James Grant and Two Companions Are Taken Under Hail of Bullets

Youth Who Made Get-Away From Jail in Southern City Last Week Was One of Robbers of Bank **On Monday Last**

VANCOUVER, Dec. 22: (CP)-James Grant, aged 23, who escaped December 13 from the city jail where he was awaiting trial on a charge of armed robbery, was last night charged with participation in Monday's hold-up of the Main and Prior Street branch of the Bank of Montreal after he and two companions had been captured under a hall of police bullets. This morning.

Grant and John Garvey, one of the companions, pleaded guilty in city Foreign Weakness police court to robbing the bank and were remanded until December 27 for sentence.
