SEATTLE, Dec. 15: (CP)-The Alaska Packers' Association and C. A. Halverson of San Francisco were charged in federal court yesterday with violation of a little known statute prohibiting wastage of salmon.

Assistant United States Attorney Gerald Shucklin filed an information saying that the defendants "unlawfully and wantonly wasted or destroyed salmon" by not using the tail cuts in their cannery at Chignik, Alaska.


