## GENEVA CONFERENCE IS ADJOURNED VANCOUVER BOARD OF TRADE VISITORS HAD BUSY DAY

### Nations Fail to Reach Agreement to Prevent New Armament Race

**Russian Emissary Has Plan to Offer of General World Wide Pacts Rather Than European Regional Accords**

GENEVA, June 12.—Unable to approach an agreement to prevent a general armament race, the world arms conference here has adjourned indefinitely. Maxim Litvinov, Soviet commissar of foreign affairs, proposed that the security committee of the conference consider general world wide pacts instead of restricting work to European regional accords. The delegate inferred that he proposed to include the Far East.

### BIG GROWTH OF EATON'S

**Affairs of Mail Order Concern Brought to Light Before Mass Buying Committee**

TORONTO, June 12.—W. L. Gordon, Toronto auditor, told the Parliamentary committee on mass buying and price spreads, presided over by Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, that the book value of the assets of T. Eaton Co. Ltd. rose from \$585,000 in 1891 to \$197,745,000 in 1931. The entire Eaton organization is controlled by the Sir John Eaton estate which owns 8,890 of 10,000 outstanding shares of T. Eaton Co. Ltd., Mr. Gordon said.

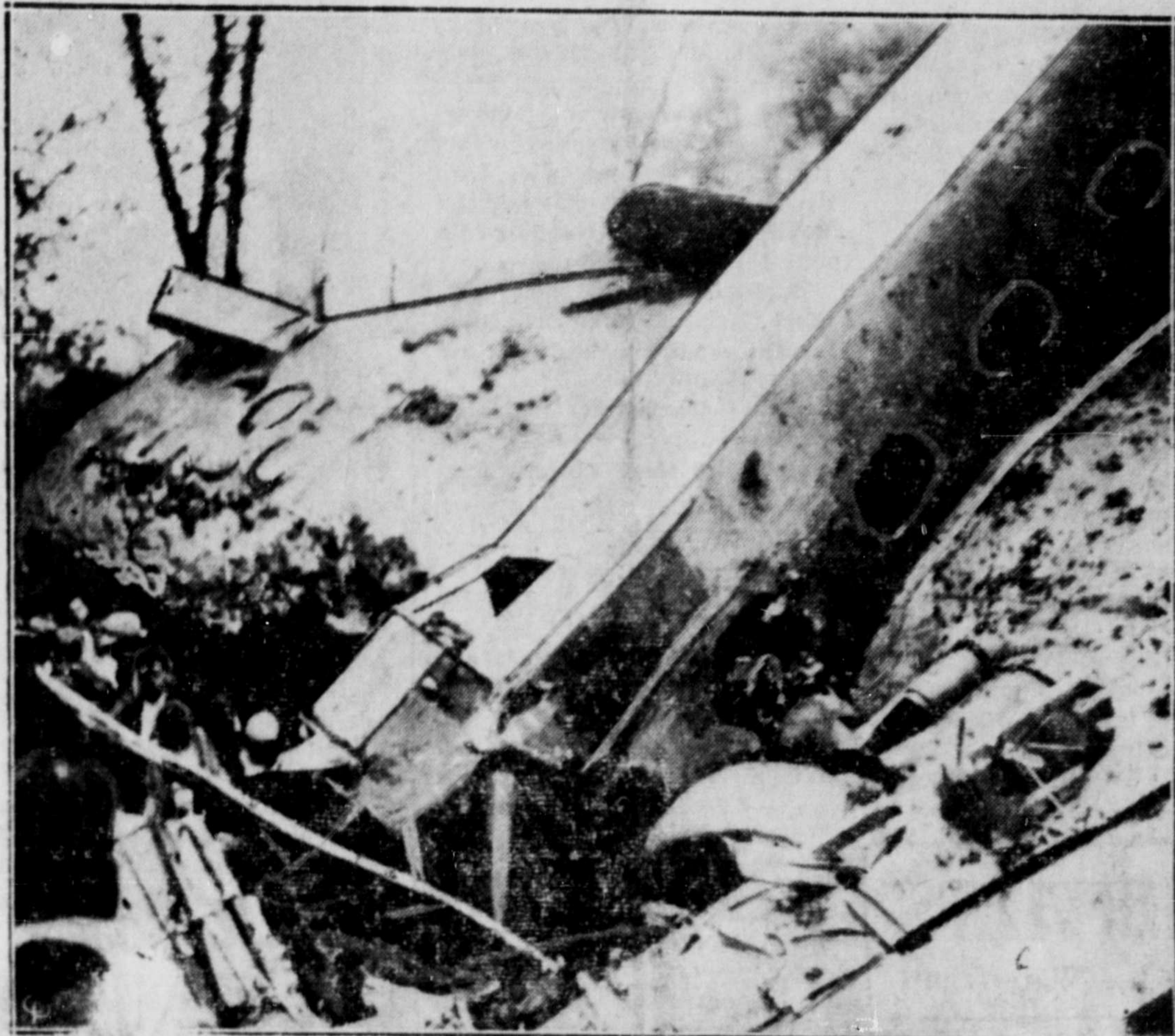

### Passengers Sing As Aeroplane, Lost In Fog, Crashes



Lost in a heavy fog near Bethel, Conn., pilot John Wolf flew around for more than two hours searching for a place to land. Meantime the nine passengers of the big transport plane kept in good spirits by telling jokes and singing. Then the fuel ran out, and pilot Wolf was forced to make a landing somewhere. Stewardess Agnes Pugh of Chicago calmly tucked the passengers in behind their safety belts, and the plane crashed only a couple of miles from a lighted landing field. None of the passengers was hurt, the pilot skillfully manoeuvring the plane so that the metal cabin was not damaged in the crash. The pilot and co-pilot were injured. The passengers were only shaken.

### T. H. Johnson Makes Strong Plea For Support of Vancouver For Highway East From This City

Prince Rupert has the climate, it has the automobiles, it has the finest of scenery which would attract thousands of tourists—but there is no road. This was the burden of the story told to the members of the Vancouver Board of Trade by T. H. Johnson at the dinner last night on board the steamship Prince Rupert at which a number of prominent Prince Rupert people were guests of the southern visitors.

Mr. Johnson was brief and to the point and told a good story to illustrate his point. He appealed to the visitors to the city who were on a goodwill tour to show that goodwill when it came to supporting the highway eastward from Prince Rupert to connect up with the rest of Canada. He asked them to think of all the reasons why it should be built rather than to use their influence against it.

The speaker stated that the matter of the highway had been before the Associated Boards of Trade of British Columbia on two occasions and each time it had been approved but that was as far as it got. Nothing had been done. He asked that they support this road even though they forego some of the work on existing roads in Southern British Columbia. Their slogan should be "On to Prince Rupert by Road in 1936."

### STORE DOWN COAST ROBBED LAST NIGHT OF LARGE AMOUNT

Advised by radio this morning from Butedale that the Kitimaat supply store had been robbed of a large sum of money last night, provincial police officers left today for the cannery point down the coast to conduct an investigation. No details of the robbery were contained in the message from C. Stewart, manager of the store, who requested that officers be sent at once to investigate.

### Mrs. Dione About Again; Five Babes Still Doing Well

CORBELL, Ont., June 12.—Mrs. Oliva Dione, who gave birth to quintuplet daughters recently, is up and around again and the five babies, the first in medical history to live so long, still are doing nicely. Dr. A. R. Dafee, attending physician, issues a report that in spite of a drop of three ounces in weight the quintuplets are now better than at any time during their whole two weeks of life. The heaviest baby had a weak turn Sunday but was reported to be better last night. Each babe has its own incubator and there is now no danger of infection.

### BACK IN POLITICS

London Hears Snowden is to Return To Public Life—Raps Simon And MacDonald

LONDON, June 12.—Viscount Philip Snowden, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, it is reported, is returning to active politics. In a statement, Snowden raps Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald as "a man of vanity, weakness and incoherence" and also criticizes Sir John Simon, declaring that no one knows where the National Government stands in foreign policy.

HAMILTON, Ont., June 12.—Lieut. Col. William H. Seymour, former district manager of the Imperial Life Assurance Co., died here yesterday at the age of sixty-four.

### Northern British Columbia Lands Must be Settled Says City Commissioner in Address

Vacant Tracts are Menace to Canada With Oriental Nation Looking For Places to Settle—New Deal Proposed

"The condition that exists in this province is a menace to the whole of Canada," declared W. J. Alder, city commissioner, in an address to the Vancouver Board of Trade party at dinner aboard the steamship Prince Rupert last evening. British Columbia, and especially Northern British Columbia, has huge tracts of vacant land and there is directly to the west a nation with an overflowing population looking for land. If Canada does not take steps to fill up these vacant lands the hordes from the Orient will eventually take possession. It is impossible to continue for long the policy of dog in the manger.

Mr. Alder urged that a policy of selective immigration should be commenced immediately to fill up these vacant lands with settlers. There was room for a million people in the central interior.

The commissioner spoke of the wealth of this part of the country. There was potential wealth in timber, minerals, fish and agricultural lands. He could not understand why under these conditions Prince Rupert had remained dormant so long. He knew of no part of Canada where the natural resources were as valuable as in this district. He thought people were now beginning to take note of these things. He urged Vancouver and Victoria to awake to the possibilities and to realize what a mine of wealth was at their door.

**STRIKE IS SPREADING**

Longshoremen, Seamen and Allied Workers at Frisco Call General Strike of Trade Unions

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Renewed threats of a "fight to a finish" added tenseness to the prolonged maritime workers' strike today while officials of the seaport cities admitted increasing concern over the situation.

Leaders of the longshoremen, seamen and allied workers have called a general strike of all trade unions and J. P. Ryan, president of the Longshoremen's Association, said the walk-out may spread to the Atlantic ports.

Riots occurred last night at San Pedro.

**FISHERMAN IS MISSING**

H. B. Thompson, Aged 72, Has Not Been Reported Since May 4

Some concern is being expressed in regard to the safety of H. B. Thompson, 72-year old veteran troll fisherman and former whaler of this district, who is last reported to have been seen in Prince Rupert on May 4. He had been fishing at Squadaree on Dundas Island and was contemplating going to Warke Canal. Since then he has been reported at neither place nor in the city. His disappearance has been reported to the provincial police.

Mr. Thompson has relatives at Orcas Island who, in addition to his friends, are anxious to learn his whereabouts.

**Ottawa Ready To Make Advance To City of Montreal**

OTTAWA, June 12.—Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, federal minister of labor has wired Premier Taschereau of Quebec that the government is prepared to advance the city of Montreal \$5,000,000 at five percent on security of treasury bills of the province.

TORONTO, June 12.—President Joshua L. Johns of Appleton, Wis. consin, addressing the eighteenth annual Kiwanis International convention at Royal York Hotel, praised Canadian law enforcement and government and attributes freedom of the Dominion from crime to speedy justice.

The "Interior News" of Smithers recently achieved notoriety through an editorial stating that relief in that district had become a "racket." This startling discovery was made through a few train crews and extra-gang laborers getting a few days' employment clearing slides from freshets. The fact is that a few days' work was had and the interior paper would have us believe that they were whole time employed and so racketing on relief.

A genuine relief racket in this city which all who care may witness has not yet been discovered by either yourself or contemporary. Advantage has been taken to exploit relief workers, without footwear, clothing or adequate sustenance, to get this work done.

We, the unemployed, can only conclude that after eight months in office the promises of the Liberal government anent work and wages have fizzled out. Under present conditions, the unemployed have nothing to show for their work while the government and private concerns are benefitting to the extent of thousands of dollars. Personally, I think that it is the authorities who are the demoralized by the imposing of such iniquitous demands. The unemployed are being used to lower wages.

This is a case for mass united front action to send in a protest instead of standing idly by watching the submerged tenth being deliberately enslaved. These men are entitled to standard rates of pay. The laborer is worthy of his hire.

## AUSTRALIA IS WINNER

First Cricket Match Concludes at Nottingham Today With Visitors Victorious

NOTTINGHAM, June 12; (CP)—A crowd of more than thirty thousand persons today saw the Australians, after assuming a substantial advantage over England on Monday, win the first of the season's test cricket matches by a margin of 238 runs, the scores at the close of play being: Australia, 374 and 273 for eight wickets; England, 268 and 141.

The Aussie bowlers proved too tough on the crumbling wicket for the Englishmen who tried desperately to draw. The last five English wickets were collared for only thirty-one runs.

Australia declared just before lunch, giving England the task of having to get 386 runs for a win in less than six hours.

At the close of play yesterday, the scores were: Australia, 374 and 159 for three wickets; England, 268.
