SEATTLE, Aug. 7: (CP)—The \$100,000 surety bond of George Reifel, son of George Reifel of Vancouver, was ordered forfeited yesterday when he failed to appear for arraignment on a federal indictment charging a liquor smuggling conspiracy.

GOVERNOR IS HEARD

District Rotary Head Guest of Local Club Yesterday

The local Rotary Club changed its luncheon day this week because of the visit of the district governor, Percy B. Scurrah of Victoria, who arrived in the city from Ketchikan and proceeded south yesterday afternoon.

In his address, Governor Scurrah stressed the international value of the Rotary movement. Already there was a membership of 150,000 in seventy countries of the world and the influence of the organization was for the cultivation of international goodwill and the settling of disputes by peaceful arbitration rather than by the arbitrament of war.

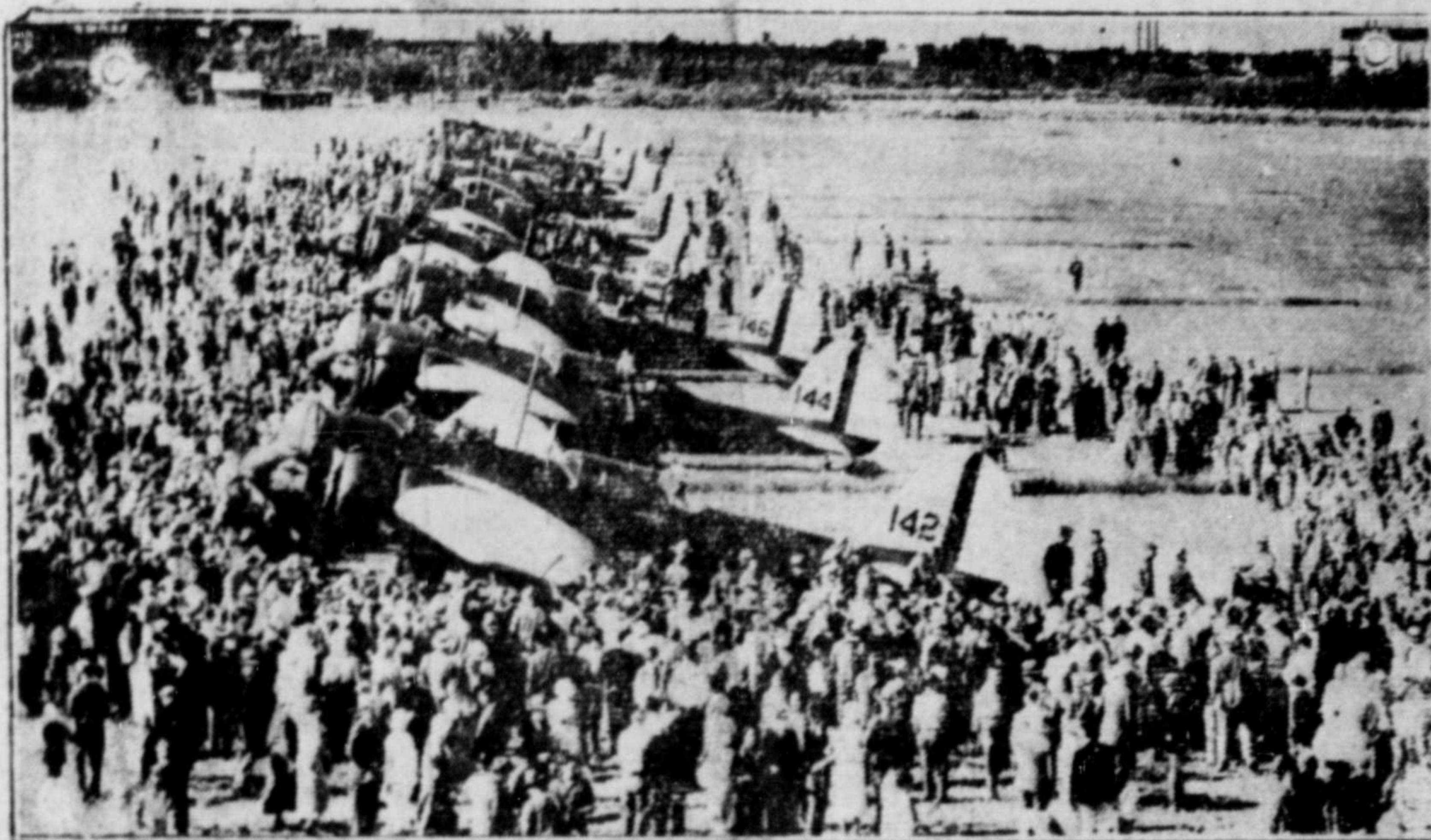

Queen Charlotte City Girl, With One Deadly Shot, Lays Low Huge Bruin Pen Raider

QUEEN CHARLOTTE CITY, Aug. 7:—Miss Edna Beaven, Queen Charlotte City High School pupil and daughter of Harry Beaven, well known and popular local merchant, last week shot and killed in the back yard of her home in the centre of this community a huge black bear that had been raiding chicken houses there for some time including those of Mr. Beaven and Mrs. H. Fairbairn. Miss Beaven laid low with one deadly shot the Bruin raider which had defied all local nimrods. It is said to be one of the largest bears ever killed on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

A huge bear that had been raiding the meathouse at the A. P. Allison Logging Co.'s camp at Cumshewa Inlet was also killed recently after he had helped himself to one final gorge. The bear was shot by Mr. Allison with the assistance of George Munro and William Streeseman.

More than seven hundred fishermen signed contracts with the Alaska Trollers Co-operative Marketing Association which will handle all catches on an outright cash advance of ten cents per pound for large red mild cures and 7½c to 5½c for small reds, whites and cohoes.



WHIFFLETS
From the Waterfront

Sockeye Fishing Falling Off—No Diminishing of Tourist Traffic—Harry Scott Visitor in Town.

With the sockeye run past its peak, boat averages for the gillnetters on both the Skeena and Naas Rivers are falling off. The boats last week were averaging 15 sockeye and 50 pinks. The run of pinks is just commencing although not in any great volume as yet. Cannery on the Queen Charlotte Islands, with their plants in readiness to run, are waiting anxiously for the pink run to commence in Massett Inlet and other Island seining areas. All canneries in Prince Rupert district are still in operation although some of the gillnet fishermen are reported to be quitting owing to the falling off of the sockeye run. Sockeye fishing in Smith's Inlet was closed on August 3, in Rivers Inlet on August 10 while in Skeena and Naas River waters it was expected it would end on August 20.

There is no diminishing as yet in the movement of tourist traffic through Prince Rupert, all Alaska vessels being crowded to capacity. Making her final scheduled voyage of the season, C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. W. Q. Palmer, was here from 9 to 11 o'clock yesterday morning with a total of 209 passengers on board. Three persons disembarked from the vessel here while two went north from here aboard her. C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, in port from 9 o'clock yesterday morning until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, had 190 passengers on board, four leaving the vessel at this port. On Saturday afternoon, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, calling from 4:30 until 6 p.m., had 204 passengers on board including 175 round trip tourists. Six persons left the vessel here while five boarded her at this port for the south. With another capacity list, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, is due in port tomorrow bound from Vancouver to Skagway.

Pilot Jack McConachie of Anyox was here from 3:15 to 6:30 Sunday afternoon with his Eastman flying boat, having made a special trip from the smelter town to have his ship inspected by R. Carter Guest of Vancouver, inspector of civil aviation for British Columbia.

Harry Scott, well known Grenville Channel handlogger, is on one of his periodical visits to town to break the monotony of his isolated existence down the coast. He arrived towards the end of last week aboard his power vessel Lella and will be returning to Grenville Channel later this week.

Awaiting the arrival of a delayed train from the east which brought in forty passengers for her, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, did not sail until 2 o'clock Sunday morning for Vancouver, Ocean Falls and Powell River, eight hours behind time. The steamer Prince Charles, for Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, also awaited the arrival of the train.

Two Seattle power yachts were in port yesterday in the course of Alaskan cruises. Northbound the 50-foot diesel-powered Vendovi, Skipper St. John, left at 2 p.m. for the north after spending the night here, having arrived the evening previous from Nanaimo.
