## EXTRADITION PROCEEDINGS AGAINST JAMES FAHEY STOP

### United States Will Not Take Action In Case of Jasper Man

Attorney General Cummings Makes Order Whereby Alberta Man Who Escaped From Leavenworth 24 Years Ago Will Not be Prosecuted

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 12: (CP)—Attorney General Cummings today ordered that extradition proceedings be dropped against Frank Grigware, alias James Lawrence Fahey, who was found at Jasper, Alta., recently after escaping from Leavenworth Penitentiary 24 years ago. At the time of his escape he was serving a sentence for mail robbery of which offence he claims he was not guilty. He married in Alberta and raised a family, becoming a highly respected and law-abiding citizen.

### To Resume Gold Mining Work On Graham Island

Norman Terry, who has been active for the past two or three years in connection with gold mining from the sands of Graham Island, arrived in the city from Vancouver on the Princess Adelaide last evening and proceeded later on the steamer Prince John to Massett where he will prepare for another season's work. Mr. Terry is bringing north a large truck from Vancouver which he will use in connection with the work.

Child Born at Fort Worth, Texas, To Mr. and Mrs. Elliott Roosevelt

FORT WORTH, TEXAS, May 12:—A six and a half pound daughter was born here on Wednesday to Mrs. Elliott Roosevelt, wife of the son of President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt. Mother and baby are both doing well, it is reported from the hospital.

### Giant Leviathan Will Run Again

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 12:—The giant liner Leviathan will return to trans-Atlantic service this year, it was stated following a conference between owners of the ship and government officials. The Leviathan has been out of commission for two years.

### MINIMUM WAGE SET

New Scales Announced For Women By Board of Industrial Relations Of British Columbia

### Many Affected

No Less Than \$15 a Week For Senior Office Women is Provided For

VICTORIA, May 12: (CP)—A minimum wage of \$15 per 48-hour week for senior office women and of \$14 for women in public housekeeping occupations, effective May 24, is set in an order announced yesterday by the Board of Industrial Relations. It will affect thousands of employees in the province.

Other office rates covering girls under eighteen years of age and apprentices provide for a minimum of \$11 per week, rising progressively to \$15 within two years in the former instance and one year in the latter.

In the housekeeping occupations deduction may be made for lodging and meals of up to \$3 for lodging and up to \$5.25 for meals, leaving a wage of \$5.75 if both are deducted.

The minimum wage for girls under 18 in housekeeping occupations is \$12.

### Office Occupations

Office occupations include stenographers, bookkeepers, typists, billing clerks, filing clerks, cash-girls, checkers, invoice clerks, comptometer operators, auditors, attendants in doctors', dental and other offices and all kinds of clerical help.

Public house-keeping occupations include the work of waitresses, attendants, housekeepers, cooks and kitchen help in restaurants, hotels, tea rooms, ice cream parlors, light lunch stands, chambermaids, all female elevator operators and janitresses.

### Local Hospital Has Quiet Year

Hospital Days So Far in 1934 Down Six Hundred From Corresponding Period of 1933

The Prince Rupert General Hospital is down about 600 hospital days so far this year in comparison with a corresponding period last year, it was stated at last night's regular monthly meeting of the hospital board. During the month of April there were 1365 hospital days at a cost per day of \$2.65, total expenditures for the month having totalled \$3567.75.

In her monthly report for April Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, stated that the institution was still rather quiet. Members of the nursing staff had now started taking their annual vacations.

### HEALTH CENTRE

Medical Association and Hospital Board Co-operating—Laboratory Technician Invited

The Prince Rupert Medical Association and the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital are co-operating in a move looking towards the establishment at Prince Rupert of a public health centre. It was revealed last night at the regular monthly meeting of the hospital board.

George Darling, for years a technician at Tranquille Sanitarium, who has attained considerable prominence in various forms of medical laboratory test work, is in communication with the Medical Association with a view to the possibility of locating here if conditions appear to be favorable. The hospital board has decided to offer him the use of the local laboratory and equipment and also the assistance of the secretary in connection with the imposing and collection of fees for services rendered. Mr. Darling's coming, it is felt, would make a valuable extension in local hospital functions and, eventually, might lead to the government giving financial assistance by establishing a public health centre which would fill a long-felt need.

The hospital board, at its regular monthly meeting last night, tendered a vote of appreciation to Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, and all persons who had assisted in making the recent nurses' graduation exercises so pleasant and impressive. The vote was moved by Frank Dibb and seconded by S. D. Macdonald.

It was mentioned that the exercises this year had been unique in that one of the graduates, Miss Hilda Wilson-Murray, was born in the local hospital, it being the first occasion on which a girl who had been born in the institution had graduated as a nurse therefrom.

### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Stewart Couple Sent Up on Furious Driving Charges as Result of Hitting W. Scrimgeour

John Campbell and Agnes Gamble, occupants of an automobile which is alleged to have run down Walter Scrimgeour on the Stewart-Hyder road last week as a result of which he had both legs broken as well as sustaining other injuries, were committed for trial at Stewart yesterday by Stipendiary Magistrate J. P. Scarlatt on charges of furious driving, district headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised. The couple will be brought here later to appear before Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court for election. Meantime, they have been released on bail of \$1500 each.

Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill prosecuted at the preliminary hearing while J. T. Harvey appeared for the defendants. Staff Sergeant McNeill is expected to return to the city tonight on the police boat P. M. L. 8.

### Rehabilitation Action For White Metal Seems Sure This Congress

President Roosevelt and Remonetization Advocates Reach Common Ground Today—Ratio of 25-75 Percent in Currency Likely

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 12: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt and silver advocates were so near together today on a bill for the rehabilitation of the white metal that legislation at this session of Congress appears certain, definitely fixing silver as a part of the national monetary basis at a ratio of not less than twenty-five percent against seventy-five percent gold.

### ASSISTANCE TO TOWBOAT

Jedway and Pachena Off to Union Pass in Grenville Channel Where Salvage Princess Is Ashore

### Hope to Refloat

Local Towboat Not Badly Damaged Although Position is Difficult

Following the Massett Cannery service boat Jedway, which was pressed into service and left yesterday for the scene of the stranding down the coast to lend her assistance in the endeavor to refloat the vessel, the Armour Salvage Co.'s smaller power tug Pachena, with Capt. W. P. Armour, head of the Armour Salvage Co., and Hubert Ward, underwriters' representative, on board, left this morning for the entrance of Union Pass at the lower end of Grenville Channel where the power tug Salvage Princess ran ashore late Thursday night while enroute to Union Pass to pick up a tow of logs for delivery to the McAfee & Sunbury box factory at Georgetown.

The Salvage Princess, which went up at just about high water, was still fast ashore this morning but it was hoped that, with the two other boats alongside, it might be possible to refloat her soon. Meantime, so far as is known, she is not seriously damaged and is in no immediate danger.

W. R. McAfee, who was on board the Salvage Princess when she struck, returned to the city on the Princess Adelaide last evening, having been picked up by the steamer in Grenville Channel.

### How Stranding Occurred

It was at the peak of a twenty-one foot tide when the stranding occurred about 11:30 Thursday night. The vessel was endeavoring to pass through the channel.

### WARNING TO FISHERMEN

Authorities Predict Early Closing of Halibut Season if Heavy Production Continues

VICTORIA, May 12: (CP)—The provincial Department of Fisheries has taken occasion to emphasize a warning of the International Fisheries Commission, issued this week, that, with the landed catch of 12,548,445 pounds of halibut during March and April in the two areas of the Pacific seaboard, the present rate will see the permissive catch in each area exhausted before the normal close of the season, beginning November.

### SPAIN IS QUIETER

Political Situation Improved Following Calling Off of General Strike

MADRID, May 12:—The political situation in Spain has become much improved during the past day or so following the termination of a 36-hour general strike which tied up industry in some sections of the country and caused much rioting and sabotage.

### TURNING THE TABLES

A few years ago the newspapers of the country were full of statements in regard to alleged payments to the campaign funds of the Liberal party. Yesterday's despatches told of efforts made to secure contributions from a wealthy tobacco firm for the Conservative party funds. Ward Pittfield, a man said to be "close to the Premier," solicited funds for the party from the W. C. Macdonald Tobacco Co., according to the president of that firm, but was turned down.

As a matter of fact every political party has to solicit subscriptions to carry on elections. There is no other way of getting the money. At the time of the last provincial election a canvass was made in Prince Rupert by the C. C. F. in order to raise money to pay the expenses of the candidate. It is nothing against the C. C. F. that they did so. We mention it only because some people have a notion that it is only the older parties that have to pay election expenses.

If I join a political party I expect to help support it. The danger is that those making large contributions often expect to receive special concessions in return, and sometimes they get what they want, it is said.

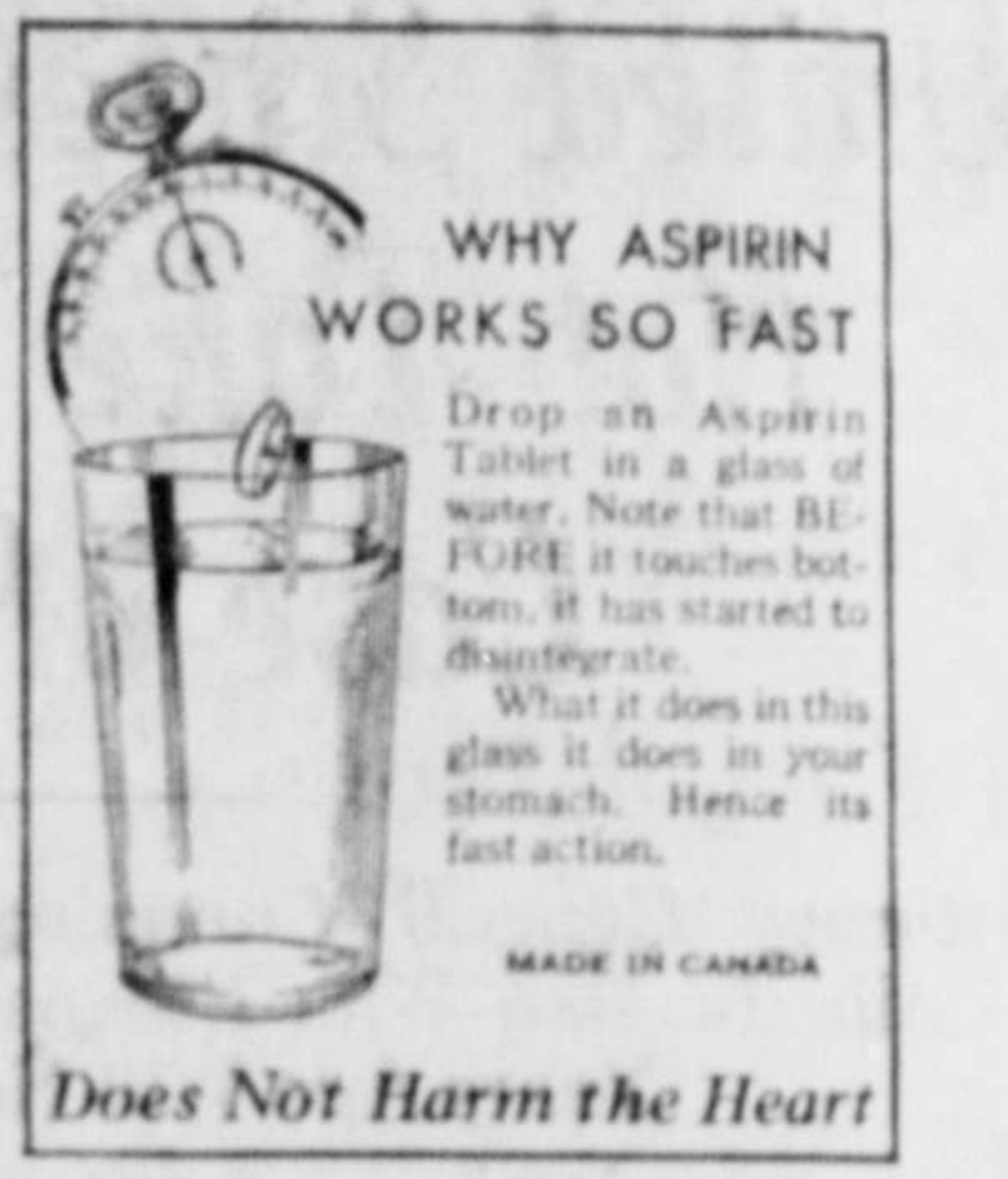

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Stormy Weather Hampers Trolling Fleet—Whaling Stations on Islands Busy—Halibut Prices Better

While stormy weather of the past week or so has been hampering operations on the outside trolling grounds around Dundas and Stephens Islands, early season gill-netters on the Skeena River have been having fair success in fishing for spring salmon this week. Due to the cold and rainy weather, the fish have almost disappeared

on the Dundas and Stephens Islands grounds. At North Island, however, fish are still being caught. It is a little early yet for the run on the Naas River.

The Rose Harbor whaling station of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation at the southern tip of the Queen Charlotte Islands is operating full blast, the steamer Prince John, on her arrival at Prince Rupert this week, reporting three of the big mammals at the plant in readiness to be put through. The Naden Harbor station had not opened as yet although the crew is there getting it in shape for operation.

Assistant District Forester Doug Gregor and Forest Ranger J. B. Scott returned to port on Sunday with the Forest Branch cruiser after an absence of nearly three weeks on the Queen Charlotte Islands on official duties. They report much activity at the Moresby Island logging camps with many men busy at work and the outlook for a large production of timber during the next few months.

Edmunds & Walker, New Westminster fish exporting concern, which is the latest company to open headquarters at Prince Rupert for the shipment of halibut and mild curing of salmon, is now doing business on the government wharf in the premises formerly occupied by the United Pacific Fisheries and more recently by the Shrubbsall Fisheries. The company is shipping the most of the halibut it buys to Vancouver. It will also mild cure salmon at Balmoral cannery as well as at Prince Rupert.

Unfavorable weather on the fishing grounds had the effect of diminishing Canadian halibut landings at Prince Rupert during the week ending yesterday to the light total of but 168,900 pounds brought in by sixteen boats. The American fleet, however, gave a more normal contribution, fourteen United States vessels landing an aggregate of 246,000 pounds to make the week's total landings 414,900 pounds. There was very little change in the price situation during the week, the tendency, if anything, being towards improvement. The high price of the week for Canadian fish was 6.1c and 4.6c which the P. Dorreen received for 11,000 pounds and the low 5c and 4.5c which several boats received. The top bid of the week for American fish was 8.4c and 5c which the California was paid for 10,000 pounds and the low 7c and 5c which the Franklin, Visitor and Yukon were given for catches of 22,000, 1,000 and 22,000 pounds respectively.

The codification of the Canadian halibut fleet with a view to limitation of production in the interests of regulation of supply and conservation of the fishery has resulted this season in a regularity of landings by the individual units of the fleet which has never before

in past years been so apparent. Up to yesterday the majority of the boats had made either three or four returns to port with catches while only five had completed five trips. The trips of the American fleet have been regulated in a similar manner, of course, but this has not been so apparent as far as Prince Rupert is concerned since the United States vessels land their catches at Seattle or in Alaska besides at Prince Rupert depending upon market conditions when they offer.

Up to yesterday the Takla, Capt. Chris Parkvold, was the leading boat of the Canadian fleet as far as volume of fish landed at Prince Rupert was concerned, having brought in a total of 115,000 pounds in four trips. The Covenant, Capt. Hans Underdahl, was second with 81,000 pounds in five trips and the Margaret I. Capt. George Fritz, third with 80,500 pounds in five trips.

Boats having completed five trips since the opening of the season were: Bayview, 39,000 pounds; Covenant, 81,000 pounds; Margaret I., 80,500 pounds; Morris H., 49,000 pounds; Rose Spit, 62,000 pounds.

For the American fleet the Tahoma has been the heaviest lander of fish at Prince Rupert with 79,000 pounds in four trips, the Sentinel second with 72,000 pounds in three trips and the Yukon third with 69,000 pounds in three trips. The Visitor had landed five trips for a total of 28,500 pounds while the Tahoma had made four trips with 79,000 pounds. The following vessels had completed three trips: Augusta, 55,000 pounds; Emma, 35,500; Excel, 64,000; Fremont, 40,000; Frisco, 25,000; Hazel H., 50,800; Lumen, 32,000; Oceanic, 46,500; Remus, 29,000; Sentinel, 72,000; Sherman, 56,000; Tahoma, 79,000; Teddy J., 36,500; Viking, 36,500; Yukon, 69,000, and Zarembo, 30,500.

Again delayed on account of having had heavy freights to discharge at cannery points along the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, is reported due about 5 o'clock this afternoon from the south and will sail soon thereafter on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The vessel is some eighteen hours behind schedule.

The big fish packer Jessie Island II of the Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. arrived in port at 6 o'clock last evening from Vancouver, having in tow a fish buying camp scow which is being taken on today to the Queen Charlotte Islands where it will be placed for the season on the salmon trolling grounds.

to make her way into the entrance of Union Pass from Grenville Channel but was actually about three-quarters of a mile north of the passage. The reef was submerged at the time. It was raining and visibility was quite poor.

The reef is a long flat one considerable distance from shore and about half a mile from the steamboat channel. On the tide going down the vessel was left high and dry with a slight list. The false keel is believed to be damaged but the vessel is not holed and is not making water at the high tide.

There is a twenty-one foot, eight inch tide tonight and, with the assistance of the Jedway, which left for the scene yesterday afternoon, and the Pachena, which left at 10 o'clock this morning with Capt. Armour and Mr. Ward on board, it is hoped the vessel may be refloated.

The three members of the crew of the Salvage Princess are remaining on board the vessel.
