BANK HEAD DIFFERS WITH BENNETT

PEACE RIVER HALF BREED TO HANG ON MURDER CHARGE

Death Penalty Imposed On John Ferguson for Killing Louis Jobin

Dramatic Trial Was Held in Theatre of Northern Alberta Town—Accused Said His Sweetheart Invited Him to Kill Her Father

PEACE RIVER, June 23: (CP)—Boyd Theatre, scene of melodramatic make-believe trials of the past, was the setting for a real life drama when John Ferguson, 25-year old halfbreed, was sentenced to hang on August 6 for the murder of Louis Jobin, father of his sweetheart in March last. The trial was held in the theatre as court house facilities here were not adequate.

Accused claimed that his sweetheart, Marcella Jobin, invited him to "come over any time and we will kill my mother and father." The parents had objected to their daughter marrying Ferguson.

The girl stoutly denied the allegation made by Ferguson. The jury, in finding Ferguson guilty of murder, recommended mercy but the court had no alternative, in view of the verdict, but to pass sentence of death.

ODD CASE IS COMING

Shannon Van Alst Charged With Planting Weeds on Neighbor's Land

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here are advised that in a Spithers case arising in the Evelyn district a farmer by the name of Shannon Van Alst has been elected for jury trial at the next Assizes in Prince Rupert. He is charged with doing damage to wheat land of a neighboring farmer by walking over his field and dropping noxious weed seeds—stink weed.

Pending trial, Van Alst has been released on \$5000 bail.

Premier's Statement In House Resented by Commerce President

Sir John Aird Protests Bennett's Suggestion That No Canadian Suitable to Institute and Direct Central Bank to be Established in Canada

TORONTO, June 23:—Sir John Aird, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, has protested at Premier R. B. Bennett's statement in the House of Commons that "there is not a banker in Canada who has the training to institute and direct the proposed new central bank."

Sir John added that he certainly thought a Canadian banker who understood Canadian banking and Canadian institutions would be a far better choice than any one from England.

Chamber of Commerce Committee
Presents Strong Case for Re-
duction in Auto Rates
To Interior

Requesting that in all fairness a rate be published between Prince Rupert and Terrace, also between Terrace and New Hazelton, similar to that published by the Canadian Pacific Railway between Revelstoke and Golden and that a rate be published between Prince Rupert and New Hazelton on a comparative basis, the highway committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce this week presented to A. LeSage, inspector of railroad operation of the Board of Railway Commissioners from Calgary, a strong memorandum seeking a substantial reduction in freight rates for transportation of automobiles between Prince Rupert and Terrace and Hazelton. Present rates, the memorandum contended, are prohibitive and strangle any possibility of developing traffic. A reduced rate would undoubtedly stimulate tourist traffic greatly.

The rate between Golden and Revelstoke, a distance of 91 miles, it was pointed out, was from \$12.50 to \$17.50, according to wheelbase measurements, whereas the rate between Prince Rupert and Terrace, 95 miles, was \$32.50 and \$27; between Terrace and New Hazelton, 86 miles, \$32.50 and \$27; and between Prince Rupert and New Hazelton, 181 miles, \$51 and \$40.

The memorandum was a lengthy document and exhaustively sets out the case for a reduction in rates from all angles, particularly from the point of view of the possibility of developing new business for the railway both from tourists and from automobile owners of Prince Rupert and the interior.

The committee was in session with Mr. LeSage for more than two hours. The committee consisted of S. E. Parker, chairman, C. H. Orme, W. O. Fulton and V. S. Moore. Also present were Peter Lake, district freight and passenger agent for the Canadian National Railways, and Arthur Brooksbank, secretary of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

The first full passenger train to arrive here under the new summer time table, due at 2:15 this afternoon, was this morning reported to be fifty-five minutes late which would bring it in at 3:10 p.m.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Fish Scarce on Trolling Grounds—Donkeys From Buckley Bay to Crescent Inlet—Halibut Landings Light

Due undoubtedly in large measure to unfavorable weather conditions, there has been a considerable falling off lately in the run of spring salmon on the trolling grounds in Prince Rupert district. Cohoes have also commenced putting in an appearance but they too are scarce. Owing to the weather and also possibly discouraged somewhat because a drop in price from 10¢ to 8¢ per pound for red springs on the 6:45 this evening and sail soon after for the south. The Prince George will be here next Wednesday northbound on her first voyage of the season to Alaska.

Halibut Landings Light Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert during the week ending yesterday were light, totalling only 286,000 pounds of which 106,500 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 179,500 pounds from American, bringing the total landings at the port for the present season up to 6,901,065 pounds, made up of 3,257,565 pounds from Canadian boats and 3,643,500 pounds from American, as against 6,609,500 pounds last year at the corresponding date including 2,874,800 pounds from Canadian boats and 3,724,700 pounds from American.

Captain Henry Edenshaw of Massett, also packing from the Queen Charlotte Islands to Butehead, is another packer that has been in all week. He has been having some alterations made to his big boat Edenshaw at the Pacific Machine Works with a view to making it possible to burn diesel oil as well as gasoline in his motor.

The packer Ogden, Capt. Sam Simpson, returned to port on Thursday afternoon after having made a trip to Vancouver with a load of halibut from here for Edmunds & Walker.

The Surf Point mine service boat Qualis arrived in port on Wednesday afternoon from Porcher Island and left yesterday morning on its return there. It brought in R. E. Legg, superintendent of the Surf Point mine, who spent a couple of days in town on business.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess left Monday afternoon for Buckley Bay where it was to pick up four donkey engines from the plant of the Los Angeles Lumber Products Co. for delivery to the J. R. Morgan Logging Co.'s camp at Crescent Inlet for which they have been purchased. Capt. Paul Armour went to Buckley Bay with the Princess and returned to the city on the Prince John Thursday morning. The Princess is expected back in a few days.

Making her first voyage on summer schedule, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 9:45 yesterday morning from Vancouver. Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 3 p.m. for Anyox and Stewart whence she is due to return here at

Various areas in Prince Rupert Fisheries District report exceptionally high average catches of sockeye for gill net boats on opening days of the 1934 season and, if weather continues favorable, the outlook appears to be for a real good pack.

The average per boat on the Skeena and Naas Rivers for the opening day, Wednesday, was eight fish. Yesterday the Skeena average was eighteen fish and the Naas, twenty, the latter stream having yielded thirty-five fish per boat on Thursday.

Fitzhugh Sound and Dean Channel reported twelve fish per boat on the opening day and Burke Channel, twenty.

There are nine canneries operating on the Skeena River this year as compared with ten last year. The Naas River has three canneries operating, the same number as last year.


