BIG TIE CONTRACTS THIS FALL

IMPORTANT BUSINESS VISITORS FROM OLD COUNTRY HERE

Timbering Activity in Interior Will Compare With Former Big Years

Reported That Canadian National Will be in Market For 1,500,000 Pieces, Meaning Distribution in District Of \$600,000 or More

According to reports received in the city today from the interior the tie department of the Canadian National Railways is placing orders for no less than 1,500,000 hewn ties this winter along the line between Prince George and Prince Rupert. This is said to be the best news the interior has received in years and, if the business actually attains this volume, it should put the "

country back on its feet again with | timber activity comparable with that of the former good years. At the rate of 40c per tie, orders for a million and a half ties would mean the distribution in the district during the winter months of no less than \$600,000.

The carryover of ties from previous cuts is now cleaned up and the railway company is ready to take more, it is reported. Some camps in the Francois Lake district are already said to be opening up.

ON STRIKE

Wages and Committee Recognition Demanded by Convicts At New Westminster

NEW WESTMINSTER, Sept. 12: (CP)-Approximately 100 convicts in the penitentiary here have been confined to their cells since they went on strike, refusing to work unless their demand for wages and recognition of convicts' standing committees is met, Col. H. W. Cooper, warden, stated late yesterday.

Although the atmosphere is still tense, there has been no violence. Prisoners locked in their cells yammered at and threatened 220 other convicts who continued to work in the prison

DISORDERS IN STRIKE

Additional National Guardsmen Are Sent to New England States

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 12: (CP)-Additional National Guard troops were called out yesterday in connection with breaking out of renewed violence in New England in the textile workers' strike. From Providence, troops were sent to Salesville. Rhode Island, where two men and one woman were injured when strike pickets attempted to prevent the reopening of a mill with non-union labor. Additional National Guardsmen were also sent to Connecticut and Maine mill

The calls for mobilization of additional troops were made while the federal mediation board continued to seek peace through conferences with the mill owners.



Sensational Charges Made In Regard to Officers' Conduct In Morro Castle Catastrophe

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. (CP)—Sensational charges in regard to conduct of officers of the Ward liner Morro Castle during the fire disaster aboard the vessel at sea last Saturday were made at the government inquiry into the calamity here yesterday.

It was alleged by witnesses that Edwin S. Abbott, chief engineer of the vessel, did not go down to the engine room on being called after the fire was discovered and that he and two of his assistants were in the first lifeboat to be broken out from the ship. In this lifeboat were only three passengers, it was said.

Passengers, it was declared, had to jump into the sea while officers were leaving the ship in the boats. The deaths were entirely confined to passengers.

Disclosures following one another in rapid succession tend to substantiate the charges that there was lack of organization on the Morro Castle and that lack of discipline of the crew caused the burning of the \$5,500,000 liner and the appalling loss of human life.

George W. Rogers, chief radio operator, told the inquiry board today that it was fully thirty minutes after he was awakened because of the fire aboard the ship before he received instructions to send out an "S. O. S." message.

EXTENDING REDEMPTION PERIOD

Undoubtedly, the action of the provincial government in extending for another year the period in which tax sale lots in Prince Rupert may be redeemed before deeds become available to those bidding in such property will be welcomed by many property owners who may have been unfortunate enough to be unable to pay up taxes, especially those who were in danger of losing their homes and there are understood to have been some of these.

It is improbable that, in view of the extension, any home owners who are able to pay their taxes would be so shortsighted as to neglect to do so. There would seem to be no advantage in that course as it would only result in eventually making the burden that much heavier.

Meantime, some who may need it badly will be accorded

relief.

By the time another year passes, indications are that times may be so improved that it will not be so difficult as it has been during the past few years for the municipal taxpayer to carry on.

KIDNAPPING RACKET IN CANADA

The kidnapping racket, if one is to believe what one hears, is showing signs of developing to rather ambitious proportions in Canada. We had believed that the field for this game in the Dominion was not so fruitful as in the United States and that the administration of justice to criminals here was of such efficacy that few were daring enough to take the risks of detection and punishment. True there is not a great deal to be alarmed about as yet. In the Labatt case, it appears that the authorities are close on the trail and that the perpetrators of the abduction and abortive ransom attempt may soon be run down. As for Premier Bennett, nothing, of course, really did happen and the "confession" reported to have been made bears some earmarks of hoax.

There is no reason yet to believe that kidnappers in this country are not due for short shrift-even if the "snatchers" do steal across from the United States to attempt to carry out their nefarious undertakings.
