





We do not want to default, neither do we want to lose our property, but, unless relief is forthcoming, the property will be lost. I can point out many a block on Third Avenue that is not producing enough rent to pay two-thirds of the taxes to say nothing of the upkeep, insurance and mortgage interest.

There is no use tackling the problem in a half-hearted fashion. Let us deal with it effectively. We need relief to enable us to meet our obligations. Reduce the taxes and more will be collected. Keep them at the present level and more property will be returned to the city. This may keep on until the load becomes so heavy that the bondholder may be glad to accept 50 cents on the dollar.

Therefore, I would suggest that the taxpayers petition the provin-ENDED cial government before the proposed refunding scheme is accepted and put into effect. Let us request a more liberal refunding scheme to enable the commissioner to reduce the taxes or let us wait until the municipalities in the south settle


