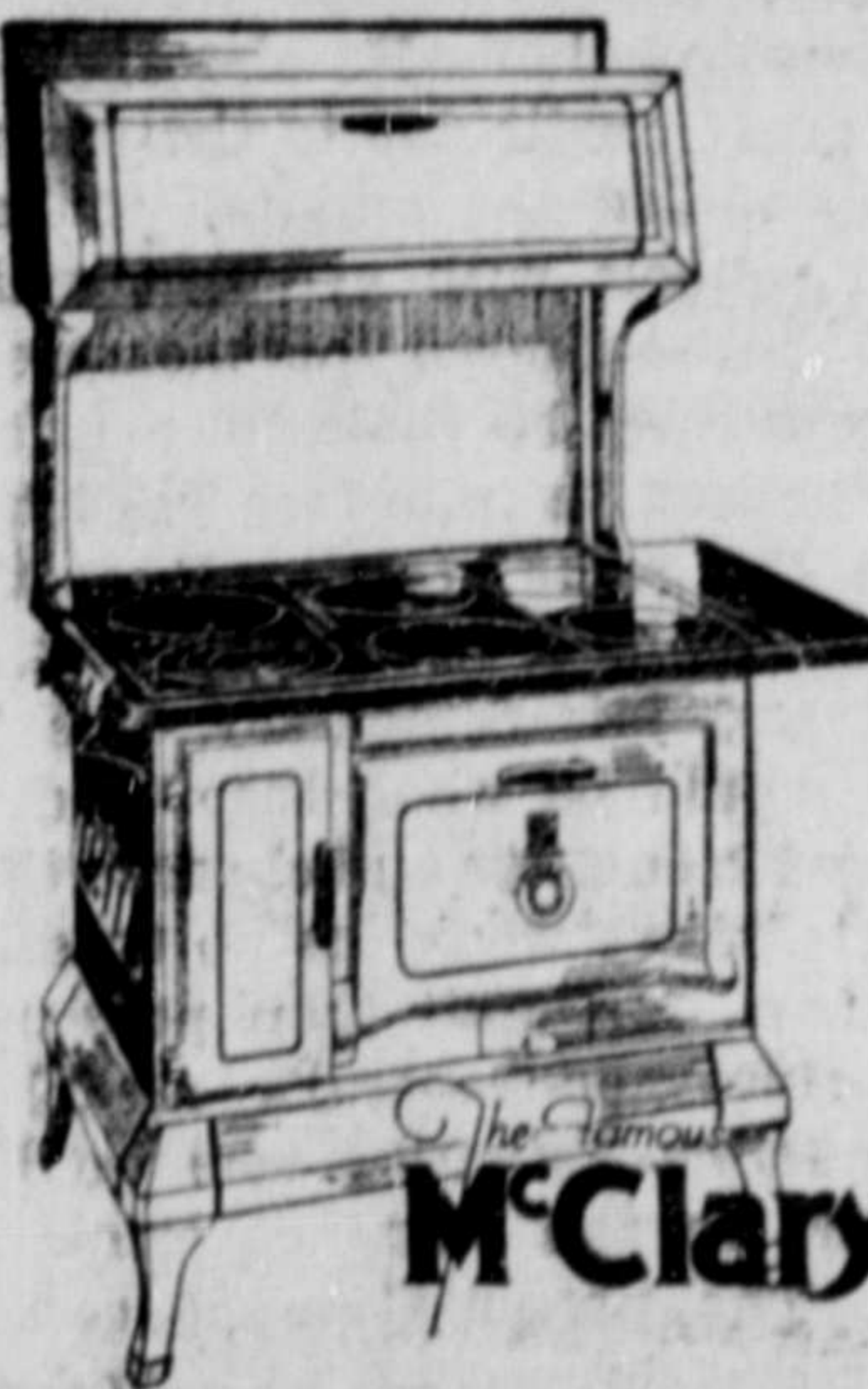
