Dangers of Speculation and How To Avoid Being on "Sucker List" Outlined; Rules For Investment

Dr. J. T. Mandy Talks Plainly of Mining Promotion and Investment to Members of Rotary Club

Urging his hearers to beware of the high pressure salesmen and not to fall for the long distance telephone calls of crooks and frauds, Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, in an address to the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday afternoon, defended speculation in mining properties, declaring that the success of the industry had in the past depended upon what he called "sound speculation."

### WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Yesterday afternoon an order was sent by the newly formed Horticultural Society for over seventeen hundred rose bushes for people who during the last three days have put in orders for them. The roses are being sold at cost with the object of carrying on the work of beautifying the city and making it known as a city of roses rather than a city of rain.

The movement was commenced rather late in the season. Had it been a few weeks earlier two thousand roses could easily have been ordered. Many residents had already purchased their supplies, mostly from out of town points.

If it is found that this importation is successful it is possible that it may be repeated next year unless some local florist decides to take it up, order in quantities and sell at a very small margin of profit so that the work will be accomplished through legitimate business channels.

In putting on the drive this spring there was no thought in the minds of the promoters of competing with local stores. The season for rose planting was almost over before the drive commenced. No personal canvass was made, the only publicity given being through the medium of the Daily News and the response was wonderful. One person was kept busy in the newspaper office most of two days answering inquiries and taking orders. All this was done for the good of the cause and the secretary of the association also gave his time without remuneration just for the satisfaction of knowing that he was doing something to help beautify the city and encourage the cultivation of flower gardens.

The response to the move of the Horticultural Society indicates that people are anxious to do something if they are only shown how. It indicates a genuine desire to improve the city and should lead to better gardens everywhere. It also seems to indicate that the period of financial depression is rapidly passing.

### INVESTORS SHOULD READ

People who may contemplate making investments or speculating in stocks should read the summary of the address given by Dr. J. T. Mandy to the Rotary Club yesterday. He made clear the difference between investment and speculation and warned those who had a little money against becoming what is generally known in the rather vulgar parlance of the curb as "suckers."

In these days when so many people like to dabble in stocks or when they are willing to listen to the siren voice of the promoter, the advice of Dr. Mandy to investigate well before investing is very appropriate.

## SMELTERS ACTIVITY

Consolidated Plans Another Busy Season This Year in Omineca Mining Division

### Making Ready

Early Presence of Field Engineer In District Believed Significant

Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., according to word received in Prince Rupert, is already laying plans for another season of active development this year of its far flung interests in the Omineca mining division.

The most important operation of Smelters in the interior so far is the large scale placer development at Slate Creek in the Germanson River section near Manson Creek which, under direction of W. M. Ogilvie and with a crew of between forty and fifty men employed, came into production last fall.

Other Consolidated interests on which extensive development is expected to be continued this year are the rich gold deposit known as the Polaris Group at the head of Meslinka River, copper properties in the Thutade Lake country, chalcopryite and gold claims on Morice Mountain near Bear Lake at the headwaters of the Skeena River and the borinite and malachite Driftwood property.

The presence of late of H. C. Giegerich, field engineer for Consolidated from Kimberley, in the interior is taken as evidence that the company is preparing for another active season both north of and in the immediate proximity of the Canadian National Railways line.

The nearest of the mining properties on which the company has been active during recent years is not less than 100 miles north of the railway line. At present the chief means of access to the properties has been by airplane, the company having maintained a machine with Ken Dewar as pilot and bases at Burns Lake and Fort St. James.

Smelters activities in this remote region are believed by many to be based on the ultimate prospect of a railway being built westward through Peace River Pass to the Pacific Coast at Prince Rupert or Stewart.

### DANGERS OF SPECULATION AND HOW TO AVOID BEING ON "SUCKER LIST"

anyone for the asking. Also the city was fortunate in its local brokerage offices where sound advice could be obtained.

By making a study of the conditions from departmental reports it was easy for the investor to choose between the unsound fairy tales of the promoter and sound information received through the department of mines. In spite of the information available and the efforts of the government to protect investors, there would be many a "horn lamb."

Dr. Mandy then gave a number of instances where speculators had won out.

These had been sound speculations based on knowledge. He told how Harry Oakes had discovered Lakeshore and had been turned down by the big companies. He then interested his friends in the find and secured sufficient capital to finance development. Optimism and faith buoyed him up and he had been able to keep a controlling interest in what had become the greatest gold mine in Canada. He has been offered as high as \$32,000,000 for his 52% interest.

Other examples of sound speculation were seen in those who put their money into McIntyre in the Porcupine district, the promoters of which barely escaped prosecution. Teck-Hughes, Bralorne and Pioneer owed their existence to the speculations of the public. Cariboo Quartz was another example. Two courses were open, one to be a speculator and the other a gambler and a sucker.

### Kinds of Investments

The speaker then outlined the various kinds of mining investment and speculation, the price of shares to be in inverse proportion to the risk.

1. A producing mine with ore blocked out, the life and value of which could be calculated. This was a sound investment but the price of the stock would be high.
2. The mine in which it was possible to anticipate the advance in price from the advance in price of mineral. This was a speculative investment.
3. The mine in which an advance could be anticipated through the finding of new ore bodies. This too was a speculative investment.
4. The mine with ore blocked out of sufficient quantity to justify putting in a mill was a sound investment.
5. A company that by means of surface and other exploration had good showings was a speculation and the person putting up the money should be in a position to lose.
6. A property in proximity to a good mine in which the shares were low in price would be purely speculation, for proximity to a good mine did not necessarily mean anything.
7. Finally the property in a new area. It was people who speculated in these who had brought the industry to its present advanced state. But for them many properties could not have been developed or mining areas discovered. People putting up their money should be in a position to lose, as the possibilities were remote.

The speaker urged that his hearers avoid the high pressure salesman. If they speculated with their money, they should do so in a sound manner. They should gamble with their eyes open.

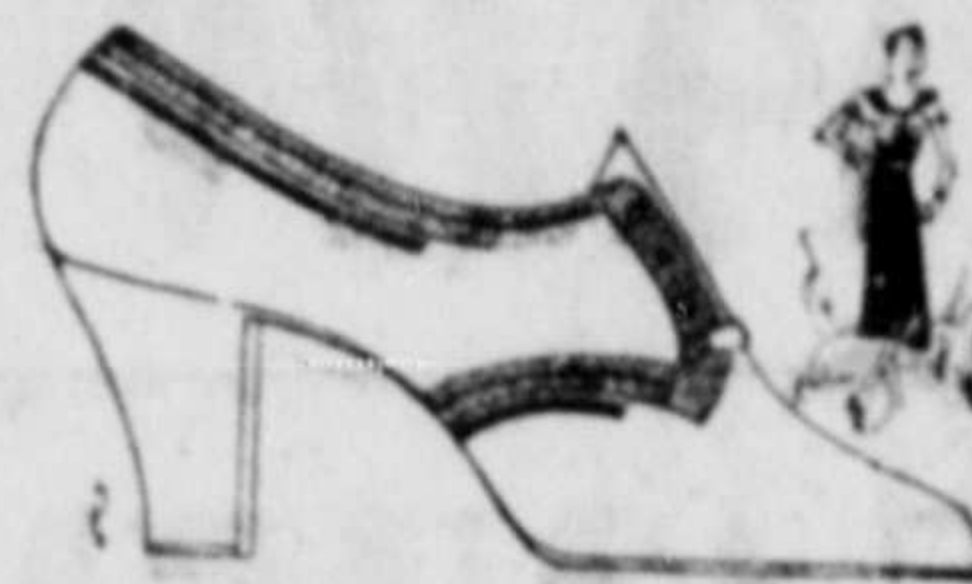

## ANOTHER PROPERTY OPERATING

Work Being Resumed on Glacier Creek Mine at Stewart—To Extend Tunnel

STEWART, April 13.—Further evidence of increased mining activity in the Portland Canal district is given by the announcement that Glacier Creek Mining Company Limited will start a program of work as soon as conditions on the ground permit which it is expected will be in about a month.

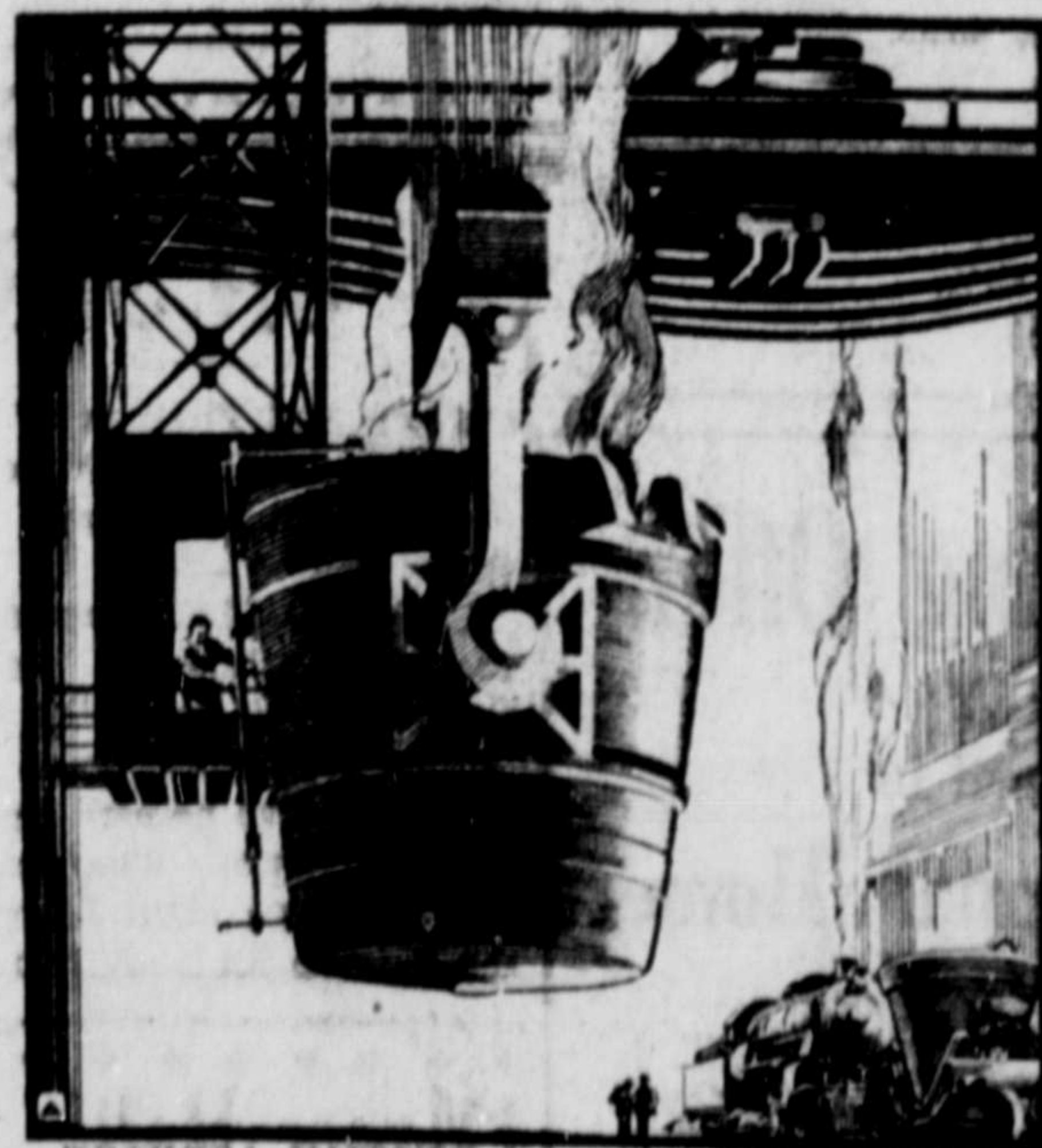
A contract has been let to drive 170 feet from the end of the main tunnel, now in 571 feet. The objective in the extension of the tunnel is to open up a large vein struck during diamond drilling operations some years ago at which time shortage of funds compelled the closing down of the operation. This vein, where intersected, was seven feet in width with a good proportion of milling ore, carrying values of gold and silver. The vein is supposed to be a continuation of the main Dunwell vein now under development.

quired and intend to operate. A crew of seven men is already at work opening up the workings on the property which has been closed down for some years pending settlement of an estate. The property, upon which half a million dollars has already been expended and which is equipped already with mill and power plant, was a successful shipper in previous years. The ore runs about \$20 per ton in values, principally gold.

## GOLD ON ISLANDS RAIL LINE NOW CLEAR

History of Discoveries of Precious Metal on Queen Charlottes Recalled

**Early Locators**

Edenshaw of Massett, Found First Lode and Stevens First Placer

SKIDEGATE, April 13:—Queen Charlotte Island gold was first discovered at Gold Harbor on the west coast of Moresby Island in 1855 by Chief Edenshaw, father of the present Chief Edenshaw of Massett.

Placer gold was first discovered near Massett in 1892 by the late E. C. Stevens, father of E. C. Stevens of Skidegate.

Placer gold was first discovered at Cape Fife and at Lawn Hill in 1903 by E. C. Stevens of Skidegate, and L. T. Watson of Ketchikan, Alaska. It is only two hundred feet from the original discovery at Lawn Hill that the present rich strike has been made.

It was in 1907 that the first gold discovery was made in Cumshewa Inlet by the late Colonel Topping, who was one of the real pioneers of mining in British Columbia. The late Col. Topping was well known throughout the northwest and was known as the Father of Trail. He always made his home with Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stevens whenever he came to Skidegate Inlet.

Among the other pioneer prospectors of the Queen Charlotte Islands were the late Ike Thompson, the late Al Wiles, the late A. J. Gordon and John McLennan, who now lives in Scotland.

The Haldas of the Islands used gold long before the coming of the white man. It was used for rings, arm bands, nose rings, anklets and bracelets. Where this gold came from is yet to be discovered. There are many legends among the Haldas of rich placer gold on the east coast of Graham Island and Gold Harbor where the natives in the times before the coming of the white man used to get gold nuggets. One legend goes on that, at one time, there was a very severe earthquake on Graham Island after which the bed rock disappeared and with it the gold.

The placer gold that was worked at Gold Harbor could be got only at very low tide. Their way of working this placer was by scooping up the gravel with large rock oyster shells and throwing the gravel up on the sloping rocks, then throwing water over it which washed away the gravel and left the gold.

## RAIL LINE NOW CLEAR

Trains Passing Point in Tate Jaune Subdivision Which Had Been Blocked By Slide

Traffic was again restored to normal on the local line of the Canadian National Railways this afternoon following interference of two or three days on account of a troublesome landslide and sinkhole in the Tate Jaune subdivision forty miles east of McBride.

Three trains passed over the line at that point this afternoon—a special fish train comprising express refrigerator cars which had been dispatched from here Monday afternoon, the regular train for the east which left here Wednesday afternoon and the train which is due here from the east tomorrow night.

This is an old scene of trouble on the railway. Some believe the trouble is due to the rise and fall of water in a lake in the mountains under certain conditions.

Telegraph lines were also down at this same point this morning, service being restored this afternoon.

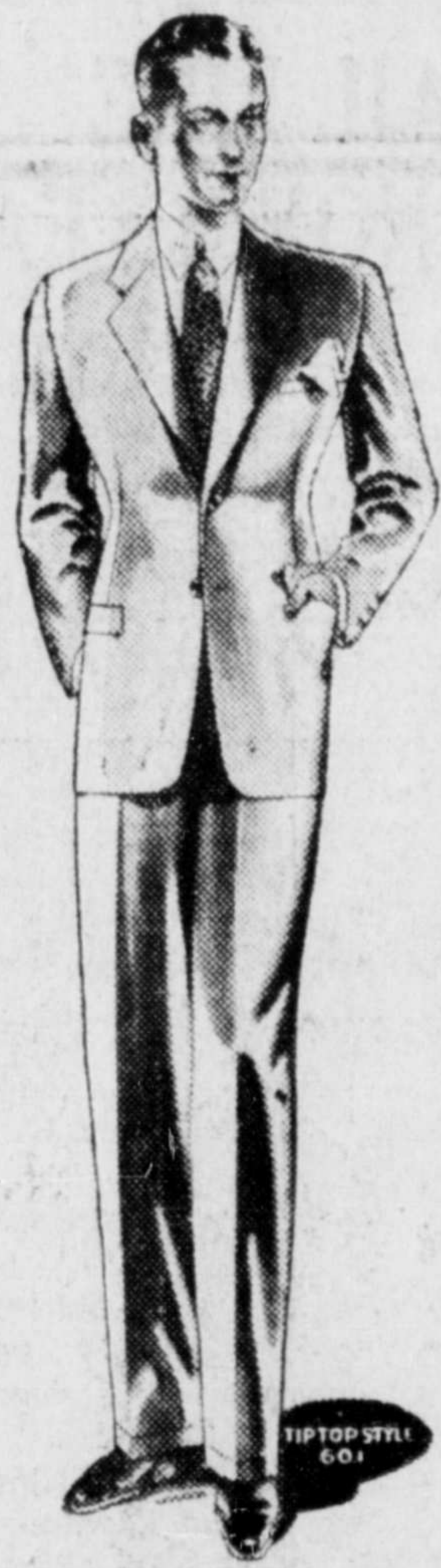

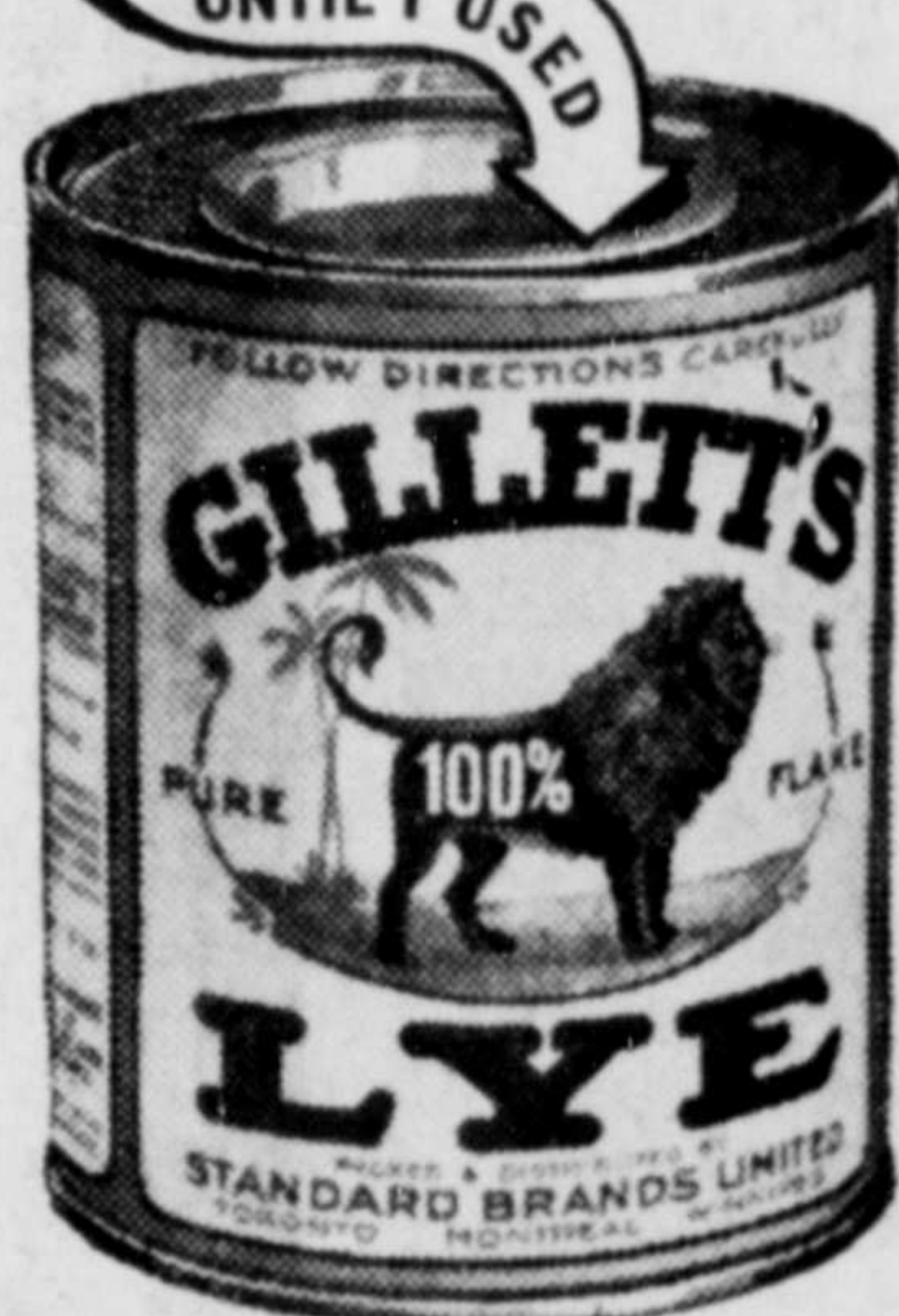
