Nearly 200 Persons Dead In Spanish Revolution And Even Worse Trouble Feared

MADRID, Spain, Oct. 6: (CP)—It was estimated at noon today that 194 persons had been killed in fighting during the extremist revolt against the new Lerrous administration. Madrid was under martial law and the situation was still tense and precautions were being taken against further and, possibly, more serious disorders. Practically all the casualties so far are in Madrid although disorders are widespread throughout the country.

The rattle of machine guns, rifles and other weapons obliterated a government statement today that tranquility had been restored. Fighting continued in Madrid streets this afternoon when strikers clashed with police as they attempted to close stores which had re-opened.

In addition to the dead, more than three hundred have been wounded since the revolt started on Thursday.

The government announced yesterday that all extremists carrying weapons would be shot forthwith. The early resignation of President Zamora is ex-


