## GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD END OF SEPT.

### LOCAL CONSERVATIVES ELECT THEIR DELEGATES

Preparing to Elect a Candidate to Contest Comox-Atlin—Held Secret Meeting in MacIntyre Hall Last Night—McBride may be Asked to Run.

Prince Rupert Conservatives met last night to choose delegates on whom will be laid the responsibility as far as the city Conservatives are concerned of seeing the Conservative candidate for the forthcoming election. On Thursday night these delegates will meet and confer with the delegates from the other districts of this northern portion of the constituency to come to a decision regarding their candidate. The meeting will be held in the office of Mr. W. E. Fisher. Rumors are flying very thick as to the identity of the Conservative candidate for Comox-Atlin. One prominent Conservative today stated that if Duncan Ross were nominated by the Liberals that strong efforts would be made to induce Premier McBride to oppose him. Premier McBride's ambition to enter the Federal arena is then for granted. It is doubtless felt that the only hope of success rested in securing a candidate of exceptional strength. But whether Mr. McBride would risk the security of his premiership and take chances of being an "also ran" is another question.

### BRITISH NAVY CALL TO ARMS

Atlantic Fleet Cancels Norway Trip—Crews Recalled—Troubles over Moroccan Question.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, July 26.—That the Moroccan difficulty is becoming acute is indicated in a sudden order issued by the Admiralty today cancelling the projected visit of the Atlantic fleet to Norway. It is reported that crews of several ships in the home fleet have been ordered to hold themselves ready for active service.

### GREAT GALE ON ST. LAWRENCE

Thousand Islands District Suffers Great Loss and Many Boats are Missing.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Thousand Island Park, N. Y., July 26.—Several lives are believed to be lost and many thousand dollars worth of property destroyed by a terrific wind storm which has been sweeping the St. Lawrence River since last night. A gale of seventy miles an hour is still blowing and a score of boats are missing. Grave fears are entertained for the safety of a number of the holiday-seekers.

### TWO OFFICERS RESIGN

Police Constables Mansell and Miller Left the Force this Morning.

Chief Vickers stated today that two of his officers, viz., Constables Mansell and Miller had resigned their positions. Both men were efficient officers, and rendered excellent service at the time of the strike riot. Mr. Mansell who has a good many more years in front of him than behind him may revive a former association with newspaper work in the south. He has of late expressed his intention of doing so. It is hoped that "Jerry" Miller will remain in Rupert as if he adheres to his intention to take up his own business as lineman down below his loss will be felt by the Baseball League.

### VANCOUVER LOSES SUIT OVER DEADMAN'S ISLAND

Must Turn Property Over to Lawful Owners, Pay all Costs and Run Risk of Succession of Damage and Loss Actions—Property was Worth \$300,000 Two Years Ago.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Vancouver, July 26.—The long drawn out suit law between the city of Vancouver and Theodore Ludgate over the possession of land on Deadman's Island has been decided in favor of Ludgate by the Privy Council of the British Empire. That was announced in a cable received this morning from London. The case before the Privy Council was an appeal by the city against a judgment of the British Columbia Court of Appeals which had previously decided in Ludgate's favor. The cost of the present appeal, amounting to about \$20,000 is to be added to the costs of the lower courts and be paid by the city. The property at stake was offered to the city two years ago for \$300,000. It is now worth much more. In addition to the costs which the city must bear,

it is expected that suits for damages and losses will be filed against the city by the lawful owners who had been refused possession of the Island.

### FIRE AT GRAND FORKS

Business Section Suffers a Loss of \$100,000 Early this Morning

(Canadian Press Despatch) Grand Forks, B. C., July 26.—Fire this morning wiped out the business portion of this town involving a loss of estimated at \$100,000. The fire is still raging but is now under control.

### SING AMONG NATIVE BLACKS

(Canadian Press Despatch) Victoria, July 26.—News of an outbreak of murders by the blacks on the New Hebrides has been reported by the steamer Zealandia which arrived here last night. Alexander Jansen, a trader from South Santo, was reported following a quarrel with a white woman.

M. S. Prometheus landed an expedition party to seek the murderer without effecting a capture.

### Fought a Draw

Sacramento, July 26.—(Special) Monte Attell and Jimmie Reagan fought twenty rounds to a draw last night.

### VANCOUVER MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

His Name was Robb—Leaped into the Sea While on Way Across the Pacific.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Victoria, July 26.—The steamer Zealandia which arrived here last night from Australia reported that when one day out from Suva a man named Robb of Vancouver, who was being deported from Australia in charge of a keeper jumped overboard and was drowned. The body was recovered and buried at sea. Robb had developed a suicidal mania.

### HAD GOOD VOYAGE

S.S. Prince Rupert Brought 130 Passengers

After a fine voyage the S.S. Prince Rupert docked this morning with about 130 passengers and several hundred tons of freight.

### CRISIS AT WESTMINSTER IS STILL CONTINUED

F. E. Smith, a Prominent Unionist, Leaves the Balfourites and Joins the Insurgents—Efforts Made to have Balfour Superseded by Austen Chamberlain.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, July 26.—The constitutional crisis in the House of Commons is no nearer settlement than yesterday. The House divided with the Conservatives and Liberal Unionists voting to obstruct the work of the House. A notable incident occurred this morning when Mr. F. E. Smith, K. C., the leading member among the Unionists and one of those who led in yesterday's stormy debate, went over and ranged himself among the insurgent Unionists.

A similar effort is being made in the House of Lords among the insurgent Peers to have Lord Lansdowne dethroned in favor of the Earl of Selborne.

### A PIONEER GONE

John T. Olsen Dies at Portage la Prairie—Old Hudson's Bay Man.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Portage la Prairie, July 26.—John T. Olsen, one of the oldest pioneers in Western Canada whose life was closely interwoven with the early history of the Hudson's Bay Company in its far north posts died today, aged 65.

## GOVERNMENT DECIDES TO HOLD AN ELECTION

Decision Arrived at Last Night After Caucus Meeting of Both Parties---Conservatives Decide to Continue Obstruction--- Government Will Continue Debate for a Few Days to Show that Election is Inevitable---Dissolution Fixed in Two Weeks Time and Election at End of September

(Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, July 26.—There will be a general election within two months. This was made certain last night when the Government held a caucus and decided definitely to place their political future in the hands of the electors of the whole Dominion of Canada. Obstruction to Continue

Both parties held caucuses last night. The first was the Conservative. There the whole situation was reviewed on private by various speakers, and a decision was come to to continue the

policy of obstruction until the Government dropped the reciprocity measure.

**Liberals then Met**  
After hearing the decision of the Opposition, the Liberals then met in private and determined to continue to press the measure in Parliament for a little while longer in order to make it clear to the people of Canada that the country is being tied up by a minority in the House and that a general election is necessary if the affairs of the country are to be proceeded with.

**Dissolve in Two Weeks**  
Parliament will probably be dissolved within two weeks, and the election date will be fixed as soon after as it is possible to have the voters' lists prepared. The date of the election cannot yet be definitely fixed, but it will probably be in the last week of September or the first week of October.

### Government Confident

The Government are confident that they will sweep the country, and vindicate the right of the majority to rule the country.

## FIRST CHINESE WOMAN REACHES RUPERT

She is Mrs. M. B. Quen, Wife of the Manager of the King Tai Co.—With Her Three Children She Left Canton a Month Ago—Likes Canadian Ways.

Garbed in pretty Oriental clothes the first Chinese woman to reach the city, arrived in Prince Rupert today. She is the wife of M. B. Quen, manager of King Tai and Company. Being a naturalized Canadian Mr. Quen made application to the Dominion Government for a permit to allow his wife to come. The permit was granted. A month ago Mrs. Quen her two boys and one girl left Canton, China, on the S.S. Mont-

eagle for Vancouver. The father and husband was there to meet his loved ones whom he had not seen for ten years. After a few days' stay with relations in Vancouver Mr. Quen brought his family here with the exception of the eldest boy who will go to school in Vancouver. Though the new arrivals cannot speak a word of English, they have told Mr. Quen they are pleased with Canadian people and

the ways of the country. Mrs. Quen and her two children aroused a good deal of interest coming up on the S.S. Prince Rupert. They will live in rooms over King Tai and Company's store, Fulton street. To watch The News want ads is to find a better furnished room some of these days.

### BOBBY LEACH DID THE TRICK

Went over Niagara Falls in a Steel Barrel Yesterday

(Canadian Press Despatch) Niagara Falls, July 26.—Outwitting the police at last Bobby Leach, the veteran navigator of the whirlpool rapids, went over the Horseshoe Falls yesterday afternoon in a steel barrel. The end was knocked off the barrel, and Leach sustained a broken leg. Otherwise he was not injured though he had a narrow escape from losing his life.

### BROKE INTO ACME STORE

Cleverly Removed Window Pane and Rifled Till. Rewarded by \$1.75 all in Nickles. Police Sleuths on the Track.

In the small hours last night some one managed audroitly to enter the premises of the Acme Clothing Company on Second avenue. The entire pane of glass in a window on the ground floor at the back of the store was removed and placed carefully on one side while the burglar slipped into the front store and rifled the till.

A sum of one dollar and seventy-five cents all in nickles rewarded the enterprise. The burglary was discovered by the manager this morning, and the police are investigating the matter. It is suspected that the thief was the work of mischievous boys rather than of serious burglars.

## FIRST GAME OF RUPERT'S FIRST BASEBALL LEAGUE

### THE COAL DUTIES—AND RECIPROCITY

There is a shortage of coal in Saskatchewan and Alberta at present owing to the coal strike. If the strike continues Saskatchewan and Alberta will have a coal famine this winter. And coal in winter-time is as necessary as food.

There is a lot of coal in Pennsylvania—more in fact than the people of Pennsylvania need for themselves. They want to sell some of it, in order to use the money to purchase things from other parts of the world.

If the people of Saskatchewan and Alberta need coal, and the people of Pennsylvania have coal to sell, why do not the people of Saskatchewan and Alberta buy coal in Pennsylvania?

The reason they do not buy coal from Pennsylvania is because in Canada there is a self-imposed tax on coal from Pennsylvania. This tax makes Pennsylvania coal too dear for the people of Saskatchewan and Alberta to buy. It was purposely made high, in order to prevent the people of Saskatchewan and Alberta and the other Canadian Provinces from buying coal across the border.

Fearing lest some of their people should perish from cold in winter unless coal was obtained, the Governments of Saskatchewan and Alberta on Monday asked for the removal of the tax on coal so as to enable them to buy what they needed. The Federal Government is considering the request, and will likely grant it. For the Federal Government has showed frequent desire of late to repeal taxation from the necessities of life. They have even gone to the trouble to combat the false arguments and the "appeals to patriotism" of those who profit by keeping taxation on the necessities of life.

If the taxation is kept on coal, the people of Saskatchewan and Alberta will go short of coal this winter. If the taxation is removed they will get all the coal they need. That is the effect of taxation—to make it more difficult to get hold of the things that are taxed.

Food is just as much a necessity of life as coal. Food that is taxed is subject to the same economic laws as coal that is taxed—i.e., it is more difficult to procure it when it is taxed. British Columbia cannot raise as yet all the food she needs. It is necessary for her to purchase from her neighbors. Yet in our foolishness, we impose taxes upon the very thing we need most. Then to cap the foolishness we pay the tax ourselves. The only consolation is that our neighbors are equally as foolish.

The reciprocity bill is a measure designed to end this piece of economic foolishness. The two nations who have to interchange food products, agree to mutually abolish the taxes on food.

When reciprocity passes, as it will pass, food will be cheaper, the dealers will be able to make more profits, and the margin of savings will be larger. Only those who at present receive parasitic nourishment from the tariff will go short.

What Saskatchewan and Alberta are driven to do in order to make coal more plentiful, the whole of Canada should do to make food more plentiful.

NOTES DUE

The attitude of the British Unionist party in Great Britain is cleverly hit off by "Buck" in a cartoon in the Morning Albertan. He shows a figure of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. Jekyll is saying "Reciprocity is a device to ruin the Empire." Mr. Hyde is saying "What right have Canadians to interfere with our politics?"

The cartoon hits off the British Unionists' views on the political relationships of Canada and Britain very well.

By the way, how consistent the Conservatives are in trying to get away from their name and get the word Liberal tacked on. In Great Britain they call themselves Liberal-Unionists, in Canada, Liberal-Conservatives. In British Columbia some of them call themselves "independent Liberals."

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### GRAND TRUNK CO. AND SEAL COVE

Mr. D'Arcy Tate Writes that There is no Intention to Fill up the Cove—G. T. P. Hopes to Have a Lumber Co. There Soon.

A letter from Mr. D'Arcy Tate received by the city council last night gives the assurance that it is not the intention of the Grand Trunk Pacific Company to fill up Seal Cove. On the contrary, it is hoped that a lumber corporation may locate there shortly, and the Company suggests that the City should do something to encourage any lumber company anxious to come.

### CHARGE AGAINST ICE TRUST

Alleged to Have Withheld Ice from Dealers During Heat Wave.

New York, July 25.—The district attorney and the city police today began an investigation of the Knickerbocker Ice Company, which does by far the largest ice business here.

The charge is that the so-called ice trust has withheld ice from independent dealers during the recent prolonged heat wave. In other words, conducted its business in restraint of trade.

The situation in the tenement district, where the poor found it almost impossible to buy small quantities of ice desired for their humble homes, has attracted attention and spurred the authorities to action.

### ASYLUM BURNED AT WICHITA

Two Main Buildings in Ashes—Feared that Many Inmates Have Perished.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Wichita, Kansas, July 25.—The state hospital for the feeble-minded is on fire and the entire institution is doomed. The two main buildings are already in ashes. Details are lacking but it is feared the loss of life is heavy among the unfortunate inmates.

### ARE GIVEN FREEDOM

Empress of India and Many Passengers Released from Quarantine.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Victoria, July 25.—The steamer Empress of India which was quarantined on her arrival on Saturday was released at 2 o'clock Tuesday with thirty-three saloon and many of the steerage passengers.

### Light Plant Coal

Tenders for coal for the electric light plant were opened in council Monday. The amount tendered for is 225 tons. Messrs. Rochester & Munro tendered \$8.85 cents for supplying and delivering. Messrs. Rogers & Black and the Union Transfer Co. each tendered \$8.25. The coal is to be of special screened lump quality for steam production.

### BOBBY LEACH HAD TO QUIT

Intrepid Barrel Navigator was not Allowed to go over Niagara Falls.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Niagara Falls, July 25.—With the police on both sides of the border looking for him, Bobbie Leach, the barrel navigator who announced his intention of going over the Falls yesterday afternoon in a barrel, was forced to abandon the trip.

### PEACH CROP SUFFERS

High Winds in Ontario Destroy Twenty Per Cent of the Ripe Fruit.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Niagara Falls, July 25.—Over \$100,000 damage has been occasioned in the fruit belt by the winds yesterday. Twenty per cent of the ripe peach crop is now on the ground.

## A REMINISCENCE OF SHERLOCK HOLMES

### THE ADVENTURE OF THE DEVIL'S FOOT

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Holmes smiled at the compliment. "It took two, or possibly three, handfuls before the lodger came to the window. You beckoned him to come down. He dressed hurriedly and descended to his sitting-room. You entered by the window. There was an interview—a short one—during which you walked up and down the room. Then you passed out and closed the window, standing on the lawn outside smoking a cigar and watching what occurred. Finally, after the death of Tregennis, you withdrew as you had come. Now, Dr. Sterndale, how do you justify such conduct, and what were the motives for your actions? If you prevaricate or trifle with me, I will give you my assurance that the matter will pass out of my hands for ever."

Our visitor's face had turned ashen grey as he listened to the words of his accuser. Now he sat for some time in thought with his face sunk in his hands. Then, with a sudden impulsive gesture, he plucked a photograph from his breast-pocket and threw it on the rustic table before us.

"That is why I have done it," said he.

It showed the bust and face of a very beautiful woman. Holmes stooped over it.

"Brenda Tregennis," said he. "Yes, Brenda Tregennis," repeated our visitor. "For years I have loved her. For years she has loved me. There is the secret of that Cornish seclusion which people have marvelled at. It has brought me close to the one thing on earth that was dear to me. I could not marry her, for I have a wife who has left me for years, and yet whom, by the deplorable laws of England, I could not divorce. For years Brenda waited. For years I waited. And this is what we have waited for." A terrible sob shook his great frame, and he clutched his throat under his bristled beard.

Then with an effort he mastered himself and spoke on.

"The vicar knew. He was in our confidence. He would tell you she was an angel upon earth. That was why he telegraphed to me and I returned. What was my baggage to Africa to me when I learned that such a fate had come upon my darling? There you have the missing clue to my action, Mr. Holmes."

"Proceed," said my friend.

Dr. Sterndale drew from his pocket a paper packet and laid it upon the table. On the outside was written, "Radix pedish diaboli," with a red poison label beneath it. He pushed it towards me. "I understand that you are a doctor, sir. Have you ever heard of this preparation?"

"Devil's-foot root! No, I have never heard of it."

"It is no reflection upon your professional knowledge," said he, "for I believe that, save for one sample in a laboratory in Buda, there is no other specimen in Europe. It has not yet found its way either into the pharmacopoeia or into the literature of toxicology. The root is shaped like a foot, half human, half goatlike; hence the fanciful name given by a botanical missionary. It is used as an ordeal poison by the medicine-men in certain districts of West Africa, and is kept as a secret among them. This particular specimen I obtained under very extraordinary circumstances in the Ubanghi country."

He opened the paper as he spoke, and disclosed a heap of reddish-brown, snuff-like powder.

"Well, sir?" asked Holmes, sternly.

"I am about to tell you, Mr. Holmes, all that actually occurred, for you already know so much that it is clearly to my interest that you should know all. I have already explained the relationship in which I stood to the Tregennis family. For the sake of the sister I was friendly with the brothers. There was a family

quarrel about money which estranged this man Mortimer, but it was supposed to be made up, and I afterwards met him as I did the others. He was a sly, subtle, scheming man, and several things arose which gave me a suspicion of him, but I had no cause for any positive quarrel.

"One day, only a couple of weeks ago, he came down to my cottage and I showed him some of my African curiosities. Among other things, I exhibited this powder, and I told him of its strange properties, how it stimulates those brain centres which control the emotion of fear, and how either madness or death is the fate of the unhappy native who is subjected to the ordeal by the priest of his tribe. I told him also how powerless European science would be to defeat it. How he took it I cannot say, for I never left the room, but there is no doubt that it was then, while I was opening cabinets and stooping to boxes, that he managed to abstract some of the devil's-foot root. I well remember how he plied me with questions as to the amount and the time that was needed for its effect, but I little dreamed that he could have a personal reason for asking.

"I thought no more of the matter until the vicar's telegram reached me at Plymouth. This villain had thought that I would be at sea before the news could reach me, and that I should be lost for years in Africa. But I returned at once. Of course, I could not listen to the details without feeling assured that my poison had been used. I came round to see you on the chance that some other explanation had suggested itself to you. But there could be none. I was convinced that Mortimer Tregennis was the murderer: that for the sake of money, and with the idea, perhaps, that if the other members of his family were all insane he would be the sole guardian of their joint property, he had used the devil's-foot powder upon them, driven two of them out of their senses, and killed his sister Brenda, the one human being whom I have ever loved or who has ever loved me. There was his crime; what was to be his punishment?"

"Should I appeal to the law? Where were my proofs? I knew that the facts were true, but could I help to make a jury of countrymen believe so fantastic a story? I might or I might not. But I could not afford to fail. My soul cried out for revenge. I have said to you once before, Mr. Holmes, that I have spent much of my life outside the law, and that I have come at last to be a law to myself. So it was now. I determined that the fate which he had given to others should be shared by himself. Either that, or I would do justice upon him with my own hand. In all England there can be no man who sets less value upon his own life that I do at the present moment."

Woman Has Posed as Her Husband's Brother for Seven Years.

Long Beach, Cal., July 25.—Mrs. Roy Ballou is no longer a "boy," after seven years of posing as her husband's brother during which time she worked as a boy on Ballou's cranberry farm. Mrs. Ballou on Monday walked into police headquarters and told her story. She said she was being followed by a man she thought was a detective, and she decided to end her duplicity.

Mrs. Ballou says she got along much easier as a boy than she could by wearing skirts, as scarcely any attention is paid to boys, whereas, she claims, a woman's lot on the sea is anything but pleasant. Her last experience was in San Diego, when she was arrested on coming ashore from the steamer Yale, on which boat she was cabin boy.

### DISASTROUS FIRE AT SEDRO-WOOLEY

Two Whole Blocks in Business Section are Fireswept—Damage Totals \$200,000.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Bellingham, July 25.—A fire which started from an explosion in the Hardware store of Fritz Brothers last night swept two main business blocks in the town of Sedro-Wooley causing a loss estimated at \$200,000. The insurance is given at \$100,000. Several people were injured during the fire.

### Rough on Rats

Alderman Newton's Infectious Complaints By-law went through council last night. Its main provision is for precautions to be taken against the swarming ashore of the rats from vessels moored at the wharf. Copies of the by-law are to be printed and distributed as other provisions affect residents in the city, and are important in view of the serious difficulties any outbreak of infectious illness would cause in the city.
